# DEVELOP THE BOY AN EXALT THE NATION

T. C. Robinette's Splendid Address at Massey Hall Results in Generous Subscriptions to the Newsboys' Home—\$450 Added to Fund.

Why do we treat our boys less carefully than a house or lot? Boys are naturally good, and want to do what is right, only they need to be told how. Nine boys out of ten err on account of ignorance.

No nation can rise higher in the scale of civilization than the character of its boys.

Learn to obey your Maker and His laws; the laws of your physical being, and the laws of your country.

The young man who will break the law is a fool.

The assets of Canada are the boys and girls of our country. The boy tills the soil, sows the grain, grinds the grain, fits it for commerce, and sends it out to feed the world.

He is the blood that beats in the great heart of the nation. See to it, then, that these boys be good red blood, pure and undefiled.

The boy question has its economic side. Apart from the plucking of juvenile brands from the burning with the laudable object of saving their souls alive, the boy has a monetary value, as political economists all the world over acknowledge. It is an absorbing phase of the subject, and it is not to be wondered at that Massey Hall, despite the drizzling rain, held an eager audience of over 3000 people last night to hear T. C. Robinette, K.C., discuss "The Boy as a National Asset."

Mr. Robinette is a practical man as well as an eloquent advocate. He succeeded during his address on "The Boy as a National Asset" in impressing his hearers with the fact that they had placed directly before them an opportunity to help develop that asset. He was pleading for the cause of the newsboys' home, and his persuasive powers were such that, at the close, the building committee found themselves about \$450 nearer their goal.

In addition to the silver collection taken at the door, each one who entered was presented with an envelope containing a slip which set forth good and sufficient reasons by a substantial amount of legal aid. A fat cheque should be placed therein. Many in the audience found the argument convincing.

\$100 From Hamilton.  
"We cannot do too much for down town Toronto," declared Mr. Robinette. "I am asking assistance for 600 boys who represent 400 homes, nearly all of them down town near the city hall. These 400 homes send out these little merchants of the street, and, in many cases, they gather in the pennies which support these homes. Some could tell many stories illustrating the nobility of these little boys. We are a community, and in a position to help. Some gentlemen conceived the idea that it would be a good thing to have a central home for these boys, where they might be educated and taken care of, and it is a good one."

Mr. Robinette roused much enthusiasm by his reading of a telegram addressed to the Newsboys' Fund committee. It was from F. W. Brennan, a Hamilton business man, and ran: "I will give \$100 to the newsboys' home and club building fund, and I will give a substantial contribution later on."

Right on the heels of this pleasing communication came another, also from Mr. Brennan, who had evidently not satisfied with his personal contribution, been doing some missionary work. It was addressed to Mr. Robinette, and laconically stated "Another hundred from a leading merchant of Hamilton."

But that wasn't all. Mr. Robinette soon rose to intimate that the beneficent epidemic was spreading. Result: Another hundred this time from that well-known citizen, A. Orpen, and there was another outburst of hand-clapping and buzz of excited comment from the newsmen in the top gallery.

Mr. Robinette also announced afterwards that a prosperous citizen of Toronto had informed him that he would give a substantial contribution later on.

Orchestra Gave Recital.  
The opening overture by the orchestra of 21 pieces from Shea's Theatre, under the exceptionally able leadership of Gus Naumann, was of a splendid order of musical excellence. The various orchestral selections which interspersed the program, from the mellow softness of "Ave Maria" to the patriotic "The Good Old 'Maple Leaf'" at the conclusion. The services of the orchestra, as were those of the other contributors, were freely given out of a desire to aid the cause of the newsboys, and the audience was not slow to appreciate the fact.

Following the overture, Rev. Dr. Chambers, governor of Toronto jail, whose kindly interest in the newsboys has been frequently shown, offered a brief prayer in which he gave thanks

## NO NEW SUBSIDIES TO RAILWAYS THIS YEAR

Amount Revoted Will Total Twenty Millions—Mileage is Over Three Thousand.

