PLANETS.

MERCURY will be the *Morning Star* until January 16, after which it will be the *Evening Star* until March 6. It will then be the *Morning Star* until May 13, then the *Evening Star* until July 12; after which it will be the *Morning Star* until August 24. It will then be the *Evening Star* until November 1, after which it will be the *Morning Star* until Dec. 30—thence the *Evening Star*.

VENUS will be the *Evening Star* until Sept. 26; after which it will be the *Morning Star* to the close of the year.

MARS will be the *Evening Star* until April 11; after which it will be the *Morning Star* until the end of the year.

JUPITER will be the *Evening Star* until February 3; after which it will be the *Morning Star* until August 22. It will then be the *Evening Star* to the end of the year.

SATURN will be the *Evening Star* until June 10; after which it will be the *Morning Star* until Dec. 18. It will then be the *Evening Star*.

ECLIPSES IN 1855.

There will be FOUR Eclipses this year—two of the *Sun*, and two of the *Moon*.

I. May 1 and 2, A total eclipse of the Moon, *visible* in all parts of America.

The first contact with the Shadow occurs at 123° from the Northernmost point of the Moon's limb, towards the East.—The last contact at 75° towards the West.

II. May 15, A partial eclipse of the Sun, *invisible* in Nova Scotia. It may be seen in the North-Eastern part of Russia, Greenland, and in the regions of the North pole. This Eclipse will begin at 7h. 48m. A., and will end 11h. 45m. A.

III. October 25, A total eclipse of the Moon, *visible* in all parts of North America.

EXPLANATION OF THE CALENDAR PAGES.

Column.

Left Hand Page.

- 1 & 2—Contain the days of the month and of the week.
 3 & 4—The rising and setting in *mean time* of the highest point, or of the *upper limb* of the Sun, corrected for refraction.
 5—Days' length in hours and minutes.
 6—Equation of Time (or quantity by which the Sun is *slow* or *fast* of the clock at noon, *apparent*, not *mean*, time at Greenwich, or at a quarter before 8 o'clock in the morning at Halifax.
 7—The Sun's declination for the same as the Equation, 6th col.
 8—The rising or setting of the Moon—the setting being given from the New to the Full Moon, and the rising from Full to New Moon.
 9—The place of the Moon in the Ecliptic,
 10—The time of the Moon's southing or passing the meridian.
 This column also gives the time of High Water at Parrsboro', Horton, Cornwallis, Windsor, Newport, Truro, &c.

The top of the columns of each month gives the Moon's phases, or times of New and Full Moon, and of the first and last quarters, or two quadratures with the Sun.

THE FARMER'S CALENDAR is placed at the foot of the columns of each month.

 of that tide which immediately precedes the southing of the Moon.
 These four columns are computed on the supposition that the time of High Water on the days of New and Full Moon (*L'establissement du port*) is at Halifax, 7h. 30m.—at Annapolis, St. John, N. B., and Portland, 11h. 14m.—at Pictou and Cape Tormentine, 10h.—and St. John's, Newfoundland, 6h. 30m.

All the calculations are made to *mean solar* time, which has superseded the old mode of reckoning by *apparent* time.

THE PLANETS.—The hour of *meridian*, *passage*, *right ascension*, and *declination* of each of the principal planets, is given for the 1st and 15th of each month—to which is added the *mean time* transit φ , or the mean time of transit of the first point of *a* Arietis, being the mean time corresponding to 0h. 0m. 0s. of Sideral time on each of those days. By the aid of this table the time of the meridian passage of any heavenly body may be readily found. From the right ascension of the body subtract the *retardation*, which is at the rate of 9 83s. for each hour, or 0 16s for each minute of its R. A.; add the remainder to the mean time transit φ ; the sum, divide if necessary, by 24h., will be the mean time of the meridian passage of the body in question. For any other day than the 1st and 15th of the month, apply a correction at the rate of 3m. 55.91s. per day, reckoned from the nearest given day, to be added if for an earlier day, subtracted if for a later day.

