The Disclosures made to the North West Committee.

The report which we gave on Thursday, that Sir John Macdonald had advanced \$3,000 to induce Riel and Lepine to leave Manitoba immediately after the revolt there, is conirmed. Parliamentary circles in Ottawa are greatly excited over the disclosures made before the North West Committee and though its proceedings are private, yet sufficient has leaked out in connection with this nefarious transaction to leave no doubt of its correctness. It seems that Bishop Tache in the ourse of his evidence handed in to the Committee, an original letter rom Sir John to him enclosing \$1,000 to be given to Riel as an inducement to that worthy to keep out of the way. This was after the Bishop had asked an amnesty, and after Sir John informed him it could not be granted, inasmuch as such an act would not be sustained by public opinion. This \$1,000 was sent to Riel before the Red. River expedition under Gen. Wolseley arrived there. The friends of Riel thought the money insufficient, and since Lepine should go also, they demanded an additional \$3,000. Appointments by the late Government. A return of appointments made by late Government, brought down on Thursday, shows that between the 22nd October, 1873, and the 6th of November inclusive-those days extending from the day before the meeting of the House for the special session to the date of the resignation of the Ministry-the appoint-ments numbered no less than one hundred and fifty. Of these the present Government, by Orders in Council, cancalled no less than seventy. The dates o iled no less than seventy. The dutes of the encelled appointments were all on or subsequent to the 27th October, anterior to which day the motion of no confidence had been made. The appoint-ments are to almost every conceivable Department of the public service, and include Lieutenant-Governors, Judges of the Superior and County Courts, Col-lectors of Customs and revenue, mail clerks, landing-waiters, tide-waiters, harbour and shipping masters, light-house-keepers, clerks, Lieut. Colonels of Militia, preventive officers, store-keep-ers and many others. The appointment of Lieut. Governors for New Branswick and Ontario respectively are dated October 21st, after which date and up to the fall of the Ministry both of theses in the Commons, Mr. Tilley taking a prominent part in the debate, certainly in direct contravention of the spirit of the Independence of Parliament Act.