OTTAWA, April 24.—(Special.)—No new railway subsidies are announced for this year. Hon. Geo. F. Graham has given notice of a resolution, and every case mentioned in a revote. The total mileage for which subsidies will be granted is 3148, for which, if the limit of \$6400 per mile is paid, the cost will be \$20,147,200. Amongst the railways mentioned are the following: St. Marys and Western Ontario, Embro to Exeter, 36 miles. Manitoulin and North Shore (a), from a point between Little Current and Sudbury towards Algoma Central, 76 miles; (b) Little Current to Stanley and Sudbury, 88 miles; from Sudbury northward, 90 miles. Algoma Central (a) from Sault Ste. Marie to the C.P.R. between White River and Dalton, 200 miles; (b) from Michipicoten to C.P.R., 25 miles; (c) from C.P.R. to National Transcontinental, 50 miles.

Bracebridge and Trading Lake Railway, from Bracebridge to Baysville, 16 miles. Ontario Northern and Temagami Railway, from Sturgeon Falls to Lake Temagami, 50 miles. Nipigon Railway (a) from Nipigon Station to Nipigon Lake, 30 miles; (b) from Nipigon Bay to Lake Helen, 1.2 miles; (c) from crossing of French River to Lake Jesse, 1.2 miles; (d) from Lake Nipigon northward, 45 miles. For line of railway from Sharbot Lake or Bathurst Station via Lanark Village to Carleton Place, 41 miles. Erie, London and Tilsonburg Railway, from Port Burwell to London, 55 miles. Toronto, Lindsay and Pembroke Railway, from Golden Lake to Bancroft, 51 miles. Kingston, Smith's Falls and Ottawa Railway Company, from Kingston to Ottawa, 101 miles.

## BOYCOTTING IRISH COURT

The Nobility Boast They Will Not Attend Liberal Court.

LONDON, April 24.—The persistent boycott of the Irish court by the Irish nobility is attracting the attention of London society. The boycott amounts almost to a scandal. Lord and Lady Aberdeen's second drawing room was recently attended by the Irish nobility and minor aristocracy, who openly boast that they will not permit their wives or daughters to attend a Liberal court. The chief question in politics now is the date of the general election. Premier Asquith will not give a hint, but it is probable that the election will not take place until the autumn. It is known that the King objects to the dissolution of parliament early in the summer because it would spoil the social season and ruin the fashionable retail trade. The King is a few days from the Liberal cabinet. It is probable that it will defer to his wishes.

## FAREWELL TO SIR RICHARD

Hon. Sidney Fisher Will Succed Him As Leader of Senate.

OTTAWA, April 24.—(Special.)—The banquet which the members of the senate will tender to Sir Richard Cartwright on Tuesday next is in the nature of a farewell. Sir Richard is at present leader of the government in the upper house, but his physical condition is such that he cannot longer undertake the duties of that office. Hon. Sidney Fisher will succeed him the opportunity to a vacancy having occurred thru the death recently of Senator Baker.

## HOPING TO DEFER ELECTION TILL NEXT YEAR

Unionists Not Anxious for an Early Appeal to the People—No Struggle Likely Till Autumn at Earliest—Rumors and Gossip.

NEW YORK, April 24.—The Tribune's London correspondent cables: The political atmosphere is heavy with rumors of a compromise. A story is making the rounds of the clubs that the lords will evade decisive action on the veto resolution, on the ground that the reform of their house must be undertaken before the relations of the two chambers can be determined. There are intimations that Lord Rosebery's scheme and the veto proposals will be referred to committees and discussed in detail until a compromise on all outstanding constitutional questions has been effected. These rumors are rounded out with forecasts that there will not be a general election this year. Nobody in touch with the government expects to show faith in these schemes of conciliation, and the lords themselves are amused by the credulity of the rumormongers. The reports emanate from the Unionist ranks and indicate the depression of spirits prevailing there. The Unionists are more anxious than the Radicals to defer the election until next year. They admit that the position of the government has improved, and that the chancellor's explanations of the condition of the treasury are more favorable than their friend or foe could have expected. They dread the result of a premature election held on the direct issue of the veto bill as a basis of settlement. They are hoping that the King will succeed in promoting an adjustment of some kind when he returns to England, and that an appeal to the country will be avoided until the coalition shows signs of breaking up.

