



The skins are next lime-washed on the flesh side and folded down the back so as to make the bellies match together. They are then left for an hour or two so that the lime will set a bit. They are then hung by the thick part of the back of the head upon enter hooks in large dark, closed sheds or rooms, and in about two days in the summer the wool will come off quite easily. 
