HEALTH.
The removal to our new building with its large, lofty rooms has not only added considerably to the comfort of our inmates, but has had a beneficial effect on the heaith of all. We have had no sickness among the pupils during the year, and the hospita wing still remains untenanted. The benefit of the change of quarters is also manifested in the work of the school-room, greater order being kept, and the increased facilities it offers for thorough work being fully appreciated by the teachers.

CHANGE.
Mr. W. O. Barnaby having resigned his position to take similar employment in the Institution at Beverly, Massachusetts, Mr. R. Willard Demmons, of Chipman, Queen's Co., bearing excellent testimonials from Principal Mullin and Professor Creed o the Normal Schooi, was appointed to take his place as agent and collector. Mr. Demmons entered on his duties in May last, and is performing the work allotted to hin in a satisfactory manner.

Mr. G. E. Powers was called away to England in August last to attend the serious illness of his father, which terminated in his death. Mr . Powers returned in October to resume his duties here. By his energetic efforts our subscription list has been largely increased, information respecting the Institution and its objects spread broadcast through the Province, and new pupils brought in whose parents would otherwise have remained in ignorance of its existence.

VISIT OF THE LFGISLATURE.
On March 25 th, we were honored by a special visit from the Hon. Attorney General and twenty-six members of the Legislature, representing thirteen counties of che Province, whe were desirous of seeing over the new building. The visitors were met by the Principal, and shown into the school-room where the children were put through a number of exercises. They were afterwards escorted over the building: Dr. Brown, being familiar with its topography, kindly assisting in this duty.

It was exceedingly gratifying to all connected with the Institu.
tion that its appearance and general arrangements met with so spontaneous an approval from the large and distinguished party, who visited us on that occasion.

## HEREDITARY DEAFNESS.

Some attention is being given at the present day to the causes operating in the production of deafness, and the means, if any exist, in preventing its transmission.
The question "Why is deafness hereditary?" opens up a vast and interesting field of enquiry, but from lack of data and the imperfect state of our knowledge regarding this defect a satisfactory solution of the problem cannot yet be ascertained.

Man possesses the same structure and the same physical and mental peculiarities as he did some 3,500 years ago. The permanent races of mankind have their own peculiarities of physiognomy, colour of skin, hair, and eyes stamped upon them by the great and uniform law of the transmission of life. The Mongolian, with his olive-brown skin, straight black hair, flat face, small eyes, and high cheek bones is as distinct in his peculiarities to-day as he was thousands of years ago. The same holds good with the Caucasian and other races. As these outward distinguishing marks are transmitted from generation to generation, so peculiarities of disposition, genius, or disease may be transmitted, but in less degree. These characteristics are not so permanent, and may only extend to the first generation. Some insidious disease producing deafness may be transmitted from father to son. The disease runs its natural course, nature resumes her sway, and the son's children may be entirely free from it and consequently possess all their faculties. Some of the causes which produce deafness are entirely within man's control. The marriage of cousins and other relations, vitiated constitutions, weakness of body or mind, the location, or place where a man lives, and mental impressions on the part of the mother have all an influence in producing deaf offspring.

Climate is responsible for much of the deafness existing in certain countries. Norway, Switzerland, the higher regions of the Alps, Pyrenees, and other mountainous districts contain twice the proportion of deaf mutes found in the plains. It has also been noticed that the flat portions of England have fewer deaf mutes

than Scotland, or the hilly portions of England. The cause of the excessive proportion of deaf mutes in New Brunswick, Nova Scotia, Norway, Switzerland, and in the islands off the Atlantic, seaboard is somewhat difficult to determine. Whether it is due to excessive cold and humidity, to water used for drinking purposes, percolating over metallic ores, or to marriages between relations, is not as certained. However, there is no doubt that the latter is one of the most prolific sources of deafness known.

The secluded habits of some of the people of New Brunswick, who stay in their native villages all their lives, the children following the occupations of their father, neighbors marrying and intermarrying one with another, is a cause of degeneracy, and deafness with other defects becomes quite common among them. In travelling through the Province, I have met with small settlements where nearly all the surnames of the people could be counted on one hand.
Dr. Williams, of the Hartford Deaf and Dumb Asylum, states that twenty-five families related befor marriage had sent fiftyseven children to that school. Dr. Gillett reports that eighty-eight consanguineous unions among hearing parents sent iıỏ deaf mute children to the State Institution at Jacksonville.