Radicals Follow Redmond. The Radicals themselves are not talking about a compromise. They have taken their cue from John Redmond, who asserts that the government on the veto question, involving an election in June or July, will be best for them. Every day no longer dreads a contest with the Tories in Ireland, since his prestige has been restored by his brilliant success as a politician, and the Radicals are invigorated by the rapid progress of the budget and the harmonious relations among the coalition groups. Parliament will adjourn the coming week for the long recess with a more buoyant feeling on the government side than in the past. The Liberal members will not discuss the veto as an issue of paramount importance. They are in the disposition for a compromise of the part of the Radical, Labor and Irish factions. They insist on having a straight and unqualified fight on the abolition of privilege. Moreover, a compromise cannot be arranged without a prolonged, heated discussion of various expedients, and the Radicals are like that which preceded the adoption of the American Constitution, with Washington and Franklin as chief peacemakers.

## Must Pay Up Back Taxes.

According to The New York Sun's London correspondent, now that the budget has been introduced in the house of commons with the gullotine guarantee that it will pass its third reading on April 27, English men are confronted with the necessity of raising the wind to pay their income taxes, which payment has been held up since Jan. 1 by the squabble between the house of lords and the house of commons. The excise authorities have issued intimations this week that the tax must be paid. No grace will be allowed to dilatory Englishmen and Americans subject to the tax. The excise authorities threaten to use summary processes to enforce the collection. They intimate that they will distrain the property of delinquents within a month or issue summonses of arrest.

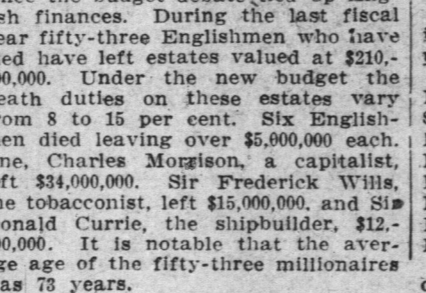

## SECRET HISTORY WOULD ANNOY THE PUBLIC

Premier Whitney's Allusion to Struggle That Was Made for Disallowance of Power Legislation—Question Settled Now and Forever.

After a few days' consideration Sir James Whitney has issued his promised statement commenting upon the report of the minister of justice in answer to the petition for disallowance of the hydro-electric act of 1909. Sir James' comments are characteristic, and his sentences almost say, "I told you so." He says:

"The decision of the judicial committee of the privy council in the case of the Florence Mining Co. and the refusal of the Dominion government to disallow the Ontario statute known as the hydro-electric legislation of 1909, together with the beginning of a new era in constitution and development under the British North America Act. It is now certain that in the future there will be no further attempts—at any rate no successful attempts—to minimize or destroy the powers of a provincial legislature acting within the limits of its jurisdiction. The unfair and dishonest methods adopted against this legislation, which I can only touch upon in passing, prove clearly that when men's pockets govern their action they are not, as a rule, particular as to the nature of the means they are willing to adopt in order to succeed.

## A Bitter Campaign.

"From the beginning, the electric interests in Toronto, the electric were the bitter opponents of this legislation. All the stock gamblers were united. An emissary was sent over to England, and the so-called financial journals there blossomed out with editorials made up very largely of misrepresentation and wholly untrue falsehoods. The result, however, has proved disastrous to the idea that these journals have any real power or influence. Every imaginable inducement over there—social, political, private and public—was retained where possible, and all who realize the strength of such combinations in London will at once appreciate what this means.