The attention of our readers has been repeatedly called to the importance of mental improvement. All will readily acknowledge, that it should be the constant care of the farmer to improve the soil, but the improvement of the mind,—the matter that should receive the first attention,—is delayed or entirely neglected. "These ought ye to have done, and not to leave the other undone." Farmers *should be improved* as well as farms, and their improvement should be attended to first, and then the other will be more easily accomplished. In the agricultural community there seems to be a lack of faith as to the good effects of reading and study—they do not see the necessity of it—and, contented with their limited information, there is nothing to stimulate them to make efforts to obtain more knowledge. Give a portion of each day to reading and study—think not because you are a farmer, literary acquirements are useless. They are as necessary to the full attainment of a knowledge of agriculture, as of any other science.

Oxen and Horses, which have worked hard during the winter, will be much benefited by being allowed a respite during this month of storm and mud; and while the farmer and his boys are engaged in cutting and splitting the year's stock of wood, which has been (of course) got in by good sledding, he will find it much to his advantage to let his oxen quietly chew the cud of "sweet and bitter fancy" in the comfortable barn, or sunny barn-yard. This interval of rest will enable the animals to recover some of their flesh and strength, which have been exhausted in hauling wood and poles; their old hair becomes loose and falls off, the pores of the skin are opened, and the animals, reinvigorated, are fitted to withstand the heat and burden of the spring's labor.

During the latter part of winter and the beginning of spring, stock requires more attention than at any other season. Under the fluctuations from heat to cold, and from fair to foul, the appetite of the animal is very irregular. Cattle, sheep, and swine are now bringing forth their young, and unless they are properly sheltered, provided with suitable food, and carefully watched and attended, they will certainly fall into bad condition. The best hay should have been reserved for feeding the cows and ewes, at this period, and they should be fed, besides, with a little grain in some form, and some carrots, potatoes, turnips, or other vegetables.

Sheep may be turned to pasture almost as soon as the snow is gone. If there is grass of the previous year's growth, the sheep will derive more benefit from eating it, provided the ground is not too wet, and the pasture for the present season will be rather improved by its being cleared off. It is not expedient to turn cattle and horses to grass as early as sheep may generally be turned out, chiefly for the reason that the larger animals are liable to do injury by poaching the soil, and breaking and destroying the sward. On this account, it is proper to keep them in winter quarters till the ground is well settled and the grass is well started. Milch cows are generally brought to the barn for some time after they are first turned out, and they should be closely watched, lest they become weakened by the sudden change to green food. The best of hay, and what salt they will voluntarily eat, should be allowed them while in their stalls or yards. It is best to feed working oxen at the barn till the spring work is performed.

The first and great requisite in the successful treatment of newly transplanted trees, is to keep the surface of the soil, for many feet around them, clean and mellow by cultivation. This is important to all kinds of trees. If trees have been dug up carefully and with uninjured roots, and then well transplanted, in the first place; and the soil kept mellow, as already stated, in the second; they will usually have made so good a growth by midsummer, as to be beyond the danger of drought. A great mistake is often made by watering the roots of newly set trees, before the leaves expand, by which they become water-soaked and killed. A leafless tree is in a nearly dormant state, and throws off but little moisture. But as soon as the leaves expand, they exhale moisture rapidly, and a supply is then needed at the roots. Watering a feebly growing tree, is at best but a very irregular way of supplying it with moisture. A greatly superior protection from midsummer heat and dryness is *mulching*, or covering the surface of the earth for some feet round each tree with hay, straw, or other litter, several inches in thickness.

Stacking out hay and fodder, causes waste enough in a few years to pay for building good barns, sheds, and shelters for hay and animals. Sheds, high and dry, closed at the north, east, and west, and open at the south, are best for sheep. This gives them sufficient air, and is better for their health than close stables. The worst storms for sheep are the cold rains with easterly winds; and if they are not sheltered, they are drenched through, and when the weather changes to cold, the wool freezes on them; and if they are in low flesh, death is often the consequence. The advantages of sheltering animals by stables and sheds, are better understood now than formerly; although the old practice still lingers on some farms, where the shivering and bellowing animals speak for themselves as to its effects. If the ghosts of animals which have died for the want of shelter, could haunt the imaginations of these careless farmers, it might perhaps cause a change in their management.

