As the receipts of grand lodge are less than \$15,000 a year, omitting interest on investments, and the expenditure over \$15,000, it can easily be seen that had the "spendas-you-go" policy had been followed in the past it would have been fatal to the financial standing of grand lodge at the present time.

DIVERSIFIED WORK FOR WOMEN.

The relations existing between domestic and non-domestic work for women, as shown by Dr. Emily Blackwell in the Popular Science Monthly, were given to the readers of The World some days since. Continuing her paper on "the industrial position of women," Dr. Blackwell asserts that the failure to marry is not the reason why so many women are seeking employment. In proof of her assertion she refers to the fact that the married women who are thrown back upon the necessity of self-support equal in number the middle-aged unmarried working women. The mass of working women, on the contrary, is composed of young wemen under the age of 25, and the majority of these will probably marry. The objection that the substitution of non-domestic for domestic labor would imperil domestic life our authority denounces as a fallacy. She thinks that it would help to free marriage from any but personal considerations. "The question as to the ca-pacity of a woman for housework would become as foreign to that of her desirability as a wife as is now her ability as a tailor. it would be a wife only, not also a domestic, that the young man would need to

Another great advantage that would be gained in the general occupation of women in non-domestic labor, Dr. Blackwood sensibly urges, would be the impulse it would give to the industrial training of girls. She argues that a great amount of misery and vice would be prevented if every girl should be taught some paying work; that this sort of education should be more obligatory in the case of girls than boys, "both because they are less able to make opportunities for themselves when unexpectedly called upon to do so, and because of the greater dangers to which helplessness exposes them. There is no greater source of suffering and vice among women than the fallacy of taking for granted that they will not need to support themselves."

Granting that the health of women is not what it should be, she goes on to say that nowhere do women break down more frequently or more com-pletely than in the bearing and rearing of children and the wear and tear of domestic duty. "There is a general inclination," she says, "to compare the results of work under unfavorable conditions with those of married life under favorable ones." The physical education of women Miss Blackwell considers at fault, and not the organization. 


