## IS NO BLUFFING ON EITHER SIDE IN MACSWINEY CASE

Government Has No Intention of Releasing Him at Eleventh Hour.

#### CLAIM HE HAS NO PAIN

London, Sept. 13 .- Assurances that there is no element of bluffing in the respective attitudes of the British government and the Irish Nationalists. relative to the MacSwiney case, were obtained from responsible sources of each faction by the Associated Press this afternoon.

"If the Sinn Feiners think we are biding our time and will capitulate when MacSwiney's condition requires eleventh-hour action in order to save his life, they are mistaken." This characterizes the British official view, as expressed to the correspondent.

"There can be no question about our desire or intention of having Lord Mayor MasSwiney recede from the tragic stand he has taken," declared an official at the London headquarters of the Irish Nationalist organization. "If he is not released voluntarily by the government, he will most certainly go down in history as the first Irish hunger striker to perish in an English

The great majority of the growers in the fruit belt were not in the path of the storm. Their crops are so large that it is doubtful if the storm will cause any boost in prices. Bunting who was fortunate enough to have a supply of baskets on hand, disposed of his entire stock today, having

W. H. Bunting had 1500 bushels of late tomatoes alone to pick this week. Today he says he will not be able to get fifty baskets. George I. Their names were: Thompson, East Peterboro; Benneweiss, South Perth; Richardson, East Wellington, and Wigle, South Essex. The first two are Conservatives, and the other two Liberals. The witness said the company had a paid-up capital of \$46.000, and explained that about six weeks before the last genabout six weeks before the last general elections they secured a permit from former minister of lands, forests and mines, Howard Ferguson, to cut timber in Sheridan-township. The area had not been advertised.

To Judge Riddell, Mr. Heytance said

the government dues on the lumber cut were, in his opinion, too high. How-ever, they had been paid. George H. Rapsay, an official of the game and fisheries department, admitted having negotiated in 1917 with the government for fishing rights on Lake Nipigon. He was then in partnership with Col. J. A. Little, and when later the government engaged in the fish business the partnership was dissolved. He then en-tered the government service as superent of the department of game

and fisheries.

Rapsay admitted that he took out nine mining licenses on the Black bay peninsula and three quarry claims. He said that he, with W. H. Russell, Alonzo Nuttal, and Capt. W. F. Nuttal, were to have quarter interests in these quarries from which gravel was to be taken. Russell and Rapsay financed the deal, witness having put up \$7000 or \$8000. Justice Latchford: "You knew Rus-

sell wanted pulp?"







New York, Sept. 13.—Dulness and an uncertain movement of prices were the salient icharacteristics of today's stock market, observance of the Jewish holiday, accounting largely for the smaller dealings.

The stronger reserve showing of the federal reserve and clearing house banks impelled some short covering at the onset, when part of last Saturday's losses were retrieved. In the main, however, declines preaviled among leaders of the industrial and special groups. Sales amounted to 335,000 shares.

Recent anomalous conditions in the market for foreign exchange continued, remittances to London, Paris and other international centres recording further declines. A new loan rate since last March of \$3.45% for demand sterling was established in the course of the season.

Gold imports assumed more impressive dimensions, some \$4,000,000 being received for the French account, with an additional \$2,800,000 from

Gold imports assumed more impressive dimensions, some \$4,000,000 being received for the French account, with an additional \$2,800,000 from South Africa, via London. From this last source the inflow so far on the current movement approximates \$30,000.000.

Money Rates Steady.

Domestic monetary conditions were the object of more than ordinary solicitude because of the heavy payments to be made during the midweek for federal income and excess profits taxes by many large industrials companies as well as individuals.

This prospective drain was without material effect on money rates, all of the day's call loans being made at 7 per cent. Very little time money was obtainable at 8½ to 8% per cent. for sixty and ninety days, no over year loans being reported.
