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


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

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

grains go into the ground as soon as you can. The weather and the land will soon be fit to work in. the sooner the ploughing is done the better. Get in the early potaplant in the drill three or four inches deep. Don't cut the earliest potatoes too small; better let them lie a day or two in the sun. Don't be in a hurry to turn the cattle out to grass. It is best to let the pas-tures get a good start; better for the cattle, and better for the pasure. If you have a bushy pasbuds. I mean the bushes. Don't forget to plough and fork over the garden. Give it a liberal dressing of manure. Couldn't you have more of a garden than you did last year? It saves the butcher's bill. Farmers, surely, ought to have a full supply of vegetables, each in its season. Who would be with-out celery and lettuce, rhubarb and asparagus? Who would be without strawberries and cherries and currants, when it is so easy to raise them? Now is the time to think of these things.

STATISTICS, &c., RELATING TO P. E. ISLAND.

Prince Edward Island contains an area of about 1,250,000 acres, nearly all of which is fit for cultivation. It is divided into three Counties, 67 Townships, and 15 Electoral Districts. The population, by the census of 1871, is 94,021, of whom about 42,651 are in Queen's County. The population of Prince County is 28,022; and of King's County, 23,068. Charlottetown, the Capital of the Island, is in Queen's County, and contains about 8807 inhabitants; Georgetown and Royalty, 1056; and Summerside and Township No. 17, 3562. The House of Assembly is composed of 30 members, and the Legislative Council of 13, all of whom are elected by the people. The Executive Council is llmited to nine members. Responsible Government was granted in 1851. The number of Schools ow in operation is 365, attended by about 15,000 children. In 1852, when the present Free Education Act was passed, the number was 160. There are beside the Prince of Wales College (public), and St. Dunstan's College (Roman Catholic), the Wesleyan Day School (Denominational), a County Grammar School in Georgetown and Summerside, and fitteen similar Schools throughout other parts of the Island. The whole cost of public instruction, which is under the control of a Board of the general revenue. 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FOR TOURISTS, &c.

During the Summer months a good many persons visit Prince Edward Island, and nearly all of them have more or less time to spend among us. Some come for health, others for recreation; and a few on business simply make a hurried call. As strangers they are often deprived of many a sail and drive, just because they can procure no hand book to guide them. To supply the want to some extent, we add the following notes :--

The Market House.

In Charlottetown we have a fine large Market House on Queen Square, with two market days in each week, namely: Tuesday, and Friday. On these days, the market will repay a visit, and enable strangers to form a pretty fair estimate of the social condition of our rural population, as well as of the quality of the products of the farm and dairy.

The Colonial Building.

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From the roof of this Building, commenced in 1843, as also from the roof of the New Post Office and Law Courts, an excellent view of the city can be obtained. Looking to the west, we see before us Government House and Farm; a portion of the Royalty; the North and West Rivers, and adjacent Settlements. North of us appear the Wesleyan Academy, St. Dunstan's College, and some very neat private residences; casting our eyes Eastward, we take in the Prince of Wales College, the two Convents, and the Hillsborough, with well cultivated farms, and fine cottages on either side; while Clifton, Southport, Rosebank and Rocky Point, in all their beauty, lie before us to the South, with Nova Scotia in the far distance. The House of Assembly and Council Rooms, in the Colonial Building, are always open to strangers, who can register their names in the Legislative Library, and examine the few curiosities it contains. The birds of the Island, arranged at the head of the main stairway, will give an idea of the number, and variety of the feathered tribe.

The Royalty

Is a belt of country stretching about three miles back of the town. It is highly cultivated, and in most cases, tastefully laid off. It is well intersected with good roads, and a drive through it will show the nature of our Farming, and what the soil is capable of producing.

Boating, &c.

Those who are fond of boating can, two or three times a-day, cross over from Pownal wharf to Rocky Point, where they will find good accommodation. The sail is about two miles long, and

affords a splendid view of Government House, and the rivers flowing into and forming the harbor. Or if they wish they may go every Tuesday and Friday afternoon, by Steamer, to Mount Stewart, a village on the Hillsborough River, about 18 miles from Charlottetown, and return the same evening. Twice a week the tourists may also take Steamer for Orwell, outside the harbor, which will afford them a good view of Hillsborough Bay, with St. Peter's and Governor's Islands, South Shore and Nine Mile Creek Settlements; Bellvue, Pownal, Gallas Point, Point Prim, &c. Those who do not care for a short sea voyage, can cross over to Southport every half hour, and drive down to Tea Hill, (three miles distant) or Pownal Village, (six miles) or the Half-way House, (fifteen miles from the City.) From the high land in rear of Pownal, the largest and finest landscape view on the Island may be obtained. Tourists fond of surf bathing, (and who are not ?) can take a carriage for Stanhope or Rustico, which they may reach in three hours. The Ocean House, at the latter place, is especially suited for those who leave crowded cities for a few months' rest and quiet. The great fishing fleet is always in sight.

Fishing.

Good trout fishing may be had at Bonshaw, 14 miles from Charlottetown; at Wheatley River Bridge, 13 miles out; at Thompson's Mills, six miles from the City, and several other localities, all accessible by land. Morell, Winter and Dunk Rivers are famous for their salmon. Mackerel abounds in the harbors as well as in the gulf.

