OIL INTO TORCH CAN CAUSED "PICTON" FIRE

Unexpected Evidence of Jas. Kane at Inquest Explains Outbreak of Saturday's Fatal Blaze---Officials Secured Admission.

JURY CENSURES COMPANY FOR THE POOR FIRE DRILL

That George Kleskie came to his seath by being suffocated on the Steamer Picton on Sept. 21 as a result of an outbreak of fire caused by an inexperienced hand accidentally dropping his torch.

A sensation was sprung last night at Coroner Wilson's inquest into the death of George Kleskie, who died on the burning steamer "Picton" last Saturday, when James Kane, a laborer, residing at 86 Sherbourne-street, who had been hired as a wiper at noon on Saturday by Petit, the second engineer, told in the box how he ac cidentally set the boat on fire.

The R. and O. Navigation Co. officlais have been in Toronto since Sunday afternoon investigating the cause of the fire, and late yesterday afternoon, after close examination, Kane admitted what he knew.

A man of thirty-six years of age, sharp looking, with pointed features, Kane at first was afraid of the consequences and did not tell all to the officials. Later he made a clean breast

Called to the box after several witnesses had been fruitlessly examined.
Kane began to answer the crown attorney's questions in his own plain way, how he had been taken on the yay, now he had been taken on the job as wiper about noon Saturday, telling how the second engineer had instructed and helped him to clean the piston rods of the big engines, of the leaving for his bearding house to his leaving for his boarding house to change his clothes and his return to the boat. His torch had needed oil and odown on the lower deck of the engine he had noticed a large oil tank. Down he went to fill his can, which would be needed later when the boat got out for shore. The coal oil tank was about 4 ft. high and about 4 ft. .. in. in length, situated about 4 or 5 ft. from the boiler.

How It Happened. "I tried to fill my lamp lighted from ne oil. Somehow I dropped about a half pint of oil. The oil caught fire and a sudden blaze went up. I called to the engineer to bring a pail of water. I went there as a green hand and was not employed in this boat be-

"That's how this fire took place?" asked Mr. Drayton. 'Yes," said Kane.

"The fire burned your fingers and you let the torch drop?"
"Yes. I did it accidentally. Coming out of the tap someway the light caught and I got excited and dropped The oil went over my hand."
"Where was the coal oil put in?"

"About 8 inches off the wick. I don't know, but somehow it caught." Appliances on the Picton. Capt. Redfern, the first witness, said that the fire appliances were inspected by the government last spring. There were forty-five full crews, and the goy-ernment required twenty men to operate the appliances. The last fire drill was held on Aug. 27. The reason the appli-ances were not able to cope with the fire was that the pump was in the en-gine-room, where the fire broke out. A. Demortigny, the chief engineer for three seasons, said that the fire fighting consisted of five steam and two hand pumps. There was about thirty or forty gallons of oil on hand, kept in separtanks, removed from the furnace. There was not over a pound of dirty

waste in the engine-room.

Joseph Pettit, the second engineer, was on the watch. Kleskie and another man were on deck. They had not been in the fire-hole for 15 minutes. Witness heard Kane call fire. The hose was working inside a minute. He went to the engine-room and stayed there about 8 or 10 minutes. When he first saw the fire there was lots of smoke. 



MOUND BUILDERS' RELICS

Valuable Specimens in Souris, Man., District.

Professor Montgomery of the University of Toronto has been prosecuting researches in the Souris district of Manitoba for relics of the ancient mound builders. No mounds have ever been found near Souris, but on the banks of the Souris River, where the north and south Antler Creeks join the main stream, there are some twenty mounds.

Professor Montgomery has opened seven of these and took from them 10 complete human skeletons and besides numerous pieces of broken pottery, two whole urns. The mounds were found to be typical of those found in Dakota and further south with and in Dakota and further south with one exception. In this he found the complete skeletons of six buffaloes, which had evidently been buried with a sacrificial purpose.

Eight large boxes and five crates of

specimens were shipped to the To-ronto University. Professor Mont-gothery believes that these mounds were built at least 700 years ago. In the vicinity of Souris the pro-fessor found an Indian grave, in which a squaw was buried, perhaps a century ago. Bead ornaments were century ago. Bead ornaments were the sonly relics secured. There is evidence of an Indian village on the banks of Plum Creek, where numerous arrow heads and broken pieces of pottery have been found, turned up by the plow. The style of pottery indicates that it is probably 500 years since the village method.

WANT FRUIT INSPECTOR. Grocers' Section of Retail Merchants

Voice Their Indignation. The grocers section of the Retail

Merchants' Association held their first monthly meeting of the fall season last night.

The report of the joint committee of fruit dealers, butchers and grocers was received re the appointment of a fruit inspector, and the decision reached was that a representative should visit Ottawa and lay the facts

before the Hon. Mr. Fisher. There was quite a discussion ove the very unsatisfactory yield of the fruit this season. It was stated that it has been the poorest yield for the last twenty years, and that the fruit has been dearer in proportion to the scarcity than has been ever known to

the knowldge of those present. Complaints were made that of the large quantities of fruit which came in the bottom layer was much poor er than the top, and this is one of the greatest needs for a fruit inspector.

Reduction in Ocean Rates. The C.P.R. steamship department notified their representative. Mr. S. J. 



MARKET DOES NOT INSPIRE CONFIDENCE

World Office, Monday Evening, Sept. 23.

The action of the Toronto market to-day was not any too reassuring, taken as a whole. There were instances of strength, but these were offset by spots of weakness, and to an observer of the transactions, the situation presented a muddled appearance. Where liquidation was present or promising, support recoiled to a safe distance. Sales were not heavy, but as purchases and not liquidation are now courted, the day was not an acceptable one to the leading market interests.