Principal Connor, of Georgia, reports that sixty-nine deaf mutes educated at the State School were children of parents related by blood.

Dr. Alex. Gzaham Bell mentions the following instructive fact :"The Grisson family, of Kentucky, consisted of several deaf mutes. One of these, William, married a deaf mute, and all the children could heat. One of his sons married his cousin, a hearing woman, and the five children of this union were all born deaf."
The children who come to us are largely from poor fanilies. They need all the care and attention that we can give them, plenty of good, whoiesome food, fresh air, and out-door exercise, training in habits of cleanliness, warm clothing, and protection from the weather, the best medical aid, which only a well-appointed institution can give, and in making such provision for them we are taking the best means at our command against the transmission of deafness.

## THE WORLD'S COLUMBIAN EXPOSITION.

One of the remarkable events of the present century will be the World's Columbian Exposition, to take place in the city of Chicago in 1893. An organization is being formed to bring together the prominent workers in every department of human skill, art, education and philanthropy. There will be a physical exhibit of all departments of human progress. In addition to this there will be congresses of authors, artists, architects, educators, scientists, philanthropists, and eminent representatives of all the chief departments of intellectual endeavour.
Immense auditoriums will be erected on the Lake Shore Park, and smaller halls for congresses of persons interested in special subjects. These conventions will assemble for consultation, mutual improvement, greater co-operation, and for the formation and adoption of more comprehensive plans than have hitherto been pursued to secure the progress, prosperity, peace, and happiness of the world at large.
Educational systems, their advantages and defects, and the means by which they may be best adapted to the recent enormous increase in all departments of knowledge, will be one of the great themes for consideration.
A special committee on the instruction of the deaf has been appointed. Living questions in this department of education that will interest and engage men whose faces are set to the future will be chosen for discussion, and the results cannot fail to be of incalculable benefit to the class for whom we are laboring, and add increased power to the moral and intellectual forces which are ranged on the side of their elevation.

## IMPROVEMENTS.

Many of the improvements suggested in our last report have been carried out. Double sashes have been placed on the eighteen basement windows and also on the bath-rooms, gentlemen teachers' and boys' sitting-rooms,-these rooms being on the north side of the house requiring extra protection.

into the avenue, and two seats placed there for the convenience of visitors.

A new pine picket fence was built round the plot of ground intended for a kitchen garden. The land was ploughed, graded, and manured, and will be ready in the spring to transfer the large number of small fruit bushes and strawberry plants which still remain at the farm.

The line fence on the north side, and extending from the gate house to the well, was repaired and put into good condition, new rails being used for most of it. The Hon. Senator Wark undertook one half, and we completed the other.

A new substantial cross fence was also erected, running from the line fence at the well right across to the cemetery line. The fence in front of the building between the two entrances was also repaired. A nice substantial fence should, however, be erected as soon as funds allow. New gates are also needed at both entrances.

The gate house was badly out of repair. The roof leaked considerably and I had it re-shingled. The joists and posts of the kitchen were found to be rotten, fresh joists were put in, a. new floorlaid, and the south wall was taken out and a new one built. The rooms on the first floor were re-plastered, and the sitting-room and small bed-room re-papered. The stone wall in front of the house was re-built, and a new verandah erected the whole length of the main building. It is now comfortable, and occupied by a good quiet tenant.
A new fowl house, $28 \times 13$, was erected at the back of the barn. A new wood shed, $271 / 2 \times 171 / 2$, was also erected to the south of the barn, with an upper floor to store farm implements, tools, lumber, \&c.

The orchard cottage, on the crest of the hill, was found to be in a very bad state. The roof leaked. The joists, sills, plates and corner posts were found to be rotten, and it became dangerous to live in. Attempts were made to repair it, but it was impossible to make a good job of it. The old building, which had been in existence some eighty years, was taken down, and a new and substantial one erected on an improved plan. The frame work is good. The roof and sides have been shingled, and the cottage is now finished and very comfortable.

Oar account for lumber and workmen's wages for these various improvements will be much heavier than usual, and will be entered on the balance sheet as separate items.

A root cellar, and over this a workshop, should be erected next year. We have had to use the one at the farm this fall, and bring down our supplies of potatoes, \&c., as we needed them.

A new bridge is needed to span the brook on the south side of the house, the present one being in a shaky and unsafe condition.