Grain harvesting is an important business of the farmer, and when the season for performing it arrives, every other business should give place to it. Farmers generally let their grain stand too long before cutting. When left to get ripe, a great deal shells out and wastes in the harvesting; but if cut when the straw is green, this waste is saved, and the flour is of better quality, and the grain is heavier, as has been proved by experiment. In good weather, wheat and rye may be taken up in one day from the cradle or sickle, bound in convenient bundles, and set up in shocks of 4, 10, or 12 bundles each. With rye, a shock of bundles set up with the butts well braced, and no cap sheaf set on, is found to cure better, and in case of a long storm, is less liable to sprout than when shocked in the old way with a cap sheaf. Grain shocks will generally cure in from 8 to 10 days of ordinary hay weather; and as soon as cured, let them be secured.

There is a great advantage in commencing the fattening of animals early in the fall. Articles which are of the most perishable nature should be used first. Squashes and pumpkins, when well ripened, constitute a nourishing food for cattle or swine—for the latter it is best to cook them. They should be boiled in as little water as will answer, and when soft, they should be mashed fine, and about one-fourth of their bulk of meal intimately mixed in. This kind of food, with a little skimmed milk or whey, will fatten swine very fast; and for two months, or from the middle of September to the middle of October, we scarcely know a better article for feeding stock. The above remarks on feeding with cooked food, refer to swine; for fattening cattle, it is not certain that the use of cooked food would be attended with results sufficiently advantageous to defray the extra expense.

Punctuality in engagements is as necessary to a farmer as to a merchant. Every husbandman should carefully read and digest matter connected with his business. Wheat, rye, oats and barley, should never follow each other in a course of rotation; there should be an intervening hoe crop between them. Weeds should never be permitted to mature their seeds on a farm, but be pulled up or cut down as often as they show themselves, such being only the true way of eradicating them. To insure this result the ground should be planted in corn, and that kept clean. Thorough preparation of land is necessary to the successful and luxuriant growth of crops. Abundant crops cannot be grown for a succession of years, unless care be taken to provide an equivalent for the substances carried off the land in the products grown.

Agriculture is the necessary calling of perhaps four-fifths of the population of every age and country. Food is the first want of man, the first object of wise and laborious pursuit. An agricultural population is the main source, whence principally the *mechanic arts*, the pursuits of *commerce* and *merchandise*, and the *learned professions*, draw fresh recruits to fill up the wasting ranks of each.—A striking comment, alike on the sanitary influences of the one, and the destructive tendencies of the other.

† All printed Books admitted duty free, except re-prints of books the copyright whereof is protected by the Acts of the Imperial Parliament. On the importation of any re-prints of books, bound or in covers, the copyright of which is protected by the Acts of the Imperial Parliament, there shall be paid an *advalorem* duty of 20 per cent., but this duty shall not extend to newspapers or other regular periodicals, containing extracts only from such books—such re-prints not liable to duty unless the originals shall have been registered according to the provisions of the Imperial Act passed in the 5th and 6th years of Her Majesty's reign, entitled “An Act to amend the law of copyright.”

The Governor in Council may, whenever it shall be thought advisable so to do, declare by Proclamation what Articles, the growth, production or manufacture, of the British North American Possessions of Canada, New Brunswick, Prince Edward Island or Newfoundland, or any of them, may be imported into the Province free of duty, and may declare in what manner, and under what restrictions, the same may be so imported; but if Wheat Flour the Production of Canada, be allowed under such Proclamation to be imported duty free, such Flour shall be admitted duty free whether it comes direct from Canada or through warehouse in the United States, but in the latter case it must be certified to be the Production of Canada.

Whenever the importation into the United States of America, of the following articles of the growth and production of British North America, viz: Grain and Bread Stuffs of all kinds, Potatoes and other Vegetables, Fruits, Hops, Hay and Straw, Animals, Salted and Fresh Meats, Butter, Cheese, Lard, Tallow, Hides, Horns, Wool, undressed Skins, Furs of all kinds, Ores of all kinds, Iron in Pigs and Blooms, Copper, Lead in Pigs, Grind-Stones, and Stones of all kinds, Earth, Coals, Lime, Ochres, Gypsum ground or unground, Rock Salt, Wood, Timber, and Lumber of all kinds, Firewood, Ashes, Bark, Fish, Fish Oil, Train Oil, Spermaceti Oil, Head Matter and Blubber, Fins and Skins the produce of Fish or creatures living in the water, or any of such articles, shall be by Law admitted free from duty, the Governor in Council may by Proclamation in the Royal Gazette, fix a short day thereafter

Sambro Island—Western entrance Halifax harbor. A fixed light.

