THE YOUNG ADVOCATE

ANTOINE DE CHAULIEU was the son of a poor gentleman of Normandy, with a long genealogy, a short rent-roll, and a large family. Jacques Rollet was a son of a brewer, who did not know who his grandfather was; but he had a long purse and only two children. As these youths flourished in the early days of liberty, equality, and fraternity, and were near neighbors, they naturally hated each other. Their enmity commenced at school, where the delicate and refined De Chaulieu, being the only gentleman among the scholars, was the favorite of the master, (who was a bit of an aristocrat in his heart) although he was about the worst dressed boy in the establishment, and never had a sou to spend; while Jacques Rollet, sturdy and rough, with smart clothes and plenty of money, got flogged six days in the week, ostensibly for being stupid and not learning his lessons,—which, indeed, he did not,—but, in reality, for constantly quarrelling with and insulting De Chaulieu, who had not strength to cope with him. When they left the academy, the feud continued in all its vigor, and was fostered by a thousand little circumstances arising out of the state of the times, till a separation ensued in consequence of an aunt of Antoine de Chaulieu's undertaking the expense of sending him to Paris to study the law, and of maintaining him there during the necessary period.

With the progress of events came some degree of reaction in favor of birth and nobility, and then Antoine, who had passed for the bar, began to hold up his head and endeavored to push his fortunes; but fate seemed against him. He felt certain that if he possessed any gift in the world it was that of eloquence, but he could get no cause to plead; and his aunt dying inopportunely, first his resources failed, and then his health. He had no sooner returned to his home, than, to complicate his difficulties completely, he fell in love with Mademoiselle Natalie de Bellefonds, who had just returned from Paris, where she had been completing her education. To expatiate on the perfections of Mademoiselle Natalie would be a waste of ink and paper; it is sufficient to say that she really was a very charming girl, with a fortune which, though not large, would have been a most desirable acquisition to De Chaulieu, who had nothing. Neither was the fair Natalie indisposed to listen to his addresses; but her father could not be expected to countenance the suit of a gentleman, however well born, who had not a ten sous piece in the world, and whose prospects were a blank.

While the ambitious and lovesick young barrister was thus pining in unwelcome obscurity, his old acquaintance, Jacques Rollet, had been acquiring an undesirable notoriety. There was nothing really bad in Jacques' disposition, but having been bred up a democrat, with a hatred of the nobility, he could not easily accommodate his rough humor to treat them with civility when it was no longer safe to insult them. had led him into many scrapes, out of which his father's money had one way or the other released him; but that source of safety had now failed. Old Rollet, having been too busy with the affairs of the nation to attend to his business, had died insolvent, leaving his son with nothing but his own wits to help him out of the future difficulties, and it was not long before their service was called for. Claudine Rollet, his sister, who was a very pretty girl, had attracted the attention of Mademoiselle de Bellefonds' brother, Alphonse; and as he paid her attention than from such a quarter was agreeable to Jacques, the young men had more than one quarrel on the subject, on which occasions they had each, characteristically, given vent to their enmity, the one in contemptuous monosyllables, and the other in a volley of insulting words. But Claudine had another lover more nearly of her own condition in life; this was Claperton, the deputy governor of the Rouen jail, with whom she made acquaintance during one of the two compulsory visits paid by her brother to that functionary; but Claudine, who was a bit of a coquette, though she did not altogether reject his suit, gave him little encouragement, so that betwixt hopes and fears and doubts, and jealousies, poor Claperton led a very uneasy kind of life.

Affairs had been for some time in this position, when one fine morning, Alphonse de Bellefonds was not to be found in his chamber when his servant went to call him; neither had his bed been slept in. He had been observed to go out rather late on the preceding evening but whether or not he had returned, nobody could tell. He had not appeared at supper, but

or prove an unexceptionable ally. The evidence against Jacques, it is true, was altogether presumptive; there was no proof whatever that he had committed the crime; and for his own part he stoutly denied it. But Antoine de Chaulieu entertained no doubt of his guilt, and his speech was certainly well calculated to carry conviction into the bosom of others. It was of the highest importance to his own reputation that he should procure a verdict, and he confidently assumed the afflicted and enraged family of the victim that their vengeance should be satisfied. Under these circumstances could anything be more unwelcome than a piece of intelligence that was privately conveyed to him late on the evening before the trial was to come on, which tended strongly to exculpate the prisoner, without indicating any other person as the criminal? Here was an opportunity lost. The first step of the ladder on which he was to rise to fame, and a wife, was slipping from under his feet!