I had hundreds of small bushes which disfigured the grounds in front of the building pulled up and burnt. The rocks, stones, and roats remaining should be cleared away. The rocks and clay which were thrown in heaps in making the sewer down to the brook are very unsightly and should be hauled away, the ground levelled, and seed sown to renew the grass where needed. Wa!ks should be made, seats erected and ornamental trees planted where they tould add to the beauty of the grounds. Much might be done in this direction to aid nature and give pleasure to every one visiting the Institution.

The terrace should. be enlarged, and the ground graded on the north side of the house. The immense bank of clay at the back of the building could be utilized for this purpose, and this, while enlarging the yard, would enable us to drain the surface water away which at certain seasons rushes down and settles within a few feet of the back steps leading into the basement.

Some gradiug is also needed at the back of the barn to give us an entrance on the west side, so that a load of hay may be driven in at one door, unloaded and then out at the other.
A sign-board announcing the times when the Institution is open to visitors, should be put up at one or both entrances.

The avenue leading from the gate house to the building needs a good deal of attention. Several of the tall spruce trees lining the lower side of the road became rotten and were blown down. These dead trees and limbs should be removed, the others carefully trimmed, seats placed here and there, and the appearance of the avenue improved as far as possible. It is always cool, and affords a grateful shade even in the hottest weather, and is one of the most attractive spots in the Institution grounds.

should be cut down, the stone wall at the bottom repaired and a new gate erected at the entrance to the path. This path through the orchard is more direct, and is useful when pressed for time,

A few acres of land should be cleared and prepared for cultivation as soon as possible, that we may grow what potatoes and other roots we need nearer home.

A nice level plot of ground, of about an acre and a half in extent, was allotted to the boys for their play ground, and a circular swing, see saw, \&c., erected there for them. It will be necessary to clear and grade a plot of ground on the south side of the house for the girls. That portion of ground intended for a flower garden might be levelled in the centre and laid with turf for croquet, \&c., an ornamental fence erected round it and the flower beds arranged along the inside of the fence.

These suggestions when carried out will, I have no doubt, add considerably to the appearance and utility of the place. Every year will bring forward its own work, and suggestions for still further improvements.

This is one of the most beautiful places in the whole Province, and where nature has done so much to make it attractive, money would be wisely spent in banishing disfigurements, and everything that offends an artist's eye, and adding where we can to the subtle and refining touch of nature's handywork.

## ACKNOWLEDGMENTS.

Our sincere acknowledgments are hereby tendered to our local Legislature for the support extended to this Institution for the past ten years.

We have now a handsome building well arranged, equipped and adapted to the work for which it was inaugurated. Unfortunately a debt of $\$ 4,000$ still remains unpaid, the interest on which forms quite an item, and has to be provided for half-yearly. It is hoped that at the forthcoming session of the House a grant will be made to clear off this indebtedness, and free us from an incubus which tells rather heavily on our balance sheet.

The Institution is becoming more widely known, and year after year an increase of pupils may be expected. As most of these belong to poor families they cannot be asked to pay even a fourth or
fifth of the actual cost for maintenance. We trust that sufficient funds will be forthcoming to enable us to take in all who may apply for admission.
If the Institution were assured of a per capita grant, systematic efforts could be instituted to seek out all the deaf mute children of the Province who are of a suitable age, and extend the advantages of the Institution to the full extent of its accommodation.

Ouracknowledgments are due to thenumerous friends of the Institution in Prince Edward Island, Quebec, Maine, and our own Province for the pleasant reception given our collectors on their annual calls. Their kind expressions of approval regarding the Institution and its work are very gratifying, and being an independent expression of opinion, are valued accordingly.

Our best thanks are again due to Dr. Brown for his kind and gratuitious services. No sickness has occurred among the pupils during the year, but some of the officers have needed his services on several occasions. We have been extremely fortunate in this respect, only one death having occurred among the pupils since the opening of the Institution in 1882. The priceless boon of health is a blessing from on high, and it becomes us to acknowledge the mercy with grateful hearts.
Our thanks are also due to Mr. Geo. H. Davis for supplies of free medicines, to Dr. Torrens for gratuitous professional services, and to Mr. Jas. T. Hurley for repairing the children's boots free of charge.

