

The Curse of Alcohol.

A memorial which has been organ-  
ized by the "Strength of Britain"  
movement, demanding the suspension  
of liquor traffic during the war, is to  
be presented to the Government. It is  
supported by public men and women  
outside the Temperance movement  
and makes its appeal on the grounds  
of national duty to our Allies, to the  
Army and the Fleet, and of conserva-  
ing the full strength of the nation, and  
gives the following particulars con-  
cerning alcohol:—  
It hinders the Army; it is the cause  
of grave delay with munitions; it  
keeps thousands of men from war  
work every day, and makes good,  
sober workmen second rate. It hin-  
ders the Navy; it delays transports,  
places them at the mercy of subma-  
rines, slows down repairs, and con-  
gests the docks. It threatens our  
mercantile marine; it has absorbed  
during the war between sixty and  
seventy million cubic feet of space,  
and it retards the building of ships to  
replace our losses. It destroys our  
food supplies; in twenty months of  
war it consumed over 2,500,000 tons  
of food, with sugar enough to last the  
nation eighty days. It uses up more  
sugar than the Army. It wastes our  
financial strength; in the first twenty  
months of war our people spent on  
alcohol £200,000,000. It diverts the  
nation's strength; it uses up 500,000  
workers, 1,000,000 acres of land, and  
1,500,000 tons of coal a year; and in  
twenty months of war it has involved  
the lifting and handling on road and  
rail of a weight equal to 50,000,000  
tons. It shatters our moral strength;  
its temptations to women involve  
grave danger to children and anxiety  
to thousands of soldiers.

### The Municipal System.

In view of the healthy interest that was manifested in the Municipal Elections last June and of the great general improvement in our civic affairs, it is a little strange that the election, or referendum, of next week should approach us so shyly and with so apologetic a manner as it has. We must obtrude it upon us at all. Most of the discussion it has evoked seems to have concerned itself mostly with the fixing of the responsibility for its being held at such a time and for the expense necessarily involved. The merits of the question to be decided have received scant notice. This is a pity, for the question is an important one, even more important, it may be, than that of the fitness of John Doe and Richard Roe to hold office.

We are pleased to note that such opinion as we have heard or seen expressed is greatly in favour of a change to the ward system. From almost every point of view the change would seem to be desirable. The most important advantage that it would import, sufficient of itself to justify it, would be the individual responsibility of Councillors for their districts and the proper "representation" of every part of the town on the City Board. If the adoption of the Ward system follow from the election, it will remain for the Legislature to put it into effect in all its necessary details. We trust that an effort will then be made to imitate the method used in so many cities where the ward system obtains, whereby the elections for the respective wards are not held simultaneously but in a certain succession, so that a proportion of the board consists always of councillors who have had some experience in the work. A great defect of our present system exists in the possibility of a whole board of new candidates being preferred by popular caprice to men who, whatever their ability, have at least the experience of office to commend them. Where trained experts are unavailable, and the affairs of the city are in the hands of amateurs, as is the case with us, the system of rotation is, we think, greatly to be preferred. We trust that it will at any rate be given consideration at the proper time.

### Old Time Sealer Here Again.

S. S. THETIS BOUGHT BY JOB BROS. & CO.

The S. S. Thetis, Capt. Faulke, arrived here this morning from New York, after a run of five days and a half. The ship was purchased by Job Bros. & Co. to be used principally as a seal hunter. The Thetis is an strange vessel, many old-timers will remember when she prosecuted the Newfoundland seal-fishery some thirty odd years ago and will find success in 1881 and 1882 she was at the ice in charge of Capt. Charles Dave and in 1883 was commanded by Capt. Fairweather. The same year she was sold to the American Government by her then owners, the Dundee Whaling Company and ever since the Pennamut South America on Customs Protection Service, her port of report being San Francisco. Negotiations for the purchase of the Thetis close at hand between the American Government and her present owners, from Frisco she will take part in the Panama and New York and called at a couple of places to bunker en route.

