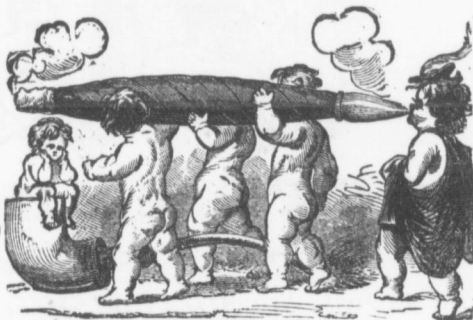

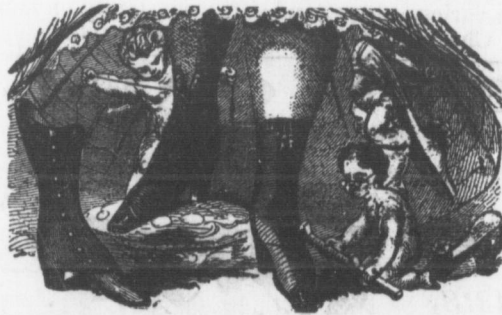

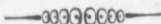

IN JANUARY the out-door operations of the farm grow less and less, and under some conditions come to a stand still; but the progressive farmer is not thus to be caught napping. He has, with commendable foresight, anticipated just such a state of affairs, and provided comfortable quarters, in which a multitude of little jobs may be accomplished. Among other things, there must be a carpenter's work-bench, with the necessary tools, which of course every farmer has. Also, among the fixtures of the farmer's snuggery above referred to, stands in a corner, ready for use when needed, a saddler's stool—by its aid the harness of the farm may be repaired, "the stitch in time" given, per-

haps accidents and loss thus prevented, and all without the trouble and time spent in going to the distant village. We are not advocates of men becoming "jacks of all trades"—perfection in any art is only reached by persistent application—all that we mean to recommend is so to apply every hour that there be no fragments lost. Even men of studious inclinations, shut up in the country day after day in winter, need relief, and what so likely to afford it as a rural work shop. Beside, in-door occupation must be found in stormy and inclement weather for the "hands" dependent on the farm. Cattle need at this season more attention than they frequently receive; fresh air is indispensable to health, be it in man or beast. We hear of London dairies where many milch cows are herded—one such containing it is said a thousand—which never breathe fresh air; once inside the stalls "fresh," they never leave them till handed over to the butcher, and others fresh from the country occupy their places. Who would not rather be excused as customers of such a dairy? But is there not room for improvement at home; do we require that the cows "in milking" be kept scrupulously clean; stand up well behind; are all, even in weather keenly cold, if dry admitted to the open air a portion of each day—thus treated health will be preserved with its consequent results.

THE JAPANESE make paper cloth which can be washed without injury. Boxes, trays, and even saucepans may be made of this cloth; and saucepans thus manufactured sustain no injury over a strong charcoal heat. Bags may be made of it, in which wine may be put and heated by insertion in boiling water.

THE early part of February ranks usually among our coldest winter weather, and it is not until March that we look for much abatement in its severity. Those of us however, who have wisely provided the necessary shelter need not be idle; there are posts to shapen ready for use, rails to point, gates to be repaired and new ones to be made, to take the place of the lumbering bars which have annoyed us too long already, and many other things to do which have been deferred till a leisure season. It has now come, let us set to work with a will.

We can only speak in general terms of the work which may be advantageously done now, pre-

paratory to the active season which approaches; the thoughtful man will study out the subject for himself, and leave nothing undone which may expedite the varied and pressing labors of spring. If tools and implements are likely to be needed, he will provide them in due season, repair the old ones, overhaul his stock of seeds, and make out a list of those which may be needed, to the end they may be in hand before the time for sowing: thus not only his interest but his personal comfort will be advanced, and those little trifles which perplex the careless and improvident may be made sources of enjoyment. With each duty discharged at the proper time, with "a place for everything, and everything in place," many rough spots in life's journey may be made smoother.

VICTORIA is a district in the south eastern part of Australia, containing 98,000 square miles. The interior of the country is so fertile that the first explorer gave it the name of Australia Felix. It contains valuable gold mines; its exports of the precious metal in 1856 amounted to more than \$60,000,000. Besides gold, its principal exports are wool, tallow and hides. The *London Colonial News* publishes a comparative statement of the population from 1836 to 1871, inclusive. From this it appears that in May, 1836, the total number of inhabitants was 177; in March 1845, 32,979; in March, 1857, 419,766; and in April, 1871, 729,645. Its growth far surpasses even that of Chicago. A large majority of the inhabitants are English and Scotch.