Devil's Island—An Octagonal Light Beacon on the S. W. point of Devil's Island, at the entrance of the Eastern passage to Halifax harbor, and exhibits a *red light* on the seaward sides to distinguish it from Sambro and Meagher's Beach lights—stands 45 feet above high water mark—rise and fall six feet. The Tower is painted dark brown, with a white belt between the Balcony and Lantern to distinguish it in day time.

Cross Island—Entrance to Lunenburg harbor. Two lights—flash light above ; fixed light below.

Liverpool—South end of Coffin's Island. A plain revolving light.

Port Medway—Beacon light on Admiralty Head, west side of the entrance to the Port. Building Square, painted white with black square in the centre of the seaward sides, plain white light 44 feet above sea level, and stands within 30 fathoms of the shore.

Shelburne—McNutt's Island. Two fixed lights, one above the other.

Barrington—Baccaro Point, east side of the entrance to Barrington Bay. A flash light of 15 seconds.

Yarmouth—West side of the harbor. A plain revolving light.

Cape Sable, Seal Island—The first light on approaching the Bay of Fundy, is on the south point of Seal Island. A plain white light, elevated about 80 feet above high-water mark, and may be seen on approaching the Island from any point of the compass.

Brier Island—A plain white light, situate about half a mile N. E. from the N. W. point of the Island.

Westport—Peter's Island, at the south entrance, of the east side of the Bay of Fundy. Two WHITE LIGHTS, placed horizontally (to distinguish it from Brier Island Light,) at an elevation of 40 feet above high-water mark.

Digby Gut Light—On the west side of Digby Gut, from Brier Island north-eastward. This light is chiefly intended as a guide into Digby Basin. A fixed white light.

Black Rock Light—On the South Shore of the Bay of Fundy. A fixed light.

Horton Bluff Light—In the Basin of Mines, 95 feet above sea level high-water—rise and fall 40 to 45 feet. Building square, painted white; stands 60 feet from the Bluff, and shows a White Light, which may be seen in clear weather over the greatest part of the Basin of Mines, (after passing Cape Blowmedon,) and above the Five Islands and up Windsor River, until intercepted by the continuation of the Bluff to the southward of it.

Apple River Light—North side of the entrance to Apple River, in Chignecto or Cumberland Bay. Two fixed Lights placed horizontally.

Partridge Island River—An Octagonal Light Beacon on the west side of the entrance to Partridge Island River, Parrsboro', on the north side of the Basin of Mines, and exhibits a plain white light, at an elevation of 30 feet above high-water—rise and fall about 45 feet—the Tower is white, and stands close to high-water mark on the beach.

Eastern Beaver, or Williams' Island—A Revolving Light.

Canseau, Cranberry Island—Two fixed Lights, one above the other, west side of the Gut of Canseau. A fixed Light.

Eddy or Sand Point Light—On Eddy or Sand Point on the west side of the south entrance to the Strait of Canseau, distinguished by two white lights placed horizontally, 25 feet above the sea level.—Building square, painted white with a black diamond on the seaward side.

Guysborough Harbor Beacon—On the west side of the entrance to the harbor, head of Chedabucto Bay. A fixed Light.

Pictou Light—On the south-east side of the entrance to the harbor. A fixed Light.

Arichat Beacon—A Light on Point Marichi, on the east side of the southern entrance to the harbor. Building square, painted *white*. A White Light 34 feet above the sea level.

Louisburg—On the east side of the entrance to the harbor. A fixed Light.

Low Point Light—East side of Sydney, Cape Breton, harbor. A fixed Light.

Rugged Island Harbor Light—On the Gull Rock, at the entrance of the harbor. Building square, and painted *white*, exhibiting a clear fixed light at an elevation of 51 feet above the sea level, and is situated in lat. 43, 36 N., and long. 65, 66 West.