The Thetis is forty years old and 490 tons net. She will take part in next spring's sealing voyage, but it is not yet decided whether she will go on the back of the country to hunt. Capt. George Barbour will likely go in command.

We congratulate the Job firm on their enterprise and their most abundant success with the Thetis.

### The Scroll of Fame.

Nor was war necessary to remind us that Britons were the same the world over; that, given the opportunity, deeds of courage and grit could be relied upon from every part of the Empire. But as the association of special feats with certain fighting units has become a feature of the campaign, of interest to watch how all the Overseas contingents in turn contrive to weave laurels for themselves. What Anzac will mean to Australians and New Zealanders, and Ypres to the Canadians, Delville Wood will be to the South Africans and Beaumont to the Newfoundlanders. The gallant Delville Wood has been termed one of the most heroic defences known in the history of the war. The South Africans were ordered to take and hold the wood at all costs. They took it. "For three days (July 15-18) they were subjected to continuous bombardment by guns of all calibres. They held on with very little food or water. Over and over again they were attacked by overwhelming enemy forces. The gallant fellows fell fast under the terrific bombardment and attacks, but not a man wavered. Finding them immovable the Germans, after their concentrated a terrible bombardment for seven hours on what was left of these splendid men, and then about 5 o'clock P.M. launched an attack by three regiments on the survivors.

They died, our noble South Africans, but they held their ground. No less than thirty-seven officers, of whom three were Fellows of the Institute, were killed or died of wounds. The Newfoundlanders had already been marked in Gallipoli. On July 1, the battalion bore the brunt in the opening of the British offensive, but before they could reach the enemy's position, hidden machine guns and the spreading shrapnel had taken such deadly toll that the battalion was a broken unit. They struggled on, but there was no fault that they did not win through. Out of 800 men who went into action only sixty-eight came out safe and sound. Newfoundland has every reason to be proud of her sons, and not least of all because she knows that, though the first battalion has practically ceased to exist, she has another ready to take its place, and a third in training in Newfoundland — United Empire Magazine Sept.

### Our City Fathers Again in Session

Councillor Dr. Tait Repeatedly Charge About "Hoppers" and Says They Are Not the Cause of Diphtheria Outbreak.

Mayor Gosling presided at, and all the other members attended, last night's meeting of the Municipal Board.

It was ordered that Inspector Rooney find out whose house was connected and whose was not connected with sewer on Pennywell Road, with a view to putting a stop to the dirty drains, previously complained of by residents of that thoroughfare.

Councillor Mullaly asked what had transpired in connection with the ship case incident. The Colonial Secretary had been written a fortnight ago on the matter, but had not replied. He will be asked to acknowledge the Council's interest in the case to the bitter end.

The same Councillor also asked what was done in the much agitated Parsons case.

The Mayor replied that Parsons had asked for a writ of mandamus from the Supreme Court. Council's solicitor has been instructed to defend the case to the bitter end.

Mr. H. D. Reid, Vice-President Reid Nfld. Co., wrote disclaiming liability for the back of the country to hunt. Capt. George Barbour will likely go in command.

T. J. Allen said he did not object now to making sewerage connection, though he was flooded with sewer gas during a storm. Engineer will report.

Messrs. James Carter and E. R. Burgess complained of the noise and condition of the street close by the Balsam House on Barnes Road, also complained about a "hopper" in Barnes Place. It was ordered to repair road and the Sanitary Supervisor was instructed to report on the use of the "hopper".

On complaint of Councillor Tait the agents or owners of a house in Hagerly's Lane will be asked by Engineer Ryan to make house fit for human habitation.

J. Weeks, Hamilton Avenue, reported a shortage of water in that locality and asked for a fountain to be placed there.

The Mayor said it was the old story of "scoping" the water rates, being allowed to build where they should not. Mr. Weeks will be written that the main will be extended as soon as possible to allow him to connect, but Council cannot do anything at present.

F. Brien, Lime Street, asked to have a "ped" door removed, as it was unsightly and not giving satisfaction. Engineer will report.