Of course, so interesting a trial was anticipated with great eagerness by the public, and the court was crowded with all the beauty and fashion of Rouen. Though Jacques Rollet persisted in asserting his innocence, founding his defence chiefly on the circumstances which were strongly corroborated by the information that had reached De Chaulieu the preceding evening, he was convicted.
In spite of the very strong doubts a private entertained respecting the justice of the verdict, even De Chaulieu himself, in the first flush of success, amid a crowd of congratulating friends, and the approving smiles of his mistress, felt gratified and happy; his speech had, for the time being, not only convinced others, but himself; warmed with his own eloquence, he believed what he said. But when the glow was over, and he found himself alone, he did not feel so comfortable. A latent doubt of Rollet's guilt no burned strongly in his mind, and he felt that the blood of the innocent would be on his head. It is true there was yet time to save the life of the prisoner; but to admit acquiescence was to take the glory out of his own speech, and turn the sting of his argument against himself. Besides, if he produced the witness who had secretly given him the information, he should be self-condemned, for he could not conceal that he had been aware of the circumstances before the trial.

Matters having gone so far, therefore, it was necessary that Jacques Rollet should die; so the affair took its course; and early one morning the guillotine was erected in the court yard of the jail, three criminals ascended the scaffold, and three heads fell into the basket, with the winks that had been attached to them, buried in a corner of the cemetery.

Antoine de Chaulieu was now fairly started in his career, and his success was as rapid as the first step towards it had been tardy. He took a pretty apartment in the Hotel de Marboeuf, Rue Grange-Bateliere, and in a short time was looked upon as one of the most rising young advocates in Paris. His success in one line brought him success in another; he was soon a favorite in society, and an object of interest to speculating others; but his affections still adhered to his old love, Natalie de Bellefonds, whose family now gave their assent to the match—at least, prospectively—a circumstance which furnished such an additional incentive to his exertions, that in about two years from the date of his brilliant speech, he was in a sufficiently flourishing condition to offer the young lady a suitable home.

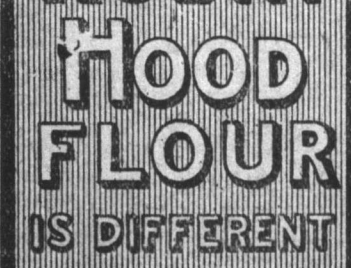



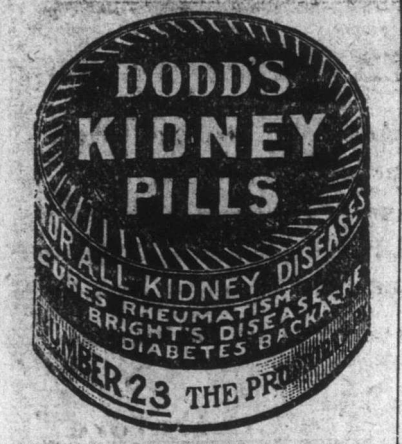

Providing For Further Development.

In the Prospectus issued in London recently in which £500,000 five per cent debenture stock were offered for sale at par on behalf of the Anglo-Newfoundland Development scheme some data of interest with regard to the work of the Company in Newfoundland are given.

The directors of the Company are J. M. Beston, Esq., President, Lord Northcliffe, Sir Harold Harmsworth, Bart., Kennedy Jones, Esq. They give the authorized capital at \$7,000,000, of which \$5,702,815 has been subscribed for in cash and fully paid. The assets last August they value at £1,315,821.

They state that practically the whole output of paper at Grand Falls is being sold to the Daily Mail, Evening News, Daily Mirror, Weekly Dispatch and Glasgow Daily Record, under contract at current market prices. They anticipate that soon after June next the output of paper will have reached its maximum on the present installation, and that the requirements of the above-mentioned newspapers alone will be sufficient to absorb this output. It will then become necessary to install further paper machines as required, the cost of which is intended shall be provided out of part of the proceeds of the present debenture issue.