"Then, however, were sent out among the farmers owing large debts which the transmission lines was to pass, loaded up with all manner of spread, bribery and abuse, and the people. Last and not least—the opposition in the legislature, after proclaiming the virtues of the producer gas, the defects of electric power, and the general wickedness of the legislation, finally settled down along with the electric interests, and has remained there ever since, using all in its power to destroy the hydro-electric power scheme. Thru all this time of stress and peril, the press of Ontario, in the main, stood squarely by the provincial position.

## Sensational Secrets.

To the applications for disallowance, an answer was put in by the provincial government. The same great pressure was again brought into play, and when, it ever, the secret history of this matter is made public, the people will, indeed, be amazed. Those who have looked thru a red-covered pamphlet entitled, "The Credit of Canada," and who have seen the program of the Ontario Legislature, will be able to form some idea of the efforts that were made, and to roughly estimate the amount of money which was expended.

"It was said a few days ago by one of the most bitter enemies of the legislation, 'If we are not much misled, there was a very strong feeling in the cabinet in favor of disallowance.' Possibly this was said from knowledge; at any rate, the program, apparently desired to be so understood, and the assertion, perhaps, caused no surprise to those who have common West Indian opinion in the Canadian merchants have shown an almost contemptuous indifference to their opportunities."

#### ARE DECEASED IDEALS FOR CANADIAN CHILDREN

Hamilton Preacher Lauds Robertson, Gage and McDougall— Shut Up in Box Car.

HAMILTON, April 24.—(Special.)—That John Robertson of the Toronto Telegram, W. J. Gage and Rev. George McDougall were ideals for the Canadian children, and that they were all assured a place in heaven for their benevolence and good deeds, was the statement of Rev. Lewis H. Hill, B.A., of Burlington, in Charlton-avenue Church to-night. Mr. Robertson would be rewarded because of his interest in the Sick Children's Hospital, and God would smile on him, while the angels would go to meet him. Mr. Gage would get credit for his work in connection with the Gravenhurst Sanitarium and Rev. Mr. McDougall for his work among the Indians.

Christ Church Cathedral was crowded to-night when Rev. Dean DuMoulin of Cleveland, Ohio, preached to the members of St. George's Society. John Henry, 26 Wilson-street, died very suddenly last night. He arrived home about 8 o'clock and shortly afterwards became ill, dying in a few moments. Heart failure was the cause. He was 76 years of age, and leaves a wife and three children.

The Catholic Societies of the city attended St. Lawrence Church this afternoon, when Rev. Father Walsh, a Dominican, preached a sermon. The mission that has been on there for two weeks was closed to-night. William Henry Marshall of Saltfleet died this morning. In celebration of their 51st anniversary, the members of the I.O.O.F. attended the First Methodist Church this afternoon. Rev. E. B. Lancelotti preached.

About \$300 damage was done. Willie Arndt, George Schwell and George McLean of London, had a thrilling experience recently. James Arndt, formerly of London, had secured a situation in Hamilton. The door of the car was locked and sealed and they were prisoners. **NO PATIENT EVER REFUSED**  
Statement as to Tuberculosis Patient's Plight is Denied.  
J. S. Robertson, executive secretary of the two sanitariums at Muskoka, and the two near Weston, writes as follows:  
"The newspapers of to-day (Saturday) report the case of a suit in the divisional court to annul the payment of a sum of money out of court to Miss Agnes Sutton's relatives, to enable them to pay a board bill incurred with people who had turned her out because she was suffering from tuberculosis. The report goes on to say: 'Where the unfortunate victim of the white plague was to go in view of the fact that no sanitarium would take her in view of the advanced stage of the disease, does not appear to have been considered.'  
"Permit me to say that so far as the two sanitariums near Weston are concerned, namely the Toronto Free Hospital for Consumptives and the King Edward Sanitarium, these are established especially for patients in the advanced and far advanced stages of tuberculosis, and no applicant has ever been refused admission into either of these institutions because of the advanced stage of the disease. For nearly a year past, with the increased accommodation provided these two institutions, patients in the advanced stages of the disease have been promptly admitted on application, whilst in the two sanitariums at Muskoka, namely the Muskoka Cottage Sanitarium and the Muskoka Free Hospital for Consumptives—equal promptness has been exercised in the admission of patients in the incipient stages of the disease.  
"Perhaps in no country have so complete arrangements been made for the care of consumptives in all stages of the disease, as in the Province of Ontario."

