There was evidently not much sympathy felt for Stokes, judging from the tone of the press, before his trial, but now that he has been sentenced to undergo the extreme penalty of the law the Tribune thus concludes a lengthy editorial:—
"There lingers in the public mind some doubt as to whether the young man now convicted of murder was really the aggressor; and the sympathy his unexpected conviction for murder in the first degree has aroused, is hightened by the popular aversion to a penalty, which precludes the possibility of mitigating the verdict because of such a doubt, no less than by recollections of the career which the prisoner's act brought stoso sudden a close. While the law prescribes it, we believe the law should be enforced; but does not the public dour t about this very case give voice to the popular argument against the continuance of the law." ago.
