Diamond Mining Flourishes

London, Oct. 26 .- The aluvial diamond industry in British Guiana, the only British possession in the South American continent, is showing great expansion, says a Colonial report. The output of diamonds rose from 507,200 stones weighing 102,603 carats of a local value of \$1,645,000 in 1921, to 816,857 stones weighing 163,640 carats value \$4,165,000 in 1922. The increased output attracted the attention of diamond dealers in Europe and America, with the result that between 20 and 30 foreign diamond buyers opened places of business in the colony, causing a rapid advance in prices.