MILL OUTPUT.—The output capacity of the mills at Grand Falls as now developed and equipped is as follows: Ground Wood Mill: 360 tons (of 2,000 lbs.) per day Mechanical Pulp (moist weight). Sulphite Mills: 60 tons (of 2,000 lbs.) per day Sulphite Pulp. Paper Mill: 120 tons (of 2,000 lbs.) per day Finished Paper.

Provision has been made on the site for an extension of the Paper Mill which will double its present output capacity.

On this basis the market value of the output would be over £200,000 a year.

The Company has expended about \$500,000 on mining operations. The Mineral rights over the Company's lands have been granted to a subsidiary company, 90 per cent of whose capital the Company owns. Considerable prospecting has been done and already a zinc lead deposit of importance has been opened up.

POLICE COURT NEWS.

To-day's docket was a large one. Two drunks were discharged, and 4 others were each fined \$1, or 3 days. Five disorderlies were fined \$2, 7 days each and a fifth \$5, or 14 days. Geo. Neddell, the wrestler, was charged with disorderly conduct, the charge of drunkenness previously noted against him having been withdrawn. Miss Elizabeth Whitten who complained to the police Saturday night that she had followed her, was put in the witness box and stated that the man she believed was giving her attention which she did not desire, on one occasion spoke to her. The man denied any intention of persecuting Miss Whitten and said he took her to be a female friend and one of his own nationality. He was defended by Mr. W. J. Higgins, and the charge against him was dismissed.

Mr. W. K. Morrissey of H. M. Customs, summoned Capt. Winsor, for violating the act for the Preservation of Beavers. Complainant had found 22 beaver skins on board the craft owned by Capt. Winsor. An act of the Legislature passed in 1907 which prohibited the taking of these animals up to the 1st October 1910, and last season another Act was passed extending the time to October 31st, 1913. The Captain was at Labrador, and looked up the Year Book and found the close time in that to be October 1st, 1910. The book he referred to had been printed and published before the last session of the Legislature and the Captain knew nothing of the Act passed at the last session, extending the close time for 3 years more. Further he was out of the colony last winter while the Legislature was in session. The further hearing of the case was postponed until to-morrow. Mr. Squires for plaintiff, Blackwood for dett.

AGED RESIDENT DEAD.—Another aged resident of Torbay in the person of Mr. Denis Brien, passed over to the Great Beyond at 6 p.m. yesterday. Mr. Brien had reached the ripe age of 87 years and until recently was blessed with good health for one so old. He was well known and highly esteemed both in St. John's and all the eastern settlements.

He enters houses unceremoniously and importunes people for old coins mostly and is becoming such a nuisance that if he doesn't make himself scarce he will get into trouble.

HERRING FISHERY.—Sound land reports herring very plentiful today but weather stormy. Advice from Curling state that 29 American vessels arrived there to-date, and to-date 5 vessels have left Bonne Bay herring laden for Gloucester.

Nineteen Deaths in U. S. Football.

Nineteen deaths on the gridiron or from injuries received in the game is American football's toll this year. Appalling as is this number of fatalities it is only approximately one-half as large as that of a year ago, when 29, indicating that the new rules, while they have not entirely eliminated the dangerous features of football, have been successful in cutting down the number of fatal accidents.

Of the nineteen deaths reported to date, fourteen have occurred since the football season opened this fall. The other five were of players injured under the old rules. Over four hundred injuries were reported this year.

One reason for the number of fatal accidents may be guessed from the following from the "Sportsman's column" of the Boston Globe: "The statement in this column that the cardinal principle of Harvard coaching this fall was to keep out of practice and games any men who were in any way injured has led a correspondent to write as follows:—

"They had this rule as not followed in school games. In the English high-Somerville high game of last Saturday a boy was kept in the game for three periods with a broken collar bone. What is a coach for, if not to take care of those who are injured and save them for further use to themselves and to him."

Told by Tramway King

The late Sir John Clifton Robinson well merited the title of the "Tramway King." His whole life had been spent amid tramways since, as a boy, he assisted at the birth of the first British "road railway" at Birkenhead.

He had devised and controlled the tramway systems of many towns, both British and American, before he laid siege to London.

One of his best stories had an American city for a background. It was a city which imposed no regulations as to the number of passengers a car might carry, and a conductor was valued according to his capacity to load his car.

Scuttling a Dynamite Ship.

