Santa Claus does not however, rule the whole Christian world. The St. Nicholas of Southern France and Germany is a very different person. He is more like Saturn than Silenus. He distributes gifts to good little boys and girls, but he also carries a birch rod for the naughty ones. In Bohemia, parts of Lorraine, and the Tyrol, he is attended by an evil spirit who punishes the bad boys and girls. He is almost unknown in the Latin countries and in Russia. In Italy and in Spain, the Epiphany, instead of Christmas, is the day for giving presents, on account of the legend of the Wise Men. When on their way to Bethlehem, they saw an old woman cleaning the house. 


