A Dominion Charter, without stock subscription, was recently obtained for the establishment in the city of Ottawa, of a Home, Nursery, Hospital and Kindergarten, for the blind under six years of age, free to all from any Province in the Dominion. So far nothing has been done for those poor unfortunates. According to reports received from the various Provincial authorities, there are at present nearly 250 in the Dominion. The late Sir Arthur Pearson, before his death, claimed that "Sunshine Home" at Chorley Wood, England, was "the only home in the Empire for blind babies." It is hoped shortly to have a second in Canada. To this end money is urgently required. Help with your generous gift. "Lest we forget; Do it now!" 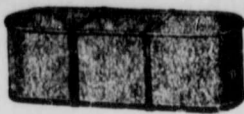

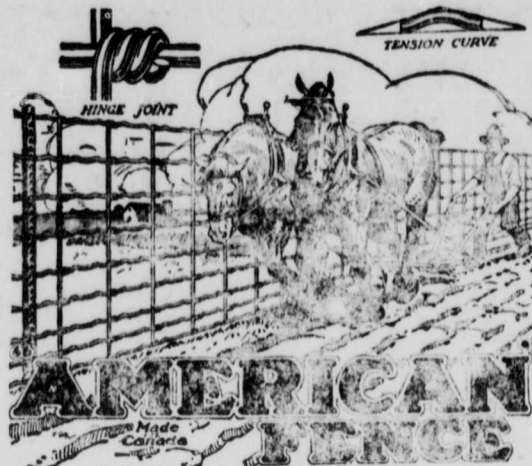

OWNED BY A GROUP OF MUNICIPALITIES

Operated by the Hydro Electric Power Commission as Trustees for them on a basis of cost only.

Will develop Hamilton and district.

Will give a service the steam roads cannot and will not give.

Will pay from the start.

Will NOT add to your taxes.

Buses will not compete with Hydro Radials but will be feeders to them. Hydro Radials will be feeders to Canadian National Railways. Hydro Radials have agreed to turn over to Canadian National Railways all long haul business from their systems. Hon. J. D. Reid in giving evidence said they had agreed to this.

SERVICE OF HYDRO RADIALS

CLEAN RAPID PROMPT FREQUENT

To be operated for the people in the same manner as the Hydro Power and Light Systems. This use of power for Radials means lower cost of power for light and power users in the district.

The agreement being voted on is the same as submitted in 1917 with minor changes. Hamilton's City Solicitor says, "that it is if anything a better agreement."

MUNICIPAL HYDRO ELECTRIC RAILWAY ASSOCIATION

By-Law No. 711

To Provide for Taking the Votes of the Electors on a Proposed By-law to Authorize a Certain Agreement Between the Hydro-Electric Power Commission of Ontario and the Municipal Corporation of the Township of East Flamboro, and other Municipal Corporations, for the Construction, Equipment, Maintenance and Operation of a Railway from the Village of Port Credit to the City of St. Catharines.

WHEREAS a proposed by-law by the Council of the Corporation of the Township of East Flamboro, entitled "By-law No. . . .", to authorize a certain agreement between the Hydro-Electric Power Commission of Ontario and the Municipal Corporation of the Township of East Flamboro and other Municipal Corporations, for the construction, equipment, maintenance and operation of a railway from the Village of Port Credit to the City of St. Catharines, requires for its validity the assent of a majority of the electors in the Township of East Flamboro entitled to vote on a money by-law, voting upon such proposed by-law, and it is expedient and necessary to pass this by-law for the purpose of enabling the said electors to vote on the said proposed by-law.

THEREFORE the Council of the Corporation of the Township of East Flamboro enacts as follows:

1. The proposed by-law to authorize a certain agreement between the Hydro-Electric Power Commission of Ontario and the Municipal Corporation of the Township of East Flamboro and other municipal corporations, for the construction, equipment, maintenance and operation of a railway from the Village of Port Credit to the City of St. Catharines, annexed as a Schedule to this by-law, shall be submitted to a vote of the electors of the Township of East Flamboro entitled to vote on a money by-law, pur-

suant to the provisions of "The Municipal Act" and "The Municipal Electric Railway Act, 1922."

