

The Lobster's Queer Cost. The shell of the crab and lobster owes its bluish-gray color to the super-position of two pigments or coloring matters, which have been isolated—a red pigment and a blue red pigment and a blue one. As long red pigment and a blue one. As long as these two pigments exist simultane-ously the crustaceans remain gray. But the blue pigment is fugitive, and some-times, under the influences of a disease, it is destroyed, and orabs are found with portions of their shell more or less reddish. When the crustaceans are immersed in boiling water the blue pig-ment is entirely destroyed, and the red pigment, which is very stable, appears alone in all its brilliancy. A Monster Rose Bush
