London, Aug. 21.—Canadian troops around Lens launched another attack on the eastern environs of the French mining city at 4.30 o'clock this morning, reports the Reuter correspondent from the British headquarters in France. The attack developed into one of the most desperate hand-to-hand battles of the war. When the Canadians went over the top they saw masses of grey figures advancing towards them in the thick haze. Both sides had planned the attack at the same moment.

Fifteen minutes after the clash came the Germans were making their last stand on the parapet of their trench. They then retreated rapidly.



His Resignation as Minister Treatment Meted Out To Government Chiefs Of Russia's Old Regime

Allowed to Have any Of Own Effects

Nearly all the ministers of the exzar and many other of the principal agents of the old regime are a present confined in the ancient and obsolete fortress of Peter and Paul, which faces the Winter Palace across the Neva, and is one of the most picture. turesque features of the Russian capital. They occupy the same cells in the Trubetskoj Bastion in which e unsuccessful revolutionaries of the past were confined till the tim ame for them to mount the scaffold. Here sit the Minister President Sturmer, the Minister of the Interior Protopoff, the War Minister Suk-homlinoff, and his wife. Here, too, are the Minister of the Imperial Household, Count Fredericks, and Madame Vuirubova, the most trusted of the ladies-in-waiting and one of ne most ardent devotees of Gregory tasputin. Another of the inmates is the gendarmerie officer, Sobie-schanski, popularly known as "The Hangman," to whom so many of the former occupants of the state prison were handed over for execution. These distinguished prisoners, not

so long ago all-powerful in Russia, are kept in strict seclusion, and with the exception of a short conversation with their nearest relatives once a week, in the presence of a legal offical, are allowed to see no one, least of all one another.

While still Minister of Justice M. Kerensky was asked at a meeting whether workmen's and soldiers' deputies might not visit the fortres to satisfy themselves that the enmies of freedom were being treated with becoming severity, but, with characteristic bluntness, he refused point blank, declaring that he was not going to allow the Trubetskoi to "be turned into a menagerie."
