

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

Antiquity of Belief in Dreams.

Dreams are frequently spoken of, in the oldest books in the world.

In the Bible, God speaks in a dream to Jacob about the increase of the cattle, and warns Laban not to obstruct Jacob's departure. The dreams of Joseph, unsurpassed even from a literary point of view, and of Pharoah. with a history of their fulfilment, occupy a large part of the first book. The dream of Solomon and the dreams of Nebuchadnezzer, the warning of Joseph to take the young child into Egypt, are parts of the history of the Christian religion.

The Bible distinguishes between natural dreams and those attributed to supernatural influence. It states very clearly the characteristics of dreams. Cicero says that men of greater wisdom among the Romans did not think it beneath them to heed the warnings of important dreams, and affirms that in his time the Senate ordered Lucius Junius to erect a temple to Juno Sospita in compliance with a dream seen by Cecilia. Scipio's dream, philosophical, imaginative, grand, published in the works of Cicero, called the most beautiful thing of the kind ever written, has always been the subject of discussion as to whether it was composed by Cicero for a purpose or is the veritable ac count of a dream.

Almost all the great characters of the Greek historian Herodotus believed that dreams were of supernatural origin. Kings resigned their sceptres, Cambyses assassinated his brother, priests attained great powers as commanders, cities which had been destroyed were restored by men who changed their plans and performed these acts because warned, as they supposed, in dreams, and with the in vasion of Greece by Xerxes such night visions had much to do.

Fenelon relates that when the father of Plato wished to have his son educated he took him to Socrates, who, by some strange coincidence, had dreamed the night before that he bore in his bosom a young swan which as soon as the feathers came upon it displayed its wings, and, singing with inexpressible sweetness, raised itself into the highest regions of air, soaring with intrepid flight. Socrates never doubted that the swan typified Plato and the boundless fame he was destined to enjoy.

Plato and Socrates believed in dreams, and Aristotle admitted that they might have a supernatural origin.

Some Remarkable Contests.

From the dawn of time man has delighted in contests, whether between individuals who match their strength and skill, or between ani-

Some of these contests are decided ly quaint, as, for instance, the cockcrowing matches of Belgium, where specially-bred and trained fowls are matched to see which will crow the greatest number of times within a

certain time limit. The lark-singing contests of England are far more musical, these contests being promoted and conducted by an association having a good membership. The birds are kept for some time in a dark room, and then placed before a mirror in the light. Imagining his own reflection to be a rival, the bird at once bursts into song, a careful record being made of

the length of the song. There used to be in Hamburg a famous collection of wild animals which included a number of giant tortoises, each weighing several hundred pounds. Children would mount upon the backs of these strange steeds, and, holding a lettuce leaf on the end of a stick just beyond the reach of the tortoise, coax them into an amusing race toward a fixed goal.

Much more exciting are the turtle races which may be witnessed in some of the South American countries. Turtle fishers select a number of the great sea turtles, and, attired in bathing costumes, mount their backs, grasping the forepart of the shells with both hands. The turtles are then released and at once make for 'he sea Ordinarily the turtle would plunge with his rider to the bottom of the sea, but this the jockey would prevent by throwing his weight on the back part of the shell and at the same time pulling the forward part up with his hands, which keeps the animal's head above the surface. By pulling the shell to the right or left, the rider is able to guide his mount, and a circle is made about a boat anchored off shore, and so back to the starting point. These turtles cover a course of eight or nine miles in an astonishing short time.

In Siam is found a particularly warlike fish, and fish fighting is almost a national sport in that country. When a contest is to be staged, two of the fish are placed in a large glass bottle, and these natural gladiators do the rest.

Notice to Taxpayers.

Section 7-(1) Income War Tax Act:-

"Every person liable to taxation under this "Act shall, on or before the thirty-first day of "March in each year, without any notice or "demand, deliver to the Minister a return on "Oath, in such form as the Minister may pre-"scribe, of his total Income during the last "preceding calendar year. The Oath shall be "in the Form V prescribed in the schedule "to this Act.

"If the Minister, in order to enable him to "make an assessment, desires further infor-"mation, or if he suspects that any person who has not made a return is liable to tax-"ation hereunder, he may, by registered let-"ter, require additional information, or a re-"turn containing such information as he deems necessary to be furnished him within "thirty days."