Game

Is rather scarce, and it requires a sportsman well acquainted with the country to bag many birds. In their season, however, wild geese, duck, brant, partridge, wood-cock, plover, snipe, &c., may be had.

Ferries, &c.

HILLSBOROUGH FERRY, between Charlottetown and Southport. City landing at the foot of Prince Street. A Steamer plies regularly every half hour from 6, a m, and till 10, p.m., in summer. Fare, each way, 4 cents.

ROCKY POINT FERRY, between Charlottetown and Rocky Point, at the western entrance of the harbor, distance two miles. A nice, clean Sail-boat crosses every two hours, to and from Pownal Wharf. Fare, each way, 4 cents.

MOUNT STEWART BRIDGE AND ORWELL are brought into communication twice a week by water. On these routes, the Steamers Heather Belle and Maid of the Mist are now placed.

GEORGETOWN will have a passenger Steamer plying on that harbor next summer, bringing Murray Harbor, Little Sands, Brown's Creek, &c., into more direct contact with the capital of King's County. A for Su places and to weekl a Mai Tuesd Belfas impor

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Mail Coach Lines.

A Mail leaves Charlottetown every day, (Sunday excepted), for Summerside and Georgetown; and one leaves each of those places daily for the capital. Mails go to Crapaud three times, and to Bedeque, twice a week. From Summerside, there is biweekly Stage to Port Hill, Bedford, Alberton, &c. Souris receives a Mail on Tuesdays and Fridays, direct from Charlottetown, and Tuesdays and Fridays, from Georgetown. Murray Harbor, Belfast, Fort Augustus, New London, Malpeque, and all the important settlements, have Mail Communication with the city once or twice a week.

Reading Rooms.

We have three Reading Rooms in the City, one kept by Mr. A. McNeill, in Hyndman's Brick Building, on Water Street, and open to all strangers; one in the Lower Athenæum, for members of the Y. M. Christian Association; and the other in St. Dunstan's Hall, Sydney Street, for the members of the C.Y.M.L.Association.

Billiard Rooms.

Charlottetown has no public Billiard Rooms. Two private Clubs have one each, in Hyndman's Brick Building, above the Telegraph Office.

Livery Stables.

Of these, the City possess three, two of which will be found noticed in our advertising pages. A buggy and pair can be had for \$5 a day, and a single team for \$3.

Churches.

There are nine places of Worship in Charlottetown. St. Paul's, (Episcopal) is on Queen Square. near the Colonial Building. Rector, Rev. David FitzGerald, A.M., T.C.D. St. Peter's, (also Episcopal and Ritualistic), is at the West end of the City. Rev. George W. Hodgson, A.M., Minister. St. James' Kirk-the Rev. Thomas Duncan's-is near the upper end of Pownal Street; and Zion Church-the Rev. John McL. McLeod's-is on the South Side of Queen Square, nearly opposite the Colonial Building. The Wesleyan Chapel-the Rev. James Taylor, Pastoris the largest brick church in the City. It is situated on Prince Street, and nearly facing it stands the Bible Christian Chapel-Rev. G. Webber. At the head of Prince Street is the Free Church, at present occupied by the Wesleyans. The Roman Catholic Chapel-Rev. Dr. McDonald and Rev. Mr. Broyderickon Great George Street, is so large and conspicious that it proclaims its own locality. The Baptist Chapel-Rev. John Davis' -is on the same street, adjoining the Bank of P. E. Island.

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

Postage Stamps

Can be had at the General Post office, Ch'town, during office hours. Letters to be registered must be posted at least half an hour previous to the closing of the mail by which they are to be sent; the postage as well as the registration fee, must be prepaid. The registration of a letter to any place in this Island, British North America, or United States is four pence; and United Kingdom six pence.

Attention to the following remarks, by those who are in the habit of sending money by mail, is strongly recommended:

Registration is applicable to all description of letters and parcels, whether they contain articles of value or not. Registration is not an absolute guarantee against the miscarriage or loss of a letter; but a registered letter can be traced, when one unregistered can not, and the posting and delivery or non-delivery can be proven. A registered letter is thus secured against many of the casualties which, from incorrect address, forgetfulness of the receiver, or other error, may affect an unregistered letter against actual dishonesty on the part of the Post Office employees; a registered letter is incomparably more secure than an unregistered one—an unregistered letter leaves no trace behind it, whilst passing in the great stream of ordinary correspondence, though its presence as a money letter, and the nature of its contents, are, to any person accustomed to handle letters, as manifest as though the letter had been singled out and marked by the registered stamp. If the consequences were limited to the mere risk of the loss of the money so sent, the senders of money in unregistered letters might reasonably urge, that if they choose to encounter the risk, they are free to do so; but higher considerations are involved, and the chance of loss to the careless remitter is really but the smallest part of the evil associated with the practice. The department has gone to a great deal of trouble and expense to ensure as tar as is possible the sure and safe transmission of money by mail—the safest mode of remitting is by money orders,—where there are no money order offices, the *registration system* is available.

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
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
