



The Queen of Festivals.

Easter-literally, Spring-has been a religious festival from the days of antiquity, occurring as it does about the vernal equinox. In earlier times it marked the dawn of a New Year, the end of the reign of Winter and the advent of increasing light and heat and the vivifying influence of Spring. It was anciently called Pasch, derived from the Hebrew word signifying Passover, and was observed on the seventh day of the week. At first the festiBay, at 2 o'clock this morning in a was observed on the seventh day of the week. At first the festival of Easter synchronised exactly with the Passover of the snow storm. Vessel refloated at high last night. Jews, but later-following the Resurrection-there was a difference among the Christian Churches as to the day upon which this left three of her crew behind at Dalfeast should be held. The Asiatic or Eastern Church kept it on the third day after the fourteenth of the month Nisan, as the actual day of our Lord's resurrection, on whatever day of the week that might happen to occur. The Western Churches however always observed it on the Sunday immediately after the actual day, and it was not until A. D. 325 that the Council of Nicæa settled the dispute by decreeing that the feast should be kept everywhere on the same day, and on the first day of the week, it being held that the resurrection itself took place on the first day of the week after the passover and ought therefore to be commemorated on a certain Sunday. That Sunday was, consequently, definitely fixed in the 6th century to be the first Sunday after the full moon that falls on, or next after, March 21st. Should the full moon happen on a Sunday, Easter is celebrated one week later. The date of all the other moveable feasts depend therefore on that of Easter.

Easter is the "queen of festivals," the greatest event in the story of Christianity, transcending perhaps in its effect on mankind the wonderful and miraculous birth of the Redeemer of the World at Christmas, because man's salvation was not, could not be, accomplished by the birth of Christ, but only through His death and resurrection. And so the Church lays particular emphasis on the observance of the great Easter festival, and of the days preceding it-those wonderful days from Palm Sunday to Good Friday, the events of which pass before us in a succession of magnificent but sombre panoramic pictures as in imagination we follow the scenes in the closing hours of the life of Him who was the fruit of the promise, and by whom the fetters binding the spiritual world was broken. He was at once the Resurrection and the Life, and in death triumphed over the grave.

All Christendom has been following His footsteps from Palm Sunday when He made His triumphal entry into Jerusalem, loudly acclaimed with the Hosannas of the multitude, which a little while later was changed into the vengeful cry Crucify Him! and have been present at the Last Supper partaken of by the Master and His disciples, including the traitor Judas. The devout have followed Him to the garden of Gethsemane and there witnessed His agony. The faithful have stood by and seen His betrayal and attended Him to the house of the high priest Caiaphas, who suborned false witnesses to testify against Him. His trial before Pontius Pilate, the Roman Governor, who alone possessed the powers of life or death is as vivid to-day as it was over nineteen hundred years ago. The sentence, the malefactor's death upon the Cross of Calvary, with a thief on either hand to show the derision with which His kingship was regarded; the descent from the Cross; the burial in the tomb of Joseph of Arimathæa, and then the glorious and real fact of the Resurrection, rolling away the stone that sealed the sepulchre by the sheer force of His Divinity and proving His superiority to material forces; in all these we have convincing proofs that the Son of Man conquered the grave and became alive for evermore.

Man's salvation and redemption was assured. Christ burst the bonds asunder and the promise of ages was fulfilled. Hence, throughout all time the glad Alleluias of rejoicing will ascend heavenward and man will meet his neighbor on each succeeding heavenward and man will meet his neighbor on each succeeding tonics. 



Fat Fees.

LAWYERS' AMAZING INCOMES.

Law is a costly luxury. And well might be, for the finest profession in the world from a money-making point of view is the law. In a recent case Sir Edward Carson and Sir John Simon had a trifling fee of five thousand guineas on their briefs, each being assisted by a small army of junors, who were paid in proportion. There are a round dozen leading law yers who will not read a brief without a preliminary fee of one thousand guineas, while a leader of minor eminence now expects one hundred guin eas on a brief and twenty-five guinea day as a refresher.

The Bar is the strongest trade un on in the country. It has forced leas may be gathered from the fact that Jessel, the one-time Master of the Rolls, looked upon twenty-five guineas refresher as something exceptional, while Edwin James chronicled as extraordinary two hundred guineas on a brief when he was the lead-

The biggest fees on record were those of ten thousand guineas which Serjeant Ballantine and Mr. Balfour Browne, K.C., each received for conducting cases abroad. And yet Ballantine only made four and a half guineas during his first year at the Bar, thirty guineas in the second, and seventy-five in the third.

Lord Birkenhead and Lord Reading have each made enormous fortunes at the Bar. The former, it is said, made a sacrifice of £10,000 a year when he became Lord Chancellon And when he gets "the sack" a grateful country will give him an out-of-work pension of £5,000 a year. Which calls to mind the fact that Lord Halsbury, now in his 94th year, has drawn more public money than any living subject of the Crown. His modest earnings have been roughly £170,000 as Lord Chancellor for seventeen years, and £80,000 as ex-Chancellor for sixteen years—a total