NOTE.—Persons to whom forms have been sent under this Section are bound to return them filled in in accordance with their Income for the period named,

Section 9—(1):

"For every default in complying with the "provisions for the next two preceding sec-"tions, the taxpayer and also the person or "persons required to make a return, shall each "be liable on summary conviction to a pen"alty not exceeding one hundred dollars for "each day during which the default con"tinues."

NOTE.—Taxpayers and those suspected as being liable to taxation under the Income War Tax Act, and who have not yet made returns as required by the Act, are now given Thirty days from the Second day of August instant, to complete and send in returns for the accounting periods of 1917, 1918 and 1919. Persons who are in default with their returns after the expiration of the above number of days will be prosecuted in accordance with the Act.

Lord D'Abernon First Ambassador

TO THE TEUTONIC REPUBLIC.

Lord D'Abernou's appointment as British Ambassador to Berlin is excit-ing bitter criticism because he was not the nominee of the Foreign Office, but that of Phillip Kerr, Premier Lloyd George's principal secretary, whose influence over the chief is paramount It is objected that D'Abernon, who managed the Liquor Control Board

during the war with marked auccess had his only previous training as an international financier while controller of the Ottoman Imperial Department. Foreign Secretary Curson is said to have opposed D'Abernon's ap-pointment, but Kerr's influence over-

Lord Curzon is declared to have been smarting for a long time over the knowledge that Kerr carries on foreign affairs over his head, and important political decisions are only communicated to him by Kerr after they have been taken.

Kerr, whose aunt is the Duchess of Norfolk, is himself heir to the Marquisate of Lothian. Therefore, belonging to one of the oldest Roman Catholic families in England, has to the great distress of his ultra-Catholic relatives adopted Christian Science, it is said, under the influence of Lady Astor, who is a noted propagandist of this cult. Lord and Lady Astor are intimate friends, also Lloyd George, but he has so far been proof against Christian Science propagandis

Apart from all this, undoubtedly D'Abernon is an excellent man for the position. No one in sight in the dip lomatic service is equally equipped. His wife is a younger sister of the late Duchess of Leinster and a very beautiful woman, while he himself is a man of commanding presence and charm of manner as well as an exceptional linguist.

Curiosities of the Earth's Formation.

Certain curious facts must be taken Certain curious facts must be taken into account in any theory which attempts to explain the formation of our world. Among these are: First-There is a great preponder-

ance of land in the northern hemisphere and of water in the southern. Second-Most oceans and most conments are more or less triangular in shape and they nearly all point south-

Third-The land forms an almost unbroken ring in the north and water

Fourth-If we place a map of the northern hemisphere over the south-ern it will be found that land never fall over land, but always over water, except in a few small patches.

These curious facts have given rise to the so-called "tetrahedral" theory of the formation of our globe. It has been found by experiment that a round tube under pressure tends to college into a triangular form. This gives the greatest amount of surface for the relative area. Our earth in for the relative area. Our earth in cooling shrinks, and consequently its spherical form (maintained by its revolution or spining) tends to fall into this triangular or tearahedral shape. The result of this is that certain flat surfaces are formed and also certain points or angles which project. Water, being fluid, tends to flow on to the flat spaces, being nearer the centre of gravity than the

projecting corners. The result is that the "continents," which correspond on this theory to the corners, would project or rise above the level of the water, and if we examined a map of the world with this theory in view it will be found that the general conformation of the land and water and their distribution on our globe correspond precisely to this theory.



At the great Memorial Service in Coronto, for the late Admiral of the Fleet, Lord Fisher, O.M., the Rev. Dr. Alfred Hall, Semior Chaplain to the Royal Naval and Merchant Marine Institution of Canada, suggested the alteration of one of the well-known Hymns. He pointed out that considerable objection had been urged, since the war, to the use of the verse

"Like a mighty army, Moves the Church of God."

It was felt that the great military nachine of German devastation could not suggest anything for which the Church stands. But the work of our Navy had been a benefaction to all mankind; securing, under God, the overthrow of injustice and tyranny. He proposed to change the figure from a military to a naval one, to read:

Move the Church's hosts, Keeping watch and vigil, Throughout all our coasts; Ready aye for action, 'Gainst the powers of sin, Keen, with utmost daring, That the right may win. Brightly gleams our ensign. White, with cross of red; Leading on to victory Under Christ our Head."