2. The votes of the said electors shall be taken upon the said proposed by-law at the same time and at the same places as the annual election for the Municipal Council for the year 1923, and the Deputy Returning Officers appointed to hold said elections shall take the vote.

3. On the 15th day of December, 1922, at the hour of 2 o'clock, the head of the Council of the said corporation, or some member of the Council appointed for that purpose by resolution, shall attend at the Council Chamber in the Village of Waterdown, in the said Municipality, for the purpose of appointing and if requested so to do, shall appoint by writing signed by him two persons to attend at the final summing up of the votes by the Clerk and one person to attend at each polling place on behalf of the persons interested in and promoting the proposed by-law, and a like number on behalf of the persons interested in and opposing the proposed by-law.

4. On the 2nd day of January, A.D. 1923, at the hour of 11 o'clock, at the Clerk's Office in the said Municipality, the Clerk of the said Municipality shall attend and sum up the votes given for and against the proposed by-law.

SCHEDULE BY-LAW No. . . .

To Authorize a Certain Agreement Between the Hydro-Electric Power Commission of Ontario and the Municipal Corporation of the Township of East Flamboro, and other Municipal Corporations, for the Construction, Equipment, Maintenance and Operation of a Railway from the Village of Port Credit to

the City of St. Catharines.

WHEREAS under authority of the Hydro-Electric Railway Act, 1914, and amendments, and of a by-law passed pursuant to the said Act, this Municipal Corporation entered into an agreement with the Hydro-Electric Power Commission of Ontario for the construction, equipment and operation of a railway from the Village of Port Credit to the City of St. Catharines;

AND WHEREAS by Section 29 of the Municipal Electric Railway Act, 1922, the Councils of the Municipal Corporations interested, were authorized to enter into an agreement for the construction, equipment, maintenance and operation of a railway from the Village of Port Credit to the City of St. Catharines, and the said Councils were authorized to pass resolutions requesting the Commission to proceed with the construction, equipment and operation of the said railway and authorizing the execution on behalf of the Corporations;

AND WHEREAS it is expedient in the interests of this Municipal Corporation to enter into the said agreement and that the said railway should be constructed;

It is therefore enacted by the Council of the Corporation of the Township of East Flamboro as follows:

1. That the entering into the said agreement is hereby approved and authorized.

2. It shall be lawful for the Corporation of the Township of East Flamboro, and the said Corporation is hereby authorized to enter into the following agreement with the Hydro-Electric Power Commission of Ontario and other Corporations, the said agreement being hereby incorporated into and forming a part of this by-law, and the Reeve and Clerk of the Corporation are hereby authorized and directed to execute the said agreement upon behalf of this Corporation and to attach the seal of the Corpora-

tion thereto.

THE HYDRO-ELECTRIC POWER COMMISSION OF ONTARIO (hereinafter called "The Commission"),

of the First Part,

—and—

THE MUNICIPAL CORPORATIONS OF THE TOWNSHIP OF TORONTO, the Township of Trafalgar, the Township of Nelson, the Township of East Flamboro, the Township of Barton, the Township of North Grimsby, the Township of Clinton, the Township of Louth, the Township of Grant-Ham, the Town of Grimsby, the Village of Beamsville, the Town of Oakville, the Town of Burlington, the City of Hamilton and the City of St. Catharines, (hereinafter called "the Corporations.")

of the Second Part.

WHEREAS under the authority of the Hydro-Electric Railway Act, 1914, and amendments, and of certain by-laws passed pursuant to the said Act the Corporations entered into an agreement with the Commission for the construction, equipment and operation of a railway from the Village of Port Credit to the City of St. Catharines;

AND WHEREAS by Section 29 of the Municipal Electric Railway Act, 1922, the Corporations were authorized to pass resolutions requesting the Commission to proceed with the construction, equipment and operation of the said railway, and authorizing the execution on behalf of the Corporations of a new agreement for that purpose;

WHEREAS pursuant to the said section 29 the Councils of certain of the Corporations have passed a reso-

lution authorizing the execution of this agreement on behalf of the Corporations;

AND WHEREAS pursuant to the said section 29 this agreement has been submitted to the Electors qualified to vote on money by-laws in such Corporations as come within the provisions of the said section and the said Electors of the said Corporations have approved of this agreement.