W. H. Mott, Market Street, asked to have a grating near his house removed, as people were throwing filth in it. It will be removed and a night car will visit the place in future.

J. Rossley asked leave to build additions to his house in Hutchings Street. The Council has no authority to grant permission, as it is contrary to the Act to build within the fire zone, being less than 200 feet from the north line of Water Street.

Mrs. Alice Lawlor offered house at the corner of Theatre and Carrier's Hill to the city for \$4,000. The Council is not in a position just now to buy, but owner can make repairs, if allowed.

E. J. Cousins, South Side Road, asked permission to rebuild store. He must submit proper plans.

Driscoll, Driscoll, Port Rd.; Constable A. Greene, Parade Street and W. H. Mott, Charlton Street, asked permission to make additions and repairs to houses. Referred to Engineer.

P. C. O'Driscoll was awarded contract to supply 600 feet of pipe. His tender was the lowest.

Mr. C. J. Fox wrote on behalf of Mrs. D. Greene for permission to make repairs to house on Queen's Rd. Granted.

The Solicitor reported that regarding the case of W. Egan for compensation for injuries to his horse near Windsor Lake the Council was not liable.

The Sanitary Supervisor reported that the King's Bridge River and margin of Quidi Vidé Lake could be cleaned up for \$10. The matter was carried over to stand over.

The City Engineer reported that at 3 o'clock yesterday afternoon the Fire wip telephoned to the Water Department that the pressure dropped suddenly from 65 pounds to 20. The cause was a break in the main and use one hour and a half later a fire alarm rang in while repairs were being made to the pipe and the (The Engineer advised the Fire Companies, then at the scene of a fire on Freshwater Road, to use the water in the reservoir in that vicinity.

West End Road Inspector Bambrick complained of the side drains between Pennywell Road and Bonclody St. The sum of \$55, as estimated by the Inspector, was voted to make repairs.

Plumbing Inspector Donnelly reported that he had turned off the flow of water from the automatic tanks around town, as directed, but it was useless, as people tied stones, etc. on the handles and the waste continued.

Councillor Mullaly asked why the water was turned off from the city troughs.

The Mayor answered that there was no danger of horses drinking stagnant water if the drivers would take the trouble to get off their carts.

Councillor Tait upheld the Mayor, intimating that if the drivers were lazy they had themselves to blame.

Councillor Tait was then asked if the "hoppers" around town were the cause of so much diphtheria, which was still spreading in the streets. He answered in the negative, and in support of his answer said that, as Dr. Brehm, City Health Officer, well knew, on streets where there were no "hoppers" diphtheria was most contagious and in places where there were several "hoppers" no contagion existed. Tait also took occasion to refute the charges made against him in the press. He had been accused of saying that "hoppers" were no good for the city. This he repudiated, and stated that he had previously ex-

pressed himself, and repeated it now, that the "hoppers," even though unsightly, were all right, but were abused. These receptacles were put in the streets for a decent purpose and were being used for indecent purposes. He also protested against the straining of night soil in these "hoppers." The practice was both unsanitary and inefficient.

The Health Officer reported six new cases of diphtheria and one of typhoid for the past week.

**THE GREEK PREMIER.**  
ATHENS, To-day. Premier Kalageropoulos, speaking a correspondent of the Associated Press with reference to a statement made by King Constantine recently to the Associated Press, in which the King outlined the reasons for his attitude in the war, said that nothing could be more unjust to King Constantine than the persistent assertion that he is pro-German. He is pro-Greek, only pro-Greek. He is the last man in Greece to be influenced in his motive by any prejudice or ready-made opinion whatever of the delicate situation created by the Entente Powers' failure to recognize the present Cabinet. The Premier said the Cabinet is political only in the sense that we do not seek to escape responsibility for our acts; in every other sense we take office under the conditions under which the previous ministry operated, that of the most benevolent

**GREEK STEAMER SUNK.**  
LONDON, To-day. The Greek steamer Assinac was sunk on Sept. 11th; Lloyds report the crew landed.