Governor Visits **Bonne Bay**

(Western Star.) On Monday, July 19th, Magistrat Janes was in receipt of a wire from the Private Secretary, intimating tha His Excellency the Governor expe to arrive at Bonne Bay the for A meeting was convened in

ourt House Tuesday evening for the purpose of making arrangements for coming event, and a represen tive committee was appointed. Owing to intervening inclement weather lit-tle was done in the way of decorations apart from a liberar display of bunt ing, but we are sure that His Excellency was well satisfied as to our loyalty and to the nature of the come accorded him.

Coming up the Straits conveyed by H.M.S. Calcutta one of the latest productions of her class in the Royal Navy—calls were to have been made at Port Saundars and Cow Head, but the thick fog prevented this and con-sequently the Calcutta dropped ancher in Bonne Bay Saturday evening.

Magistrate Janes with Constable Walters proceeded on board and after presentments. arrangements for tomorrow were nnalized

Sunday at one o'clock the Magistrate lunched on the ship with His Excellency and staff, Admiral Sir Allan Everott and Captain Noble, R.N., and at 2 p.m. returned to shore in company with the Governor, who was attended by Capt. Hamilton, Private Secretary and two Naval officers. A large number of citizens were at the landing place. The party continued around the main street and stopped at the Church of England school house where the Sunday School was in session under the Superintendency of Mr. Roland Roberts. His Excellency graciously made a most acceptable short address and at its close was presented with a handsome bouquet by one of the tiny scholars. Leaving here a call was next made to the Roman Catholic church where Rev. Father Brennan was met, and in company with the rest renaired to the Court House which was soon filled.

An indication of His Excellency's character was here shown. A large number of children were around the door and naturally desirous of being inside but doubtless felt somewhat awed at appearing before their Governor. His Excellency knowing of this asked specially that they come in before the meeting commenced and with a little further urging all trooped in and standing in front close to His Excellency were at once put to ease

by his kindly manner. Magistrate Janes then read the address, which owing to lack of space we have to hold over till next issue. His Excellency's reply was in a humorous and pointed style. In expressing his pleasure at being in Bonne Bay for the first time, he made it known that this was his third attempt ach here but that the ele-ments re had been too much for him. The beauty of the spot was enlarged upon, and the vecessity of a better standard of fish was shown. The part played by Bonne Bay in the war was commented on and congratulations tendered Mrs. Jemima Wilton. M.B.E., who was but recently decorated, and who was present in the room. Sensible suggestions as to what form war memorials should take were entered into and in closing he hoped it would not be too long before he would be in our midst again and accompanied by his wife and daughter. The National Anthem being sung, all were given an opportunity of meeting His Excellency and he genially chatted with many.

The party then left for Norris Point where a visit was made to the fox ranch of A. B. Harding and subsequently returning to the ship, tea was served and at 6 o'clock His Excellency and the Magistrate again landed at Woody Point and attended service at the Church of the Epiphany. In the absence of the Rector, Rev. Mr. Maidment, the service was ably taken by Mr. Roland Roberts, who, it may be noted, has put in two years at the Diocesan College, Montreal. A large congregation was present and rose as the Governor entered. Following the Benediction the National Anthem was heartily rendered. Return was then made by the Governor to the Calcutta. At 8 o'clock next morning His Excellency and party, including the Magistrate took launch for Lomond where the big mill and surroundings were inspected. The Calcutta steamed up at 10 o'clock and all with the exception of Mr. Janes going on board, she left immediately for Curling.

Thus was brought to a close the visit of His Excellency Sir Charles Alexander Harris, Governor and Commander-in-Chief of Newfoundland. In conversing with the Governor he expressed himself as highly pleased with the time spent here, and we on our part are heartily pleased to have had him with us. In him is seen the hest type of the English gentleman; one who has given long years of faithful service to the cause of Empire, and who by his experience and personality is ably qualified to represent His Gracious Majesty in this His Domin-ion of Newfoundland. That many more years of usefulness lie before him is our sincere wish.
