THE FLATRUSH STAKES

A VICTORY FOR VALKYRIE

only thing he could do to save himself was to stop headway on Valkyrie. Hence came the foul and its return from the boom of the Valkyrie reaching out to leeward raked across the deck of Defender, only 12 or 20 feet away and striking the topmast shroud on the starboard side carrying it away, breaking the jaw of the spreader and pulling the bolt out of the brass spreader strap. The Defender's topmast immediately buckled under the strain of her jib topped with a load cruck, and at the moment the starting gun was fired at exactly 11 o'clock. The Valkyrie proceeded her at 11.13 and Defender at 11.24.

At 11.24 the Defender went about upon the starboard tack and 10 seconds later the Valkyrie followed. It was then seen that the Valkyrie was about a quarter of a mile ahead of the Defender and 1000 yards to windward.

At 11.30 hot tacked to port again, their respective positions remaining unchanged, and at 12.19 another tack to starboard was made. By this time the Defender was three-eighths of a mile ahead of Defender and a quarter of a mile to windward. The wind had now freshened to 12 or 14 miles an hour and the water became much rougher. The Defender began to creep through the water, but began to out-point the English boat as the latter had hauled a little to the westward and the mark was easily reached on this long starboard tack. The Valkyrie rounded to 12.57.48 and easing off her sheets started for the second mark.

Defender Nearly Four Minutes Behind

The Defender rounded the first mark at 1.01.33, having been beaten just three minutes and 32 seconds in the 10 miles, counting difference of time at the start. A few minutes later she started a balloon start. The run to the second mark was a broad reach, quarter and the sails set for port, the wind kept on increasing, reaching about 15 miles an hour at one time, dashed on at a good pace. The Defender held her own and actually gained 17 seconds on the next 10 miles. Much of this gain was due to the difference in the behavior of the two boats in the rather stiff sea way. At 1.38 Valkyrie took in her jib topped and at 1.39 she turned the second mark, sending up a No. 2 jib topped as she did so. She then hauled in her sheet and started for home with her mainsail and jib topped set. At 1.39 p.m., the Defender, which by that time had nearly reached the mark, took in her jib topped and jib topped and set the mark at 2.04.45. She broke out on a No. 2 jib topped, which in size was about the same as that which the Valkyrie had. Just as the boats were rounding the mark, the breeze took another spurt and before it settled down again, it had reached a velocity of 17 miles. The defender's jib topped was half a mile behind the Valkyrie when she rounded the stake boat, and in less than half an hour she had cut this distance down to three-eighths of a mile. The Valkyrie won by 47 seconds corrected time.

A Little History About Cup Contests

that they had no objection to wheat being scoured at Fort Arthur or any other point where it was of advantage to the farmer and grain dealer to have it scoured, provided that such precautions were taken as would prevent its being mixed in the standard grades; but that the Government certificate of a grade should be like the Government stamp, a guarantee that it is genuine.

In this matter the deputations really represented the views of the millers, not of Canada alone, but of the United Kingdom.

The ministers stated that they were extremely anxious that the goods which Manitoba wheat had abroad should be maintained, and would try to frame regulations which would secure the desired effect.

On June 24, 1896, a communication was received from the Department of Inland Revenue, stating that the Department had determined to abide by the regulation that no scoured wheat should be allowed in No. 1 hard.

On Aug. 3 last, an order in council was issued on the subject.

On Aug. 21, within three weeks of passing this order in council, another was issued, rescinding the previous one.

Misrepresentations of Canada.

The report contained in the Government could only have received representation from private individuals, who, for their own selfish ends, seek to have the decision on this matter postponed until the crop is again moving. It is a pity that so strong a stand should at once be taken by the association in this matter and that the Government should have to understand that in our opinion their action is sacrificing the interests, not of the millers, but of the farmer, because the wheat is used, and also the interests of the farmers of Manitoba, because of a miller paying a high price for a special quality of wheat, he requires it.

Strong Series of Resolutions.

