The complaints that had been made against an Insolvency Law generally were found to apply more to the working of the system by which a party who dealt honestly with his creditors, giving up everything he had in the world, should not be kept a useless member of society,—useless to himself, his family, and the community, by having a debt round his neck from which he could make no escape. This subject, as the House was aware, had been before the leading Boards of Trade of the Dominion, and they would have the advantage of the opinions expressed by those bodies, so far as their recommendations and propositions would throw light on the matter. He heped the principle of the bill would be thoroughly discussed on the second reading, and he would then be a good deal guided by the feeling of the House, whether the Bill should go to the Committee of the Whole and its clauses be discussed there, or whether there were such irreconcilable differences of opinion as to necessitate the measure going to a Special Committee. If at the second seading it proved that the principle of having an Insolvency Law was acceptable to the House, he thought it would be found that the details could be discussed with most advantage in Committee of the Whole. He had no intention to hurry the measure, and introduced it thus early in order that they might receive upon it the views of the commercial men of all parts of the country.

### Adulteration of Seeds.

Adulteration of Seeds,

Complaints are often made that the practice of seed adulteration is becoming, very common—more particularly in England and the States, where the facilities for doing so are greater than in Canada. Even in this country, however, there have been instances of mixing good and bad seed, and a case of this kind was tried at the late Assizes for Wellington. On the other side of the lines, there is a coloring process resorted to, which makes seed of an indifferent variety appear so good, that experienced sowers are taken in by the deception, and don't find out their error till the crop comes up, when it is generally too late to remedy the matter. The London Times of the 15th ult. contains a letter from Charles Sharpe, Esq., Seedsman, Sleaforth, England—a relative of the Meesrs. C. & A. Sharpe, of this town—in which he exposes some of the tricks resorted to by unprincipled seed sellers. He says it is not uncommon for them to mix large quantities of inferior German rape seed (which has the appearance of English grown turnip seed, proviously steamed and kiln-dried to destroy its vitality, with good turnip seed, to the extent of about one bushel of killed seed to three of turnip seed. The rape seed costs about 48s. per quarter, and the turnip seed about £10 per quarter. Again, inferior and old samples of clovers are dyed for the purpose of mixing with clover seed of greater value, and trefoil (a cheap and inferior kind of clover) is also killed and dyed for the purpose of adulteration, but it exists in nearly every kind of seed.

Through the exertions of Mr. Sharpe and other honest dealers, a bill has been introduced into the British Parliament providing that killing or dyeing seeds shall be an offence punishable by a fine not exceeding £50 and costs; and for after offences increased fines and penalties are to be enforced. There is hardly any-doubt that the measure will carry, and the evit of seed adulteration be promptly checked.

The practice complained of here is carried on to a limited extent in Canada, and the best way for farmers—to whose interest it is that they should procure good seed—is to deal with those houses where reputation for fair dealing and first-class stock is unquestioned, and to buy no seeds at hap-bazard. Horticulturists will also do well to be careful as to when they purchase from, and save themselves a great amount of pecuniary loss and annoyance.

There is scarcely any change to note in transactions on our market. Very little of anything is coming in on account of the bad state of the roads. Wheat has made a slight advance, while on the other hand barley has gone down somewhat. Hay is getting higher, and as much as \$29 has been paid during the past day or two. Hides have decreased in value considerably, being now sold in some cases as low as \$4. The Toronto, Hamilton and London markets continue very dull. It is stated that 3,200,000 bushels of grain are stored at various points on the Missispip, and the means of a joint stock company are to be used to draw this grain from its concealment and send it to the sea-board. The rates of river transportation enable a St. Louis shipper to lay wheat in New Orleans at \$1.25 per bushel, which is worth \$1.45 in New York. There is, it is held, a difference of from eight to ten cents a bushel in favor of St. Louis in the matter of transportation, which, really, is tantamount to St. Louis paying ten cents a bushel more than New York or Chicago. A great carrying trade may thus be done via the Mississippi, pending the development of navigation through the St. Lawrence, by enlarging existing canals or building others.