**SITUATION UNCHANGED.**  
LONDON, To-day. The general situation is unchanged, says an official statement from British headquarters in France, issued to-night. Enemy bombing attacks in the neighborhood of Flors failed. A hostile kite balloon was brought down in flames to-day; one of our aeroplanes is missing.

**ROUMANIANS CLAIM VICTORY IN DOBRUDJA.**  
BUCHAREST, To-day. An official from headquarters issued to-day reads: On the N. and N.W. fronts fighting continues at Mount Caliman and Churgill where we took 137 prisoners and also machine guns. In the valley of Jgu we repulsed an enemy attack. On the southern front an artillery duel occurred between the batteries of Zonia and Sistor. The Dobrudja battle which began on the 15th ended on Wednesday the 20th with the defeat of the enemy, composed of German, Bulgarian and Turkish troops, who retired southward, burning villages in their retreat.

**GREAT ROUMANIAN VICTORY.**  
LONDON, To-day. The latest official statement from Bucharest confirms the Entente report that the great battle of Dobrudja ended in defeat for the Central Powers after six days fighting. The battle was begun last Friday with a gradually increasing scope and intensity until on Tuesday evening, with the result that on Wednesday the Germans, Bulgarians and Turks were crushed and forced to withdraw, burning villages in their line of retreat in an effort to retard their pursuers. The same official referred to a Transylvania force that entered Ordeal, known better as Sekir-Udvarhely, 50 miles northwest of Kronstadt. One fourth of Transylvania is now in Rumanian hands.

**PRINCE GEORGE ENTERS OSBOURNE.**  
LONDON, To-day. The King's fourth son, Prince George, began yesterday his term as Cadet in the Royal Naval College at Osborne. Prince George is 14 years of age.

**LONDON BUDGET.**  
LONDON, To-day. With September rain still impeding operations on the front in France, the interest in the weekly budget has been transferred to the Russian, Rumanian and Macedonian theatres, where violent fighting is in progress. Probably the most sanguinary encounters have taken place along the 13 mile battle line in the region of Lutsk in Volhynia, where the Russians attacked repeatedly in mass formation, but only according to both Berlin and Vienna, to meet with repulse and heavy casualties. A battle is still raging in the region of Kerytriza and Svinulsky, North along the Stocked River the Germans has assumed the offensive against the Russians, but were everywhere repulsed, according to Petrograd. On the other hand attacks by the Russians against the Austro-Hungarians in the Marayavka River in the region of Galicia were put down by the defenders of the road to Lemberg. In

the Carpathians both Berlin and Vienna concede that the Teutonic lines east of Pantier ridge near Briza has been pushed back by the Russians, although both Berlin and Vienna record the occupation of heights on both sides of the Vaican Pass. Bucharest says that to the south of Petrezy, the Rumanians have stopped their retirement and are fortifying their positions. Stubborn fighting continues in Dobrudja where the Rumanians and Russians are holding strongly fortified positions against the armies of the Central Powers. In Macedonia on the extreme western wing the Entente forces have pushed their way three miles northwest of Pisodey. According to Paris hard fighting for the Kalkasalan Plateau on the Greek and Serbian frontier northwest of Voudana is in progress, but with neither side having been able to secure an advance.

Sofia says that near Florina counter attacks by the Entente have been repulsed with heavy casualties and the capture of prisoners, among them Russians and also machine guns. Except for the repulse by the Italians of an Austrian Dobruja district of Villamedia on the Carso front, there have been only bombardments in this region. Thursday on the front in France was without any noteworthy incident. A revolutionary and provisional Government has been set up on the island of Crete, according to official advice, which add that a committee of revolutionists is being sent to Salonika. Former Premier Vezizelos, while declining to say whether he proposes going to Salonika at the head of the movement said that if the King would not hear the voice of the people, the people themselves would advise what is best to do.

