DUSSELDORF, Nov. 20. The battle between the Separatists and Socialists in the region opposite Düsseldorf now appears to have been much more than at first reported. A detachment of the Separatists last night killed what they were completely routed, being carried to pieces by the peasants, who used axes, knives and other farm implements.

His Grace the Archbishop's Letter

The following letter from His Grace the Archbishop to the people of the Cathedral Parish was ordered to be read at all the Masses in the Cathedral on Sunday:

My dearly beloved Brethren: The time has now come when I deem it opportune to put before the people of the Cathedral Parish a brief statement in connection with the work that is being done on the construction of the new Palace, as well as an outline of the plans whereby it is hoped to provide for the heavy outlay which this work will involve. In the first place, I would wish to say that the plans of the new Episcopal Palace were prepared with the utmost care; a great deal of thought was given to the design and finish of the building, and it was only after a long period of consultation and consideration that the final plans were adopted. In coming to a decision in this important matter, three considerations had to be kept in view. In the first place the actual requirements, present and prospective, of the Palace staff; secondly, the harmonizing of the new structure in its architectural lines, and the material of construction with the Cathedral and surrounding buildings; and thirdly, the financing of the work in the difficult and depressing conditions of the present time. Having given due weight to all these considerations, I am pleased to be in a position to inform the people that a building is now in course of construction which will meet our needs and requirements at a minimum of expenditure, and will be at the same time, it is hoped, not unworthy of the old Palace, which it will soon take its place.

THE FINANCING OF THE WORK.
The cost of the new building when fully finished and ready for occupancy will, on a careful but liberal estimate, amount to \$150,000. To raise such a large amount at one time by means of public subscriptions would be obviously out of the question, just as it would be unfair that the burden of financing this work should be laid altogether on the present congregation. Hence in arranging for the raising of funds for this work my object was to extend the financing of the building over a period of years. With this end in view, I have made arrangements for obtaining a loan of the amount required, repayment on which will extend over the next ten or twelve years. The basis of the loan which I have been able to secure is a weekly payment from the Sunday Offertory collections of the Cathedral, as well as an annual payment from the collection which will be held throughout the Archdiocese each year for this purpose. "Flapperjack," by the way, is not lazy, nor has he lost any of the natural instincts of his tribe, despite his several years of domestic captivity. Long before a storm blows up he senses its coming and immediately starts stuffing the cracks of the doors with old bags, loose boots, papers and anything else movable. His trapper-owner not long ago was unable to enter his cabin just before a storm exploded through a window, thanks to the activities of his pet.

According to its owner, this very sagacious beaver can make himself very useful. Captured when a baby he has been taught to clear away the land in front of the shack and drag out the trees and gnab out the stumps, with the result that the trapper has a nice potato patch in cultivation in the heart of the woods.

One of the best things "Flapperjack" does is to cut cord wood, although it took many months of patient work to teach him to chew the wood to the correct stove length. Recently, having been left alone in the shack, he whittled away the time by gnawing the legs of the table and chairs, leaving the furniture sat upon the floor.

