LAURIER AN OPPORTUNIST Murdered in Roof Garden For "Deserting the Girl"

Prominent New York Architect is Shot Down by Member of High Pittsburg Family While Enjoying Performance-Ruined Girl and Disappointed Life at Bottom of It.

New York, June 25.—Stanford White, the eminent architect, a member of the firm of McKim, Mead & White, was shot to-night and almost instantly killed by Harry Thaw, a member of a prominent Pittsburg family, during the performance of the musical extravaganza, "Mam'selle Champagne," on the roof of the Madison Square Garden. Mr. White died before an ambulance could be summoned, and Thaw was arrested immediately 'after the shooting.

The prisoner was taken to the West Thirtieth Station, where he described himself as John Smith, a student of 18 Cafe and later of 18 Cafe and letters and cards addressed to Harry Thaw of Pittsburg, and later his identity was fully established.

It twas reported that the woman who accompanied Mr. White was Evelyn Nesbitt, whose marriage with Thaw estranged the latter from his family. The shooting occurred at 10.30 p.m., while Harry Shorte was singing "I Could Love a Million Girls."



ular set of immigrants in Canada would prove a terror to the peaceful unities in which they settled lown does not seem likely; yet it is the truth. Years ago the Canadian government and Clifford Sifton, minister of the interior, thought Galicians walld make the best settlers; so as many of them as positible were brought to this country. At present there are more than 6000 in Winnipeg and about 60,000 scattered about the prairies.

Recently those living in Winnipeg have gained notoriety thru several atrocious crimes, ranging up to murder. The police say the crimes may be traced to a gang of about 80 young men who came to Canada together and settled as near as possible in one locality. At home they had served in the army, but without restraint in Canada they at once began careers of crime. They have formed small bands and almost every night the police patrol is called out to quell a fight.







It is, however, unlikely that either of these entered into the market as a factor in price making. A lower range of quotations is desired by the lending interests, and this is being carefully proceeded with. The play to retain long accounts favors liquidating, and, to prevent short commitments, has been in progress several weeks. The end of a campaign of this variety usually winds up with suggestions of a panicky nature, when purchases may be judiciously made for profits on the inevitable rally. Considerable sums will be required for the July dividend disbursements, and a general call for heavier margins will provide New York with a good deal of outside money. The market has not had drastic treatment enough yet to warrant confidence that a bottom has temporarily been reached.
