The Great Balloon.

A Collapse.

Nzw Yonz, Sept. 12.—A great crowd assembled at Brooklyn tc-day to witness the departure of the balloon. The indication continued steadily until 10 min, past four, when the balloon suddenly swayed to the north, ripped half way round, with a great tearing sound, and fell flat upon the ground. The immense volume of gas, nearly 400,000 feet, which had been pumped inteit, escaped at the same moment, nearly suffocating those who stood beside it. It is the doctrine of scoundrels that every man has his price. We don't believe it.