The dynamite laden Leith ketch Mystery, which was towed into Yarmouth damaged after a collision with a voyage from Antwerp to Leith, has been a source of some anxiety to the harbor authorities. She has 25 tons of dynamite in her hold packed round with sand, a quantity amply sufficient to wreck a town.

Two experts in explosives from the Home Office were sent to Leith, after examining the vessel where she lay, in a quiet part of the harbor. Instructions were given that the vessel should be towed to a safe distance out to sea and then blown up by means of current conveyed through a cable, or else that it should be scuttled. It is probable that the ship will be scuttled in deep water.

At the R. C. Cathedral.

RI. Monsignor Roche preached at the Cathedral last night an excellent sermon, taking his text from the Epistle of St. Paul to the Romans—"Put on the armor of light. . . and put ye on the Lord Jesus." The discourse was adapted to the beginning of Advent. The Monsignor in dealing with the subject gave a very clear exposition of the Modernist doctrine. There was a large congregation and the sermon was deeply impressive.

Searching for Bodies.

Thursday last eight men went out from North Harbor, St. Mary's Bay, in search of the bodies of the poor fellows lost in the schr. Golden Arrow on the Nancy Can Shoal. The men remained at the task until Friday evening, but returned unsuccessful. It is believed the bodies have been either dashed to pieces by the sea or have been swept away from the neighborhood. The searchers jiggled from the bottom near the wreck a lot of underclothing and some oil clothing, and those were identified by the relatives of the drowned men. The hull is pretty well broken up.

About this time last year captain struck in at different places in Harbor Main District, and the incident was regarded to be an unprecedented one. Thursday last these little fish again appeared in large quantities at Conception Harbor, Avondale and Harbor Main, and were rolling on the beach until Saturday, when they began to leave. The people have had them for their meals regularly since they struck in.

The Guards' Parade.

The Methodist Guards paraded to Divine Service at Wesley Church yesterday forenoon and were commanded by Lieut.-Col. Pitts and Major Hutchings. Though the weather was unfavourable there was a good muster of the lads who presented a fine appearance, and the parade was enlivened by the strains of martial music from their excellent band. Rev. J. K. Curtis occupied the pulpit in the Church and preached an eloquent sermon.

The Hawk's Voyage.

The whaler Hawk which has been operating at Cape Charles, we learn by the Prospero, took only 38 fish this year which is not at all up to last year when she had 54. The last whale taken by the ship was delayed at Hawk's Harbor for 18 days owing to bad weather. It was a fine sulphur bottom. The Port Saunders was also given up the voyage. She operated for the most of the season at Harbor Grace and took 35 fish most of which she took in Conception Bay after she came up from the straits of Belle Isle.

Terrible Fatality.

21 GIRLS BURNED ALIVE OR DASHED TO DEATH—IN UNDER CARE OF SURGEONS.

Newark, N.J., Nov. 26. In twenty minutes 21 girls were burned alive this morning or crushed to death on the pavement by leaping from the windows and fire escapes of the four-story brick factory on Orange and High Streets here. The last counting shows that 16 of the 21 bodies recovered have been identified at the depot. Six girls are still missing. They may be among the unidentified dead or may be in the ruins. The collapse of a wall to-night interrupted further search. Fifty were taken to hospitals of which two may die. Among the injured is Jessie Sloan, a fire chief, who was overtaken by the falling wall and buried in brick and rubbish. He is badly hurt, but may recover. The rush of the flames was so incredibly swift and put such unremitting terror in the huddled working girls on the top floor that the body of one was still found seated on a chair stool beside the machine at which she had been busy when the first cry of "fire" petrified her with fright. "Terrible as it must have been what went on in the smoke of the crowded upper floor, what befell those outside in the sunlight was more horrible yet. The building was very inflammable and the first gush of flames cut off all possibility of escape. The elevator made one trip but never came back. The only exit was by two narrow fire escapes, the lower platforms of which were 20 feet from the street. On the overcrowded and steep ladders, scorched, dancing hot by the jets from lower windows, pressed forward a mob of women, blind with the panic, driven by the fire and the others behind them. A net had been arranged beneath the windows and girls began to jump "like rats out of a burning bin," was the way a fireman described that pell-mell descent. They poured out of the windows, fell upon the heads of those below them, and cascaded off the fire escape to the pavement, 90 feet below. Some of them stood in the windows, outlined amongst the flames, and jumped clear of the landing; still others from the steps, where they stood. The air was full of them and they fell everywhere into the net, on the necks of firemen, and 15 of them on stone slabs. When the awful rain ceased there were 8 dead in the street and the gutters ran red. Seven were so badly crushed that they died in hospitals. Fifty are still under surgeons' care.