#### BROTHERHOOD OF MAN AND UNIVERSAL PEACE

Canon Plumtre Preaches to Members of St. George's Society on the Golden Age.

Before a congregation which taxed the capacity of St. James' Cathedral, Canon Plumtre preached an eloquent sermon in commemoration of St. George's Day yesterday evening. The members of the society attended in a body, and in honor of the occasion the organ of St. George's was played.

"The blood red cross on a field of white"—which has cheered many a doughty paladin on to further deeds of valor, rested against the pulpit. To the right of the chancel a large Union Jack made a splash of vivid coloring against the white background of the surplised choir.

"Men who make their wealth by the employment of labor should realize that their responsibility towards their employes does not end at the cease of the day's work," said Canon Plumtre. Basing his sermon on the 4th chapter of Micah, the speaker stated that the prophet in spite of wars and the rumors of wars with which the atmosphere at that time was permeated saw ahead the time when the brotherhood of man should come about, and the weapons of war be turned into implements of agricultural use.

This golden age of which the prophet dreamed pointed to a common worship to knit nations together, for only in the united worship of one God will the brotherhood of man be realized.

There are some broadminded people, the speaker continued, who indulge in no such vision. They are quite content to leave the religious map of the world a patchwork of colors. But that view was bad political economy.

The golden age also meant universal peace when war would be abolished and armaments cease. For 18 centuries the church had prayed for this consummation, but the day of universal peace was still some distance off. But changes had been wrought in private life, for where in former years the duel had settled differences between man and man, recourse was now had to the courts of law. Further, arbitration treaties had come about between several nations, and many disputes had been settled by peace tribunals.

God grant that here in Canada it will never be necessary to spend large sums in the upkeep of armaments," said Canon Plumtre.

In touching on the work of the society he stated that for 75 years it had done good work in relieving distress, and from the fact that only 211 cases were relieved last year he drew the conclusion that a much better class of immigrant was coming to the country.

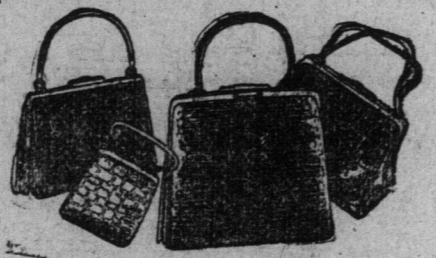

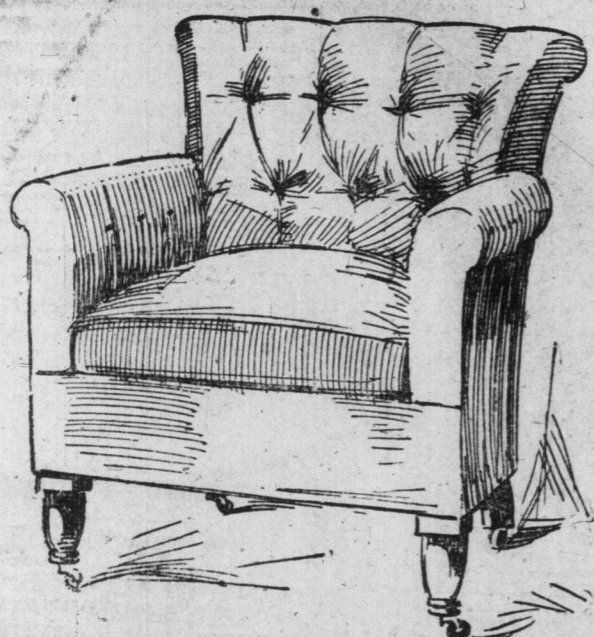