Pubnico Harbor Light—A Beacon light on the S. E. side of the entrance to Pubnico harbor, situated on the east side of the entrance to the Bay of Fundy, about 13 miles northerly of Cape Sable. Building square, painted *white*. A fixed red light on the seaward side, 23 feet above high-water level, (rise and fall 12 feet,) and stands 50 fathoms from low-water mark.

St. Paul's Island—A fixed Light on the north-east end; and a Flash Light on the south-west end.

Scatarie Island—A Revolving Light on the east end of the Island.

Gannet Rock Light—This Light is intended to warn vessels of their approach to a very dangerous range of shoals and ledges, which extend from the Old Proprieter to the Seal Islands off Machias, a distance of about 20 miles. A *WHITE Flash Light*, 20 seconds dark, and 40 seconds light in each minute. Building painted in stripes, vertical, black and white.

Machias Seal Island Lights—Two Fixed White Lights upon the Machias Seal Islands, 45 feet above high-water, and bearing from each other E. S. E. and W. N. W. distant about 200 feet, by which circumstance of two Light Houses at the same station, they will be immediately distinguished from all other lights upon the coast, British or American. Both buildings painted *white*.

Head Harbor Light—Next in order after passing Grand Manan, and the plain White Light (American) on West Quoddy Point, is Head Harbor Light, placed on the N. E. extremity of Campo Bello, and is a guide to vessels entering the main channel to West Isles, Moose Island, and the Inner Bay of Passamaquoddy; it enables vessels also, at all times, to enter Head Harbor. A fixed white Light. Building painted *white*, with a *red* cross on it.

Point Le Preau Lights—Upon this projecting head land Two Lights are placed, one above the other in the same house, and distant 23 feet. Both lights can be seen from every point of the compass where they may be useful—both are Fixed and White. Building painted *red* and *white*, in stripes, 5 feet broad each, horizontally.

Partridge Island Light—At the entrance of the river and harbor of

St. John, N. B. A fixed white light; the building painted *red* and *white* in vertical stripes.

Beacon Light—Within Partridge Island, and upon a spit or bar which extends about half a mile S. S. E. off Sand Point, and which dries at two-thirds ebb, stands the Beacon Tower. A fixed white light; building painted *white* and *red* in horizontal stripes.

Quaco Light—A Revolving White Light, placed on a small rock off Quaco Head, showing twice full and twice dark in a minute. The light can be seen from any quarter where a vessel can approach. Building painted *white* and *red* in horizontal stripes.

Cape Enrage Light—On the Point of that name in Westmoreland, nearly opposite Apple River Harbor, N. S. Building painted *white*, about 120 feet above the tide. A plain white light.

The Mails for Bermuda and the British West Indies are made up at Halifax *once a month*—closing on the arrival of the Mail Steamers from Boston. Letters 5d—when posted in the interior, 3d additional, this must be pre-paid.

Pamphlets, Magazines, Periodicals, or Books, bound or unbound, done up in covers open at the ends, unaccompanied by any written communication, may be transmitted as above mentioned, at the rate of *one half-penny per oz.*, up to 48 ounces, beyond which weight they cannot be sent by Mail.

Letters posted in any Town within the Province for delivery in the same Town, are liable to a rate of *one penny* for every $\frac{1}{2}$ oz.

Books, Magazines, Reviews, and Pamphlets, whether British, Foreign or Colonial, can be sent from the United Kingdom to Nova Scotia, or *vice versa*, at the following rates—not exceeding $\frac{1}{2}$ lb. 7 $\frac{1}{2}$ d; over $\frac{1}{2}$ lb. and not 1 lb. 1s 3d; over 1 lb. and not 2 lbs. 2s 6d; and so on, adding 1s 3d for every additional pound, or fraction of a pound—*postage must be pre-paid*.

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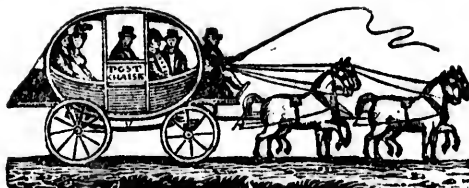