Balfour's Address

LONDON, Nov. 26. The election address of Arthur Balfour, leader of the Opposition in the House of Commons, is a brief document. It declares that the Unionist programme in legislation is practically the same as at the general election, and asserts that behind the single chamber of conspiracy lurks Socialism and Home Rule. "It is believed both Nationalists and Socialists are aware that their daring projects are not in harmony with the considered will of the people," says Mr. Balfour, "and they prefer the abolition of the only constitutional safeguards which at critical moments will enable that will to prevail." The Opposition leader also alludes with the greatest brevity to the alternative scheme for the reform of the House of Lords which Lord Lansdowne proposed.

HEALTH AND INCOME.

Lord's Day Alliance.

The most successful meeting ever held in this city by the supporters of the Lord's Day Alliance, was that which took place at the British Hall last evening. The Lord Bishop presided, and the meeting opened with a hymn to which the accompaniments were played by the orchestra of the Cathedral's Men's Bible Class. In his excellent address the Lord Bishop laid down three principles:—(1) One day in seven should be set apart for Christian worship; (2) The first of the week is a witness to the truth of Christianity; (3) The Sabbath was made for man. The Sabbath should be a day of rest, a day of recreation, a day which should be made enjoyable to others, and a day for public worship. Wholesome and innocent recreation was good, but it should not interfere with public worship, it should not leave men unfit physically for the work of the week. Mr. Edwin Murray was the second speaker. He spoke on the aims of the Association and said the principal object was to prevent encroachments of labor on the Sabbath rest. If necessary he hoped that people would flock to the defence of that principle. Mr. H. E. Cowan, the third speaker, referred to the fact that when the Allan steamers arrive here on Sunday no work in the way of discharging them is done. He hoped the same would soon be said of all the Coastal steamers. Rev. J. W. Bartlett spoke of the Sabbath as the bulwark of the Church, and attributed the decay of France to the non-observance of the Sabbath. After a vote of thanks to the Chairman, and the Doxology, a business session was held at which reports were read and the following officers elected:—Hon. President, The Lord Bishop of Newfoundland; President, Rev. L. Curtis, D. D.; Secretary, Mr. C. S. Pilsent.

DIED FROM INJURIES.—The little girl Bertha Atwood, who was so badly scalded Friday at her residence, Cook Street, as reported in Saturday's Telegram, died of her injuries Saturday afternoon. The child's remains were brought home from the Hospital Saturday afternoon and were interred to-day.

CLOTHES THIEVES AROUND.—Last week clothing was stolen from clothes lines on Cornwall Avenue on different nights and late at night. Thursday and Friday suspicious looking men were seen round there. These are believed to be the parties who stole the clothes, and if they appear again their names will be secured for the police.

GARDEN THIEVES ABOUT.—Friday night late or early Saturday morning some thief visited ex-Const. P. Hanrahan's garden, at the rear of his residence on Barter's Hill, and stole several dozen of cabbage of a fine quality which he had raised there. They tore out the pickets to give them egress from the place with their booty. They also broke into a cellar owned by Mrs. St. Clair and stole several articles.

Pleasant Sunday.

At the regular meeting of the P. S. A., held last evening, Mr. Soper delivered a lecture on "Life" which was enlightening and inspiring. With regard to the oft-repeated question: "Is Life Worth Living?" he said that the answer depended on the person and the life that was being lived. Some lives to which he referred were not worth living. To some life was a great job, to others a burden, but could be made a blessing to all if they only tried to make the best of life. Referring to the life of St. Paul the speaker alluded to the great suffering that he had undergone both by sea and land, and throughout all these tribulations kept his trust in God and looked forward with confidence to being crowned in glory.

Partridge Plentiful.

