PARTICULARS OF THE BURNING OF THE SHIP LODIANA.

A New York special to the Boston Times on Monday gives the following particulars of the loss of the big Windsor ship: The Wilson line steamer Egyptian Monarch arrived from London to-day, after a tempestuous voyage, bringing news of the burning at sea of the oil-laden bark Lodiana, which left this port on Jan. 10 for Liverpool.

As the steamer approached, those on board the doomed craft could be seen moving hither and thither as if in wild confusion. Flames leaped from the aft and mounted to the topmast rigging with amazing rapidity.

The doomed couple were the captain of the burning vessel and his wife. The crew had taken their choice between dying by fire or water, and had leaped overboard and been swept away.
