TO EDITOR'S OUTING.
(Continued.)

Early on Thursday morning we once more wended our way to Troy lake, hoping to improve on our good luck of the day before. A trawl and line was taken along on this trip and we had not gone more than twenty rods before a sudden jerk told plain than words that we had hooked "large game." Our companion shouted that we had a "hanker," and he was to be a five pound bass. No more than twenty minutes after, we hooked a nice Oswego, and after a pull of not more than a mile we hooked another large bass that weighed the scales at six and a half pounds. These two fish were gamy fellows and at times would leap fully four or five feet out of the water, while being drawn in. An old oarsman, who had spent nearly his whole life on the Ottawa who was present when the fish were landed, said that they were the largest bass he had ever seen. DR. CHAMBERLAIN'S APPOINTMENT.

The news of the appointment of Dr. Chamberlain, of Morrisburg, to the position of provincial inspector of prisons and asylums was received with great satisfaction by his friends and admirers in this section. Respecting the matter the Globe says:—"The appointment will give a large measure of satisfaction. Dr. Chamberlain is well known and much esteemed throughout the whole of Eastern Ontario. He has exceptional qualifications for the position. He has an honorable standing in his profession. He has plenty of energy, a sound judgment and an unblemished character. He has been a fighting Liberal for a quarter of a century. He was an unsuccessful candidate for the representation of Dundas in the Commons, and ran three contests for the seat in the Legislature. In the general election of 1866 he was successful, and notwithstanding that Dundas ranks as a safe Conservative constituency, he was defeated on other occasions by very narrow margins. He has fought the battle of Liberalism all through Eastern Ontario, and ranked as one of the best platform speakers in the Province. In the Legislature he was by no means a silent member, and perhaps Dundas and the Eastern Counties never had a more vigilant champion of their interests. The appointment will have the hearty sanction of Conservatives and Liberals alike, and will afford an additional guarantee of the efficient, economical and humane working of the Provincial institutions over which he will exercise official control. The Government's management of these institutions has always been one of its best titles to the confidence and support of the community.