The German, Bulgarian and Turkish troops under Field Marshal Von Mackenzon have been defeated in the Rumanian Province of Dobrudja, according to an official from Bucharest. It is declared that the French retired south, burning villages in their retreat. A great battle which was the climax of Von Mackenzon's swift campaign in the Dobrudja district immediately after the declaration of war by Rumania began on Sept. 15th, ended, says the Rumanian headquarters, on the 20th. With reference to these operations, Berlin merely says the fighting in Dobrudja had come to a standstill. Rumanians, Russians and Serbians were pitted against the invaders, strong reinforcements having been hurled to Dobrudja when the operation under the German Field-Marshal threatened to overwhelm this section of Rumania. A strong line to the north was hastily fortified, and powerful forces were opposed to the onslaughts of the Central Powers. That the six days battle has been a sanguinary one is indicated by the various official statements, which told of the intensity of the fighting has continued without cessation.

**STRONG GERMAN ATTACKS.**  
PARIS, To-day. The attacks of the Germans, made in strong force, were centered on the French positions between Lepriez farm and Rancourt.

**FRENCH AND SERBS ADVANCE IN MACEDONIA.**  
PARIS, To-day. The French and Serbian troops advancing along the Western end of the Macedonian front have scored new successes against the Bulgarians, the war office announced to-day. Serbian troops continuing their advance along Brody River have reached the neighborhood of Ciribana where one hundred prisoners were taken. North of Florina Bulgarian attacks were broken up by the fire of the French infantry. As a result of heavy engagements the Entente forces were able to make progress on the heights dominating the road from Florina to Poul.

**BRUSILOFF'S STEADY PRESSURE.**  
LONDON, To-day. A Petrograd dispatch to the Daily Chronicle dated Sept. 20 says: For the present Brusiloff's armies are maintaining a steady pressure on all parts of the southwestern front, more particularly in the neighborhood of Halicz, and in the difficult region of the wooded Carpathians to the border of Bukovina and Hungary. This insistent and broadly distributed pressure has the advantage of holding the Entente forces and preventing them concentrating their superior forces at any given point.

## Messages Received Previous to 9 A.M.

**GERMANS BEATEN BACK.**  
LONDON, Sept. 21. The Germans launched heavy counter attacks last night on British positions south of the Ancre on the Somme front, the war office announced this afternoon. New Zealanders, defending the attacked positions, beat back the Germans with severe losses to them.

**CANADIAN LOSSES ON THE SOMME.**  
OTTAWA, Sept. 21. The military department is informed that Canadian losses on the Somme number about four hundred killed, 1,200 wounded, and 300 missing. There are no official details.

**FRENCH BOMB HUN POSITIONS.**  
PARIS, Sept. 21. On the Somme front the French energetically bombarded German positions Thursday, according to official communications issued by the War Office to-night. Only intermittent bombardment occurred on the remainder of the front.

**CONNAUGHT FAREWELLS.**  
KINGSTON, Ont., Sept. 21. The Duke of Connaught paid a farewell visit to Barlefeld Camp to-day and inspected all the battalions. "This is my last inspection before leaving for England," he said to the men in khaki. "I hope I will meet you all over in France."

**CRETE REVOLUTION.**  
PARIS, Sept. 21. Revolution in the Greek island of Crete is reported in a despatch from Athens. The revolutionists are said to have proclaimed a Provisional Government.  
London.—The people of Crete are reported by the Athens correspondent of the Central News to have overthrown the authorities and disowned King Constantine. They are said to have decided to send a committee of revolutionists to Salonika.

**GENERAL LABOR STRIKE.**  
NEW YORK, Sept. 21. The threatened general labor strike in sympathy with the striking street car men will be called to-morrow. This was announced late to-day by Ernest Boehm, Secretary of the Central Federation Union.

**WEALTHY MERCHANT DEAD.**  
BOSTON, Sept. 21. Gaspare Di Cola, a wealthy importer and wholesale fruit dealer died to-day as a result of wounds inflicted by an unknown man who shot him five times near his home in Brooklyn, last night.

