CITY FIRE LOSS \$10,500,000 OVER DOZEN MAJOR BLAZES

Chief's Annual Report to Be Presented To-Day—Two-Fifths of Alarms Were Telephoned.

The annual report of the fire department, which will be presented by Chief Thompson to the fire and light committee to-day, will contain a statement of the biggest loss by fire that the city has sustained in its history.

The figures as compiled by Secretary McGowan and Statistician Reddock of the department will set forth an approximate loss of \$10,500,000, which amount has never been at all approached in any previous year.

It may be said, are based entirely upon the figures furnished by the insurance companies and are therefore as conservative as could be wished.

The amount remaining exhibits the greatest damage done by fire in five years, Chief Thompson states that during the four preceding years the fire loss had been much below the average and in the 1904 record, omitting the April incident, is about on a parity with that of 1903, the past ten years' average.

There were 771 alarms during the year, as against 867 in 1904. Among the minor confagurations, some of the heaviest losses sustained were the following: Hamilton-street School, Jesse Ketchum School, Menzies, Turner & Co., Thompson Mattress Co., Merchants Dyeing and Finishing Co., William Croft, and the Ontario Hotel.

Telephone Alarms Increasing The telephone as a means of sending in an alarm is becoming more and more a prominent factor.

The number of false alarms has fallen off somewhat owing, it is understood, to the lessons taught by the diligent prosecutions that have taken place and the greater vigilance of the police.

The death of Fireman Arthur Potter of Hose 1, from inhaling sulphuric acid fumes, was the only fatality suffered during the year, but a good many of the men, including the chief himself, suffered from injuries more or less serious.

New equipment during the year included the reconstruction of aerial truck L, a new truck for H, and L, L, a new wagon for Hose 1, a new wagon for Hose 13 and the rebuilding of two fire engines.

This year has started badly for Canada, with the destruction of the Canada Carriage Works at Brockville, with \$300,000 loss.