Numerous illustrated and other papers; the Fredericton Farmer, Reporter, magazines and pamphlets for children, the Kansas Star, Deaf Mute Voice, Annual Reports from other Institutions in the old country, United States and Canada, pamphlets relating to deaf r.ute instruction from Prof. Alex. Graham Bell, Proceedings of the Twelfth Annual Convention of Principals, \&c., have been received and gladly welcomed. Four years' numbers of Harper's Magazines were received from Dr. Frank Brown.

Special acknowledgment is hereby made of a large and valuable box of medicines received from Messrs. the Davis \& Lawrence Co., Montreal. The list included Pain Killer, Lung Balsam, Emulsion of Cod Liver Oil, Beef Iron \& Wine, Dr. Channing's Sarsaparilla, vaseline, toilet soaps, Fellow's syrup, plasters, \&c.

The children's enjoyment culminated when they became the happy possessors of its glittering treasures.
In this connection we have to acknowledge with thanks the substantial present sent by Mr. E. H. Wilmot, of Fredericton, toys and groceries sent by Messrs. W. H. Thorne, C. M. Bostwick, Wm. Kennedy, Wm. Bruckhoff and T. L. Gorbell, Christmas cards from M. L. Harrison, and mince-meat from J. Hopkins, St. John, also 26 bottles perfume from Mr. Geo. H. Davis, Fredericton. Messrs. J. We cannot rest satisfied, however, with the achievements of the past, or the prosperity of the present : we would stretch forward to greater conditions of usefulness. While there exist deaf mute children in the province uneducated, uncared for and grovelling in ignorance, it is our earnest desire to bring them within the sheltering walls of the Institution, and unless we strain every nerve to reach these children, the feeling remains that our duty is, but partially accomplished.

With the material support and sympathy of our Legislature, and our ever increasing circle of friends, and strengthened by the knowledge that we have made some headway since the inception of the work, we can look forward to the future with confidence, believing that our aims have the sanction and blessing of Him "who made both the Deaf to hear and the Dumb to speak."

MEDICAL REPORT.

To the President and Directors of the Fredericton Institution for the Deaf and Dumb.

Gentlemen :
In forwarding you this, my ninth annual medical report, I am happy to be able to say that the year ended finds us again with our ranks unbroken by death.

To our commodious new building and the sanitary condition in which it is kept, I believe is largely attributable the healthy condition of the Institution.

There has not been a case of serious illness, and beyond the usual colds, wounds and bruises, necessarily incident to those of the age and habits of pupils attending such an institution, there has not been anything to engage the attention or care of a physician.

## TERMS OF ADMISSION.

The Fredericton Institution for the Education of the Deaf and Dumb is situated at Hawthorne Hill, about a mile below the city.
I. Applicants for admission must be deaf mutes of sound intellect, good moral character, and free from any infectious disease.
II. The annual charge is $\$ 80$ a year, payable semi-annually in advance, for which sum is provided boarding, lodging, washing, tuition, medical and dental attendance.
III. Pupils will be received from between the ages of seven and eighteen.
IV. Exceptions to the above will be taken into consideration by the Mnnaging Committee.
V. The session commences on the first of September, and terminates on the first of July. The proper time for admission is at the commencement of the session. No pupil to be removed from school during the term, without consent of the Committee.
VI. All the pupils are expected to go home for the mid-summer holidays, on the first of July, and to return punctually on the first of September. The Christmas holidays are spent at the Institution.
VII. Parents and guardians are required to furnish their children with a good and sufficient supply of clothing, and to renew the same when needed. Every article must be marked with the childs' name in full to ensure against loss. Parents should deposit a small sum of money with the Principal for the purchase of necessary articles when required. An account of which will be kept and rendered at the end of the session.
VIII. No sleeping accommodation is provided at the Institution for relatives and friends visiting pupils.

I. What is the full name of the child ?

2 When and where was the child born?
3. Was he born deaf? If not, at what age did he lose his hearing, and by what disease or accident ?
4. Has he had the Measles, Scarlet Fever, or Whooping Cough ? Has he been vaccinated?
5. Are there any cases of deafness in the same family, or among
eir relatives?
6. How many brothers and sisters has he ?
7. What are the names, occupation, and post office address of the parents?
8. Was there any relationship between the parents before marriage?
X. All applications, letters of inquiry, etc., should be addressed to the Secretary, Rev. G. Goodridge Roberts, the Rectory, Fredericton, or to Albert F. Woodbridge, Superintendent, at the Institution.