**CONSCRIPTION FOR AUSTRALIA.**  
NEW-YORK, Sept. 21. A News Agency despatch from Melbourne published the opinion that it is considered certain the conscription plebiscite bill will pass the Senate. Women's votes probably will decide whether the conscription measure, strongly advocated by Premier Hughes, will be approved by a referendum general; the belief is that it will. Thousands of women with relatives already at the front are certain to vote in approval of the motion. Conscription by Australia is the result of a strenuous campaign by Premier Hughes, an advocate of compulsory military service throughout the British Dominions.

**BRITISH INVENTIONS.**  
NEW YORK, Sept. 21. The British are manufacturing new inventions which would turn Krupp's green with envy, according to Benjamin Rand, of Harvard University, who returned from a visit to England to-day on the steamer Andania. Accorded privileges of inspection by the British Foreign Office Dr. Rand said he visited munition and ordnance factories, and saw some astounding inventions, but that he was pledged not to disclose their nature. He found among every class, he said, an intense determination to do all possible to win the war. In one factory he saw 7,000 women at work, uniformed in khaki. New factories were being built, he said, and existing ones constantly extended.

**AN ATTEMPT ON VENIZELOS.**  
NEW YORK, Sept. 21. The Journal has the following from Rome to-day: "Despatches received to-day from Salonika say that the German military attack at Athens organized a conspiracy to assassinate former Premier Venizelos, and that an attempt to end the life of the pro-Ally statesman was actually made. Friends of the former Premier succeeded in frustrating the plot. Advice from Salonika say that King Constantine's Palace at Tatol is now protected."

**TURKEY AND THE RED CROSS.**  
WASHINGTON, Sept. 21. Turkey has yielded to diplomatic negotiations for the extension of American Red Cross work in Ottoman territory beyond the present limited operations in the famine-stricken sectors of Syria.

**MOST IMPORTANT EVENT.**  
ATHENS, Sept. 21. Greek military officers regard the capture of the Karmakakala plateau by the Russo-Serbian troops as the most important military event in the Balkan campaign up to the present. The height, which is 7,300 feet above the level of the sea, lies in Serbian territory, and constitutes the western door post to Serbian Macedonia. Local Serbs are jubilant over its capture, which they consider rivals the mountain feats of the Italians.

**TURKISH TROOPS ON RIGA FRONT.**  
LONDON, Sept. 21. Turkish troops have appeared on the Riga front, says a Reuter despatch from Petrograd. They are led by German and Austrian officers, and their whole equipment is German. This is the first time the presence of Turkish troops so far north has been reported. Several weeks ago Turkish troops appeared in Galicia with Germans and Austro-Hungarians. Since that time they have taken part in much heavy fighting. Turkish troops also are aiding the Germans and Bulgarians in their advance into the Roumanian province of Dobruja.

**Everyday Etiquette.**

## Gives Up His Leg.

One of the Most Remarkable Surgical Operations on Record.

One of the most remarkable surgical operations on record is now being performed at the Grand Palais, Paris, the massive building usually used for the annual exhibition, but now transformed into a vast hospital. Here two soldiers lie side by side, bound together like Siamese twins, while a large portion of the leg of one of them is being slowly transferred into the leg of the other one. Noted surgeons are gathered about, watching the slow development, which they regard as marvellous both from the surgical standpoint as well as from the sentimental, in which one soldier is calmly giving day by day part of his body to a fellow soldier. The two men lie on their backs on a large operating table in one of the halls of the hospital. They lie in opposite directions, the head of one near the feet of the other, like the figures on playing cards. They are among the most seriously wounded of the younger class of soldiers, one 28 and the other 23 years old. The younger, Roussiot, was wounded in the leg at the battle of Morhange in the early days of the war. He was taken prisoner to Germany, where the surgeons say he did not receive intelligent attention. Brought back here it was necessary to perform a second operation to lengthen his leg 14 centimetres (about 5 1/2 inches). But after the operation was performed, there was still a lack of bony matter between the two portions of the broken femur.