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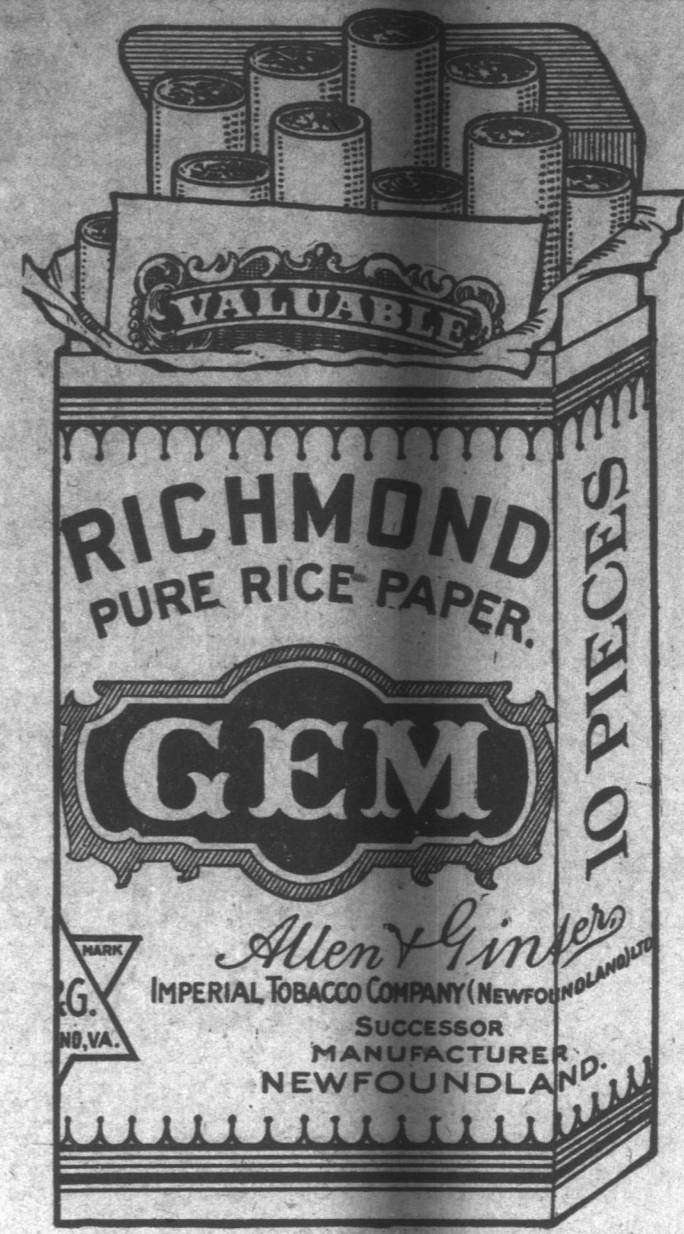

Suggests Reducing Period of Training for Nurses

CALGARY.—(Canadian Press)—"Some Phases of the Rockefeller Report on Nursing," was the title of a paper read by Miss E. Johns, R.N., of Vancouver, before the annual convention of the Alberta Association of Registered Nurses.
The Rockefeller Report, according to Miss Johns, recommends that the time of training be cut from three years to twenty-eight months when the candidate has already obtained a matriculation standing in the high schools.
Miss Johns pointed out that viewing the situation from the nurse's point and from the standpoint of education to the nurse there was a great deal of routine work that could be done away with in order that this reduction in time might be made.
Another phase of the report deals with the suggestion that a subsidiary nursing course be formed. It was pointed out that those making the report had found by investigation that 25 per cent. of the time of the graduate nurse was spent in needless attention to the patient and that the duties performed at that time could be performed by a person who did not hold all the graduate qualifications and consequently would not cost the patients so much.

Instrument That Measures Growth

A remarkable discovery has been made by a famous Indian biologist recently through the use of an ingenious instrument he has invented, which shows the rate of a plant's growth by drawing an ink-line on a piece of paper wrapped round a revolving drum.
When the plant jogs along its life in the ordinary way the instrument draws a more or less straight line, showing an uneventful, uninterupted life story; the growth changes from day to night, because, as we know, sunlight is trapped by the plant cells, and made to help in their assimilation of food taken in from the moist air.

By being able to watch the rate of oxygen production of the plants which takes place at the same rate as the absorption of the carbon dioxide and water vapor from the air, the Professor has found that very tiny traces of impurities in the air affect the plant enormously, changing its power of "light-digestion" two or three times. Nitric acid present in the air to the extent of only one part in 2,000 millions actually doubles the rate at which the plant can take in food from the air.

Only recently we read how another professor has succeeded in copying in the laboratory the process carried on by plants of turning water and carbon dioxide into food through the agency of direct sunshine.
The first product formed in this wonderful process is what is called formaldehyde; and it has been discovered that one part of this in a thousand millions nearly doubles the plant's production of oxygen.

The new instrument will map out the life story of the plant's growth like the recording instruments which set out the consumption of gas or the changes of the barometer; but it deals with quantities almost infinitely little. It shows very effectively once more that our study of the great things of Nature depends on the measurement of quantities and forces which a hundred years ago would have been far too small for man to discover.

German Crowns Courteous

TO FORMER CROWN PRINCESS.
Berlin, Nov. 18.—Former Crown Princess Cecilia and her four sons were among the visitors to the recent Berlin automobile show.
The five members of the former imperial family came to the show as the guests of the makers of a well-known motor car and returned home in one of the model cars of this firm.
The former crown princess is always recognized by Berlin crowds, which pay her great courtesy. Even the most rabid of the anti-monarchists seem to have great admiration for the dignified wife of the ex-king at Wieringen. She lives in a small villa at Potsdam, with her five children, and moves about as unostentatiously with her children as any other well-bred German woman. Occasionally she appears at the opera or the theatre, and it is not unusual to see her shopping in Berlin.