Messrs. Wesley March and Wilfred and Vater Pippy, who were out shooting on the Gaff Topsails since Thursday last, arrived here by to-day's express, each having secured his complement of deer. Others who arrived by the freight train last night and also did well with the deer say that partridge are very plentiful in that section of the country and thousands can be seen in many coveys. They were never so plentiful on the Topsails before, but it is a pity to see them killed as they are, indiscriminately. So many are slaughtered that they cannot be consumed by those who kill them and are thrown in the woods to rot. Passengers who arrived by the Bruce express Saturday say that recently three men killed over 200 brace in a day, and most of these were thrown away as those who shot them had not the means to transport them here. Many deer are also killed for the heads and choice cuts, and the rest of the meat is allowed to remain on the marshes and barrens. Such excellent meat should not be thus wasted.

Yesterday's Collection.

The annual collection for the Christian Brothers, taken up at the Cathedral, St. Patrick's, St. Joseph's, Mr. Cashel and Kilbride, brought in a total of \$3,549.35, the largest collection ever made for this purpose, being \$156.35 more than that taken last year. Some other amounts that are expected to come in will probably bring the total up to \$3,650. At noon the collectors went to Mt. St. Francis and handed the money over to Rev. Bro. Kennedy, the Superior of the Order, who thanked the public for their generous response. Speeches on matters appertaining to education were made by the Premier, Hon. J. D. Ryan, E. M. Jackman and J. President Gompers Would Keep Labor Unions for Whites.

St. Louis, Mo., Nov. 18.—President Gompers, in his speech at the Federation of Labor banquet last night, advocated the elimination of negroes from the labor unions of America. He said the supremacy of the Caucasian race in unions should be maintained. "There are eight million negroes in the United States," said Mr. Gompers, "and to my mind they cannot all be expected to understand the philosophy of human rights. I do not believe they should be permitted to join our unions, lacking as they do for the most part the very necessary knowledge of what our unions really stand for in the economic world."

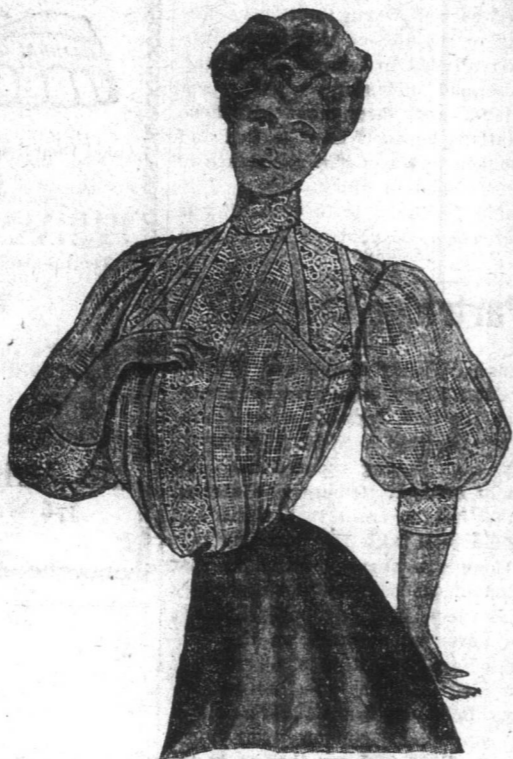

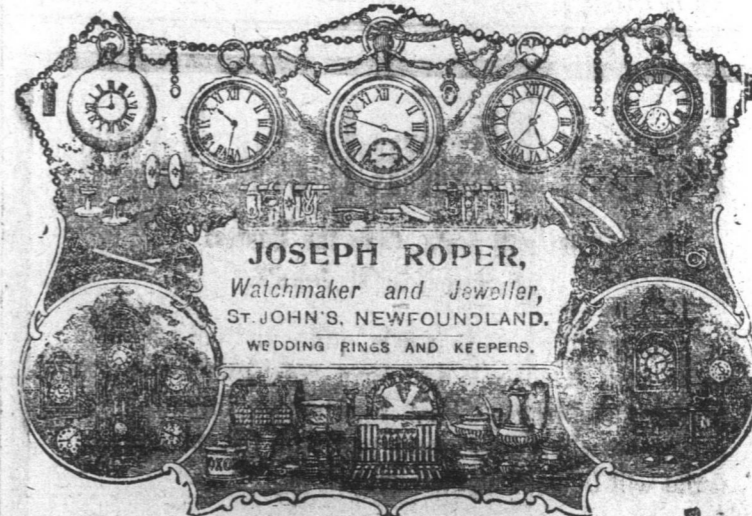