NOW THIS INDENTURE WITNESSETH AS FOLLOWS:

1. The Commission and the Corporations agree that from and after the date of this indenture the agreement above recited, as set forth in Schedule "A" to the Act of the Legislature of Ontario passed in the ninth year of the reign of His Majesty, King George the Fifth, chapter 45, and in the by-laws above recited, is and shall be binding upon the Commission and the Corporations according to the terms thereof, and that all things done under the said by-laws and under the said agreement are confirmed.

IN WITNESS WHEREOF, the Commission and the Corporations have respectively affixed their corporate seals and the hands of their proper officers.

GIVE THEM A SALT BOX

Pigs and Other Live Stock Require Mineral Food.

Farm Animals Must Have a Body Builder—A Good Mineral Mixture Suggested — Combatting Field Mice.

The feeds that we give our young animals are the body building materials, and are just as necessary to the young pig, calf, or colt as are bricks and boards to the carpenter engaged in building a house. House building and body-building are alike in that both depend upon the structural materials furnished. When we see a fine house we are at once impressed with the evidence that is before us, in good and abundant material supplied the workmen. When we see well-grown, fine and sleek calves and pigs we have the same thought—that abundant body-building material has been supplied. On the other hand when we observe a shack built of scrap lumber, or see a calf with its back up, pot bellied, under size, or a pig crippled and off its feet, we are at once struck with the thought that someone has not supplied the very necessary materials for body building or house building.

Need of Lime and Phosphorous.

Two materials that are necessary in growth and body building are lime and phosphorous. Young animals running with their dams on pasture will as a rule show no evidence of a shortage of these minerals in their development, since the milk of their dams is adjusted to the mineral requirement of the young. But as soon as the young animals become dependent on the feeds given them by man their case is different, and they are frequently very much neglected, in that a proper selection of feeds is not made for them. A calf or pig that is shut up tight in a pen has no choice; it is entirely at the mercy of the owner or feeder. Should the feeds supply all the requirement of growth, then all is well and good. If the feeds do not supply the requirements, then development cannot take place. With animals confined in pens the mineral food shortage is usually pronounced, unless some special provision is made to supply such. The effect of its absence is shown in unthrifty, crippled or dwarf animals.

Results of Experiments.

In an experiment recently concluded, where two groups of pigs were being fed the same grain ration, a remarkable difference was noted in one group that received in addition to the grain ration free access to a mineral mixture or salt box containing the following essentials to growth: Lime, bone meal, rock salt, and charcoal. The presence of the salt box in the one pen during the 124 days of the feeding experiment gave an average gain of 132.8 pounds per pig, while the pigs in the pen in which there was no salt box gave an average gain of 69.5 pounds per pig in the 124 days. The presence and use of the salt box was accountable for a gain of 63.5 pounds per pig. If young stock are out on good grass they can generally get what minerals are required for their body development. But the confined animal gets only what you give it, and the giving is indicated by the condition of the animal. If the animal does not thrive your giving has been misdirected or stinky.

Watch Your Stock.

Look at the pigs and calves on your farm. Are they "off their feet," "up in the back," "stunted," or "scrubby"? If so, then just take a look in the mirror when nobody is around and see the fellow responsible for the condition. When you recognize yourself as the stingy or neglectful feeder, proceed at once to the workshop and make a mineral-salt box, fill it, and see that the young animals never want for the essential bone and muscle building elements. The pigs and calves will be more apt to thrive, and they will also have a better opinion of you.—L. Stevenson, Sec., Ontario Dept. of Agriculture, Toronto.