What Novelists Earn

Contrary to popular belief, novelists as a class are both hard-working and poor. Not one published novel in every ten earns its author £50.
As a matter of fact, only a writer of peculiar and special gifts can make a good living from his pen. Mere "cleverness" counts for little. The ability to tell a story is rare, but it is only the tellers of stories that command a large public.
"What does a 'best-seller' make? Like all sensible authors, he contracts with his publisher on a royalty basis. On every copy of his novels sold he gets 25 per cent. of the published price. On a 7s. 6d. book he receives 1s.10½d. If he sells 30,000 copies he nets just under £3,000.
But this is only a part of his earnings. There are, in addition, the American sales, the serial rights, film and dramatic rights, and cheap popular editions.
It will go hard with a best-seller if he does not clear £5,000 from a single novel.
If he is industrious and productive he will write two a year; but there are very few novelists who make £10,000 a year. Nevertheless there are from 30 to 40 who make considerably more than £1,000. Many of the remainder earn scarcely a living. George Gissing, now regarded as a classic, was glad for many years to receive £50 for each of his long novels.

Still, in the vast majority of cases genius and even talent quickly get their reward. A writer of stories must be either very great or very small who cannot earn £700 or £800 a year.

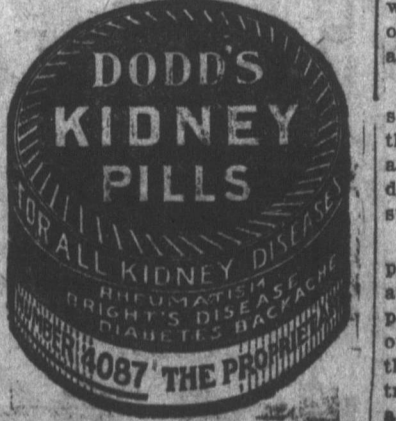

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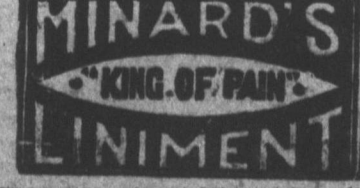

We are not surprised to see so many bright manly and intelligent little children, suffer from malnutrition, and want of proper clothing. Oh! the large number of heartless fathers who adore the false God of drunkenness and sloth, and leave their wives and children in the clutches of starvation, nakedness and misery, is an everlasting disgrace and shame in this city. We boast of our enlightenment, civilization and progress, but to too many, such things are only "A Hollow Mockery." Yes, in the miserable hovels, enlightenment, civilization and progress, give away to darkness, brutality and crime. We again wonder why we have so many slugs in our midst, notwithstanding the great noble and benevolent efforts made by our many charitable institutions and organizations managed by both religious and lay people. And yet the work for these institutions seems to be growing daily. The responsibilities of parents are growing more lax, and ignorance, squalidness and misery seem to suit them "better than knowledge, cleanliness, and happiness. Under the caption of "The Integrity of the Home," the Boston Pilot says:—"Home has ever been the dearest memory to man, a memory which has

DEPOSITORS WANT THEIR MONEY IN FULL.

Suggestions that pressure should be brought to bear on the government so that depositors of the defunct Home Bank might receive their deposits in full, were made at a largely attended meeting of the Hochelaga depositors.

Eddie St. Pere, M.P., gave his pledge that he would support the wishes of the depositors, and suggested that the Canadian Bankers' Association was really responsible in the matter. He said that when the Banks appeared before the Banking Committee at Ottawa they did not do so as individual institutions, but as a collective body.

Marcus Sperber, K.C., Quebec representative on the central body of Home Bank depositors, explained the situation. He suggested that all banks be compelled to deposit five per cent of their capital or reserve with the Government in order that depositors might be protected in further cases. Other speakers were Bernard Rome, K.C., Dr. Pellier, M.L.A., and Aldermen Deroches and Lalancette.

STRANGERS SHOULD BE CAREFUL.