ACCORDING to the *Levant Times* Ali Pacha, late Grand Vizier, has left debts amounting to \$400,000. If the hens have meat food, warm houses, and good sun light, they will lay well at this season, and eggs are still high. Clean, well aired, and sunny apartments are needed, and a frequent change of food. Pounded oyster shells, old mortar, boiled potatoes, and scraps, are all useful. Set a few clutches for early chickens if you raise for the market. Poultry well cared for will pay a large profit. Neglected, it is an even chance if they pay at all. Dry cows off at about six weeks before calving. They need the rest, and will do all the better the coming season. Continue to feed some roots daily; they promote health and digestion.

Use up the Swedes; a good root-cutter is a great thing now. Sheep need careful attention, and regular feeding. Fattening cattle must have all the hay they will eat, and some Indian or linseed meal, with roots now and then. Let the shotes work over the manure under the barn. Some raw roots are good for them every day. The chores must be attended to. Don't let those cows stand out too long in the cold. If they get thoroughly chilled, they won't get over it soon. Do you take a good agricultural paper to read these long evenings?

THE population of Persia has recently been estimated at about 4,000,000, a large proportion of whom are Elyyuats, wandering tribes who correspond to the Bedaween of Arabia and Mesopotamia. These Elyyuats principally inhabit the southern and eastern parts of the Empire, where the drought has been most severe. Their means of subsistence depend mainly on their flocks and herds, which have down in some places altogether perished, owing to the total want of grass on the mountain slopes and in the valleys. The most pitiful destitution and the most appalling mortality are the results. The towns have suffered scarcely less. At Bushire, where relief is more easily afforded, and where much has been done under the auspices of the British Residents, deaths by starvation are of daily occurrence. It is reported that the population of Karazene, lately estimated at 10,000, has fallen during these days of visitation to one fifth that number.

How is it about the tool-house? are all the ploughs, shovels, and hoes in order? are the wagons painted, and the harness strong and durable? There is no place like a work-shop on the farm for mending up, and no time like this to mend up. A multitude of little things can be done now which will save time by and by, when the spring work is pressing. The bushes in the pastures can be cut. This ought to be a busy month, a month of preparation for the work. How is it, too, about the stones on the mowing lots? They are loose now. The frost has thrown more or less of them to the surface. They ought to be picked up and carried off the land. The fields and

pastures may now be top-dressed with some concentrated fertilizer, or with old rotted manure. The stock will need great care. A daily carding will pay. Don't let the cattle out to run over your mowing lots while the ground is soft.

**GETTING RID OF BAD HABITS.**

I once heard a minister say, "Suppose some cold morning you should go into a neighbor's house, and find him busy on his windows—scratching away, and should ask what he was up to, and he should reply: "Why, I am trying to remove the frost; but as fast as I get off one square it comes on another;" would you not say, "Why, man, let your windows alone and kindle your fire, and the frost will soon come off!" And have you not seen people who try to break off their bad habits one after another without avail? Well they are like the man who tried to scratch the frost from his windows. Let the fire of love to God and man, kindle at the altar of prayer, burn in their hearts, and the bad habits will soon melt away."

**BOSTON BROWN BREAD.**

Take four coffee-cups of sifted Indian meal, and two of coarse flour, rye or wheat; add to it enough warm water to make it as thick as pancake batter; stir in one small tea-cup of molasses and a teaspoonful of salt; add half a cup of home-made yeast, and turn the mixture into an iron baking pan; cover it closely with a thick cloth, and let it stand where it will rise. When it cracks on the top, which should have been smoothed down with the hands wet in water, bake it for five hours in an oven of moderate heat, so that it will not burn the crust. The flavor and quality of this bread depends upon the length of time it is baking.

