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

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



A couple of days later a conflict was begun that continued for twenty vears, during which time more than 500,000 lives were sacrificed. Such a calamity was surely unnecessary for so naltry a cause and the same re mark is equally applicable to other wars.

In 1879 the Transvaal was declared crown colony, and the salaries of officials, both Dutch and British, were cut down. Among the number so reated was a certain Paul Kruger whose salary was reduced by £50 per annum. The loss of the mone annoyed the Dutchman, who raised he standard of revolt. As a conse wence there followed the Majuba Hill fight, years of agitation, the Jameson raid and finally the great war which cost Britain £220,000,000 and the lives of 25,000 of her sons.

But the most curious war ever wag d over a little matter occurred in the sixteenth century. It was carried on single handed for about six years be ween a bankrupt grocer of Berlin and the elector of Saxony. The im nediate cause of the quarrel was the rresting of two of the tradesmen's norses in the elector's territory, he peing a subject of the elector of Brandenburg.

Failing to get redress, he adopted what was then a perfectly legal exedient and declared formal war on the realm of Saxony. The declaration was accepted in due form, and the war began. The grocer burned farms and even villages, employed mercenaries after the fashion of the times and made himself the terror of



SIR ROBERT BOND,—In the statement made by the Minister of Finance on Tuesday last, when tabling the Estimates, we were told that the grand total of the Estimates is Three milition four hundred and ninety-three thousand, nine hundred and thirty-nine dollars and five cents, as compared with \$3.327.442.20 for the previous year, which means that the Estimates for the next fiscal year 1912-13 is One hundred and sixty-six thous-Illiates for the next usual year 1912-13 is One hundred and sixty-six thous-and, four hundred and ninety-six dol-lars and eighty-five cents in excess of the former Estimated Expenditure. The total Estimate was designated by the Minister as a grand one. I do not see anything grand about it. The world grand means magnifecent illusto not require special analysis at this time. A Prehistoric Skeleton.

The London journals devote a grea deal of space to the description of the human skeleton found recently near Ipswich, beneath an undisturbed layer of chalky boulder clay. The bones were so fragile and disintegrated that it was found impossible to remove them. The stratum containing them

cut out in blocks, these being forwarded to the Museum of the Royal College of Surgeons to be examined by Professor Keith. He found it neces sary to impregnate the blocks with gelatine, and then slowly clean away the surrounding matrix, leaving each bone embedded on the surface of its block. Only the more dense part of the bones were preserved. Fortunately the skull had become by means pletely filled with the boulder clay, of a mileage book and thus an almost complete brain cast was preserved. When the various blocks were placed together it was seen that the skeleton rested on the right side, with the legs folded up on the body, and with the arms fixed. The posture was not unlike the one Neolithic times. The parts preserved ndicated a tall man of about five feet en inches. The jaws were lost, but the isolated teeth were small, much worn, and not differing materially from those of modern man and very inlike the teeth of Neanderthal man. The skull was small, especially for a respect showing features recalling Neanderthal man. The thigh bones, the bones of the forearms and hands, were absolutely the same as in modern Englishmen. The peculiar feature distinguishing this skeleton from culiar form of the leg bones-the tibia and fibula. This has not been explained, but probably indicates the nanner the legs were used in walk-