A long resolution, in 12 clauses, followed, concluding with the avowal that this association in amicable relations assembled, desire to express their strongest disapproval of the Government in rescinding an Order in Council which they only passed after having the matter under their consideration for over four years, and in obtaining the fullest information possible, as the action of the Government in this respect shows that it considers the interests of a few individuals as of paramount importance, while the interests of the farmers who grow Manitoba wheat and the millers who grind it are disregarded.

"And that this association will regret exceedingly if the Government persists in such action on this important matter as will leave the association no alternative but to start an agitation throughout the country with a view to having the Order in Council rescinded in its entirety and to have effect to their efforts to have this grievance remedied."

Has someone Done Crazy?

Mr. McLaughlin said the conclusion he had come to was that there was somebody in authority at Ottawa who was going crazy. (Laughter.) He honestly believed that the department at Ottawa which had rescinded the price that had formerly been in vogue was becoming demented. As one who used a good deal of hard wheat, he strongly objected to the new regulations. He had just returned from a two months visit to England, and the millers there, to a man said, "Manitoba is the wheat we want in Canada. But they would not take that which was graded to suit someone here in Canada. On the previous day I was in Montreal, and the excitement among the millers there about this matter was such that I was glad to see the Government. Whatever may be the stated reasons at Ottawa for this change, it is one thing to see the Government, to benefit Manitoba. (Applause.) It could not do the farmers of Manitoba any good to send wheat from Dunlop and call it Manitoba hard. Nor was it for the benefit of the millers. They could get wheat from Duluth which is above suspicion. The English miller is hard to fool. It is not for the benefit of Manitoba, nor the miller nor the exporter, for whose benefit is the change made?"

A voice: "The Canadian Pacific Railway and the 'wheat hospital'."

Mr. McLaughlin: "That may be it, but it is going to ruin this country's reputation. From my recent conferences with English millers I know they will destroy the reputation of Manitoba wheat. It would pay every man in the world to go to Ottawa and see the Government what dire effect this practice is going to have."

Mr. McLaughlin concluded by moving that the report be adopted and a copy sent to the Government.

Mr. John Brown, in concluding the motion, said that in no country on the face of the earth would this be tolerated, save in Canada. He did not know where the responsibility for this mischievous act at Ottawa rested, but it did show "there is something rotten in the state of Denmark."

Mr. Brown said that inspectors violated the act in passing scoured wheat.

The motion carried unanimously.

The President's Address.

This stated that the affairs of the association for the past year had been prosperous, and without any complications requiring much attention from the Executive Committee, or from the president. The finances are in an eminently satisfactory condition. There had been considerable fluctuations in the wheat market. For the first time since June, 1894, prices were above the par point, and some millers were known to buy that they offered farmers as high as 41.96, delivered at the mill. In consequence of these abnormal high prices, very large quantities of wheat and flour were imported into all parts of Canada from the United States. These importations were nearly half a million bushels of wheat and 4,000 barrels of flour, or equal to three-quarter million bushels of wheat in all, on which a duty was paid of over \$100,000.

Both the farmers and millers received the full benefit of the protective duty of 15 cents per bushel on wheat and 75 cents per barrel on the flour. If there had been any real scarcity, or of course the natural trend of trade would have caused importations. Unfortunately the high prices were really caused by the millers losing their heads, with the result that while the farmers had a splendid opportunity to unload high-price wheat on the millers and grain dealers throughout the country the price of flour was relatively much below the price of wheat, and little or no flour was sold at the top figure.

Government Encouragement to Millers.

The president directed attention to the fact that the National Millers' Association of the United States, following the example of the Canadian Association, had become incorporated. Last year reference was made to the encouragements which the Government of France and Russia were giving to the milling industries. This year the president said that the Government of Argentina had approached their government with similar objects. In view of such encouragements given to the milling industries in those countries, the president said it was not surprising that the business in Canada was almost entirely agricultural, where they get very slight encouragement from the Government. Instead of using every legitimate means to encourage such a staple industry, in a land which is almost entirely agricultural in character, the Government has not listened to our reasonable representations on questions affecting us and our business.