Strangers coming to Montreal should be cautious of meeting "so-called friends," as the following tells:

The police of the Montfort Street police station received a complaint from Herve Lefebvre, of St. Lucien, Drummond County, who informed the desk man that he had been robbed of \$30 in a St. Felix Street house. Lefebvre, according to his story, was met at the Windsor Station at 11:30 by a man 30 years of age who was friendly enough to invite him outside to have drink. He was taken to St. Felix Street where they entered a house and had several drinks. Lefebvre lapsed into sleep after the third drink, and when he again opened his eyes he was alone in the house minus \$30 stolen from his pockets.

THE HONESTY OF A DOMESTIC.

Through the honesty of a maid at the Windsor Hotel, Mrs. C. Anderson, of Vancouver, had returned to her purse containing \$1,400 in Canadian bank notes which the owner had left in the public reception room. The purse was examined by the night clerk for a name, and Mrs. Anderson was asked if she had lost anything of value. She said she thought not, and when told that a pocketbook with drafts bearing her name was found, she was overjoyed when the article was returned to her. The maid was liberally rewarded for her honesty.

A PENSION FOR TRAMWAY EMPLOYEES.

In connection with the recent acceptance by Montreal tramway employees of the recent agreement drawn up by the company, officials of the employees and the union, together with insurance experts, are at work planning a pension scheme for the 3,500 workers.

It is proposed that the employees would contribute a small amount from their wages each payday, and the company would supply the balance, under authority of the Montreal Tramways Commission. It is expected the scheme will be in working order early in the year.

Under the headline of "McGill," the Montreal Herald says editorially:—"The McGill is a Christian university, not if it is a Christian university, one would naturally expect that the teachings of its professors would be in accordance with the fundamental principles of Christianity.

This question is raised by the report of an address on "Natural Surgery" by Sir Henry Gray, a new addition to the

teaching staff of the University and surgeon-in-chief of the Royal Victoria Hospital. In the course of his address, which, by the way, signified his first appearance before the students, he is reported to have said: "The study of the evolution of man from the lower animals gives us very valuable information about many surgical conditions." He went on to indicate that man had evolved from a four-footed animal, that the arrangement of the organs in the abdomen is not suited to the erect posture and that man is paying the penalty of walking only on his hind legs, a position for which his anatomy is not fitted. On the latter point he is reported to have said: "The arrangement of the organs in the abdomen is not adapted to the erect posture. It is much more suited to the posture of animals, and man must pay for his evolution by suffering from all kinds of abdominal disorders."

We do not wish to raise a controversy on the Darwinian theory. Thinking men have long since got past the generalizations of the Darwinian point of view and the world has fallen too recently had in the Great War an object lesson as to what tragedy the Darwinian theory, pursued to its logical ends, may lead the human race. Germany swallowed the Darwinian theory holus-bolus, and came to believe that the survival of the fittest that is to say, the strongest and the most relentlessly selfish, was the primary law governing the "natural world."

The immense majority of the people in Canada are Christians and wish their children to be brought up in the Christian faith. The essence of the Christian faith is the teaching of the divine origin of man, but how are students to believe in this teaching if they are told by the professors that they have evolved from the lower animals and that man is such a failure physically that he has to suffer for walking on two legs when his body is more fitted for walking on four?

Parents would be very sorry to see a recrudescence of cheap German free thought or agnosticism at McGill. A few years ago a McGill professor wrote in the University Magazine an article entitled: "The Beautiful Dream of Bethlehem." The article created such a revolution of feeling in Canada that the professor found it expedient to seek other pastures. Sir Henry Gray would seem to contradict the statement in the Holy Scripture that, "God created man in His own image." Are the students to be told that this, too, is only a beautiful dream? Everybody knows that religion is the best safeguard for our young people, and our schools and universities should do all they can to foster religion rather than to preach doctrines which would destroy the faith of our fathers. If any professor at McGill holds views contrary to the fundamental teachings of our Christian faith, then he ought to keep those views to himself until such time as McGill has found some one to replace him.

Eat, Grow Fat and Die, Says Doctor

Washington, Nov. 18.—"Eat, drink, and grow fat, and to-morrow you die." Dr. K. H. Beall of Ft. Worth, Tex., told members of the Southern Medical Association in session here to-day. Excess fat is a parasite which saps the health and strength of its victim and predisposes them to disease and to premature old age, he said.