The other soldier, Tillet, an artilleryman, was seriously wounded in the leg in the desperate fighting over Fort Douaumont. In a field operation his leg was amputated above the knee. Later it was found that a second operation was necessary in order to shorten the leg by some centimetres. It was at this point that the surgeons concluded that the soldier who needed the shorter leg, Tillet, was consulted by the chief surgeon, the operation of grafting was fully explained to him and it was made known also that he was rendering a service to a soldier comrade and to science. He did not hesitate, but gave his full consent.

Thereupon the operation began, and now, after some weeks, the two soldiers lie there on their backs, the right thigh of Roussiot against the left thigh of Tillet, bound together with the same surgical bandage so as to prevent the slightest shifting of the operated parts until the phenomena of transferring one leg to the other is accomplished.

At 4.40 o'clock yesterday afternoon an alarm from box 228 brought the East End and Central Fire Brigades to the residence of Mr. Edward O'Neal, Freshwater Road, where a fire broke out and destroyed his barn, situated about fifty feet to the rear of his home. How the fire originated is unknown, but it was first discovered by persons working in the adjoining field, who observed a thick volume of smoke pouring out of the west end of the building. An attempt was made to secure a bucket of water which would have been sufficient at the time to quench the blaze, but unfortunately the water was shut off, owing to the fact that the main pipe had broken and was being repaired. About 3 p.m. Supt. Dunn of the Central Fire Hall noticed the dial of the register that indicates the water pressure drop from 65 to 20 pounds per square inch, and immediately phoned the City Engineer. Mr. Ryan on investigating found a break in the main near Cook's Farm, and therewith ordered the supply to be shut off. A large number of men and appliances were rushed to the scene and for upwards of four hours worked at repairing the break. On arriving at the scene the firemen were helpless to save the building, but connected their hose with the reservoir at the junction of Pennywell and Freshwater Roads, from where a slight stream was played on the burning building. It had to be pumped by a small engine for over two hundred yards. By the time the flying embers, aided by a strong westerly wind, threatened the neighboring houses and actually caught fire to a pile of wood stacked in Mrs. Moore's house, 117 Freshwater Road, but this was quickly extinguished by the reserve firemen and volunteers, who lined the roofs of the nearby buildings and captured the flying sparks and prevented further damage. The firemen worked hard and by the aid of an iron hook and rope pulled down the burning sides of the barn and by six o'clock the 'all out' signal was sent in. The building contained thirteen tons of new hay, a square body wagon, two sets of harness, and several useful farming implements, all of which were destroyed by fire, with the exception of the wagon which was rescued in a damaged condition by Mr. Geo. Squires, of St. Philip's, who received several nasty burns in pulling out the vehicle. The damage is estimated to be about \$1,000, not a cent of which is covered by insurance. The loss to Mr. Neal, added to the fact that for the past two years he has been an invalid, is a severe one. A short while ago his brother, Mr. Arthur O'Neal, met with a serious loss when his residence was gutted and the contents destroyed, including a sum of money. About 10 p.m. a slight fire broke out in the smouldering hay which was checked by a stream from the chemical.

## Household Notes.

Sandpaper is a very good thing for removing rust from the kitchen range. Carrots and beets should be always cooked whole and then skinned and sliced. A coat of clear varnish is a good thing to give straw matting before it is laid. There is nothing more indigestible than bread that is not baked thoroughly. A soft-boiled egg should be put into boiling water and cooked three minutes. Buttonholes in heavy linen can be done easily with a fine crochet hook and thread. Chamois gloves are the most satisfactory glove to wear when doing household work. Every child should be taught to put away all his toys before going to bed at night. Lettuce leaves not sufficiently attractive for salad can be put into the pot of greens. An attractive way to serve left-over fish is to cream it, bake it and serve it in ramekins. Halibut is one of the most economical fish to purchase, because there is no waste or bones.