"We are all acquainted with the lean, long-waisted individual who spends his life in trying first one treatment and then another in a vain effort to get fat. He ought to be thankful to be able to remain thin. If tuberculosis doesn't get him before he is 40 he is reasonably sure to live to old age and finally to succumb not to any particular disease but rather to a general sort of mild decay.

"Time was when fat was an asset to a man. It was a valuable reserve to carry through periods of famine. The need for it has been banished by civilization."

Men of middle age who are more than 25 pounds overweight have an expectancy of life of only 15 years as compared with an expectancy of 35 years in thin people, he continued.

"A four-inch excess in a man's waistline and 25 pounds extra fat reduces his probable length of life by 40 per cent. We may well say that a man's belt is his life line."

Dr. Beall said that in view of the fact that there had been no extension of life after middle age for a century, and that the degenerative diseases were nearly all due to overweight, the complacency of the medical profession toward obesity was inexcusable. Laymen understood the risk nearly as well as doctors, he said.

A man 30 pounds overweight carries around 25 miles of additional blood vessels to nourish and maintain the "excess baggage" on his person, the doctor continued, and this extra strain he maintained was the cause of heart and kidney breakdowns in later life. Overweight was a handicap in all infectious diseases and especially in pneumonia; and fattening of tuberculosis patients beyond normal was condemned. As for diabetes, he said, "We may well say that to get diabetes you must first get fat."

In the ensuing discussion, Dr. Beall's conclusions were commended and Dr. Seale Harris of Birmingham said that his paper should have wide publicity because of the importance of the subject and the need of arousing the public to the dangers of overweight.

Rotarians Hear About Labrador

DR. GRENFELL TELLS OF COUNTRY—ASKS FOR GREATER INTEREST.

Relating his experiences in the Labrador Medical Mission before the members of the local Rotary Club at the weekly luncheon in the Windsor Hotel yesterday, Dr. W. T. Grenfell stated that, though not an integral part of the Empire, Labrador, the country of fishermen, lumbermen and miners was a country without a Government, interesting neither to Canada nor Newfoundland. He pleaded for a greater interest in it on the grounds that sturdy God-fearing people were striving to do the work of life against the force of adversity and the lack of world civilization.

The interest of the outside world so far had been encouraging. The speaker begged for the continuance of that interest.

"When a man has hewn his little boat out of a big tree so that he can move from place to place in search of his necessities he derives more pleasure from that boat than does the city man from his motor launch."

The country, he said, was territory where people derive more pleasure from doing things than by having things.

The speaker told of the strength of the people who, encouraged by the great Christian work in Labrador, were slowly making their country less unattractive to the outside world.—Montreal Star, Nov. 14.

Canada as Model

Chicago Tribune: The contrast offered by Canada to the United States is one of rationality to fanaticism and of free exercise of political liberty to an undemocratic restriction of it. When most of Canada decided to try prohibition it was not made nationwide, and it was not put in unchangeable law. The United States not only spread it over the entire nation, but put it in law which is virtually irrevocable.

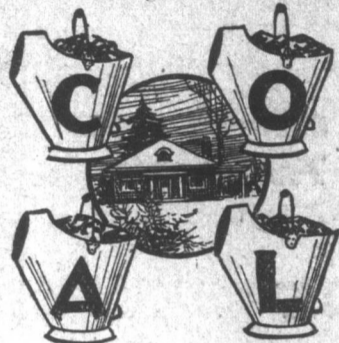

"THE GREAT COLOSSEUM OF ROME"

is the largest Amphitheatre known. It stands in Rome on the site of Nero's Palace. It was begun by Vespasian in 72 A.D., and finished by Domitian in 82 A.D. but a fourth storey was added by Severus Alexander, 236 A.D. and Gordianus 238 A.D. It was capable of seating 50,000 spectators and afforded room for 20,000 to stand. Externally, the building has four stories, the three lower with arcades; the first is of Etruscan architecture, the second Ionic, the third and fourth Corinthian. Its height is 157 feet. The seats were of marble; the exterior of the building and the chief corridors of travertine stone; the inner walls of tufa and concrete with which all corridors, stair-cases and sub-structures were vaulted. Underneath the arena were dens for wild animals and appliances for raising them into the arena. The Colosseum was chiefly destroyed in the 16th century, when it was used simply as a quarry for marble and other building material, until Pope Benedict XIV. (1740-58) intervened and saved it from complete destruction.