LET the oats and other spring grains go into the ground as soon as you can. The weather and the land will soon be fit to work in. On mellow soil, that will not turn up "lumpy" behind the plough, the sooner the ploughing is done the better. Get in the early potatoes and the peas. Manure and plant in the drill three or four inches deep. Don't cut the earliest potatoes too small; better let them lie a day or two in the sun. Don't be in a hurry to turn the cattle out to grass. It is best to let the pastures get a good start; better for the cattle, and better for the pasture. If you have a bushy pasture to be subdued by sheep, they may go out and nip the starting buds. It hastens their destruction;

I mean the bushes. Don't forget to plough and fork over the garden. Give it a liberal dressing of manure. Couldn't you have more of a garden than you did last year? It saves the butcher's bill. Farmers, surely, ought to have a full supply of vegetables, each in its season. Who would be without celery and lettuce, rhubarb and asparagus? Who would be without strawberries and cherries and currants, when it is so easy to raise them? Now is the time to think of these things.

**MOLD ON PRESERVED FRUITS.**  
 A lady of considerable scientific attainments said, at the British Association meeting, that the atmospheric germ theory of vegetation has a practical bearing in household economy. The old practice in making jams and other preserves was to leave the pots open for several days before sealing them. She says that this gives the germs in the air an opportunity to settle in the rich soil of preserved fruit; and the seeds thus sown produce an abundant crop of the microscopic vegetation known as mold. It is far better to seal jars while their contents are still hot.

Somebody asked Mrs. Stanton whether girls could stand a college course of study. That lady in reply said:—"I would like to see you take thirteen hundred young men and lace them up, and hang ten to twenty pounds weight of clothes on their waists, perch them upon three inch heels, cover their heads with ripples, chignons, rats and mice, and stick ten thousand hair-pins into their scalps; if they can stand this they will stand a little Latin and Greek."

FOR planting corn, or other crops that are tender, or liable to be injured by the frost, it is better to wait till the ground is dry and warm; you will lose nothing by waiting a little. Indian corn does well on a freshly-turned sod, especially if a liberal coating of manure was turned under, and it has also some fertilizer in the hill. It is a rank feeder, and you can hardly give it too much. Many other seeds, like beans, carrots, mangolds, parsnips, should go into the ground now. Some of these seeds are slow to start, and if you wait till later, it takes them too long to get up. I think it is better to shear sheep early, and without washing; but get them in if the weather is cold and chilly. Give calves all the milk they want till they are two

or three weeks old. Skim milk will do them. Keep them clean and in a dry place, with good bedding to lie upon. Better raise all the best heifer calves.

PROFESSOR THOMPSON now shows to the British Association that no thickness less than 2,000 or 2,500 miles would enable the crust of the earth to resist the tide generating force of the sun and moon. A thinner crust, he says, would be bulged up by a tide within the molten mass, like the tide of the ocean.

"Keep ahead of the weeds." Each season's experience tends to convince us more and more of the true economy expressed in an old well-known adage: "the stitch in time saves nine." In nothing does it more forcibly apply than in tillage. Let the garden get foul, the corn grow up with grass, or the potato crop over-run, and then attempt to eradicate the weeds, and a feeling sense of toil and trial

will be felt, and the adage will be fully appreciated. On the farm, where it is usual to give each crop ample space, as with Indian corn, potatoes, &c., the culture will be mainly by horse-power, the hand seldom being called into requisition; but in the garden, the work must of necessity be principally by hand; still that may be made more easy by invariably sowing in drills, and giving each article room enough and to spare for the hoe and spading-fork; this latter is a great improvement on the old style of spade, which can only be used efficiently by a strong hand. It is more readily inserted, and pulverizes the soil more thoroughly than the spade; and in the garden culture of tap-rooted crops, such as beets, carrots, parsnips, &c., which do not always attain their full size, this implement will be found invaluable. Of course nothing equals the plough, and where our recommendation of former years can be followed, and the "truck-patch" established beyond the garden boundary, vegetables in profusion may be had, and of prime quality. It should be borne in mind that the early part of the present month is still in season for sowing beets and parsnips, for stock food. Let us here urge upon the reader the importance of these roots, without them or similar food—as Rutabaga, &c.—rich cream and luscious butter can hardly be obtained during winter—with them it is possible to have grass butter, or almost as good as grass, in the depth of winter.

THE hay-time is always steady work. Do you use a mowing-machine? The best of tools are needed to save time and hard work at this season. The mower, the tedder, and the horse-rake will pay, where you have fifteen to twenty tons or more to cut. They put it in the power of one man to do the work of ten, in the old way, and so pay a large interest on the outlay. How about those wet meadows? Better cut them early if at all, and better still to drain and reclaim them, if possible.

This is indeed, par excellence, the month of toil. What oppressive labors are upon us; but we should be cautious not to become unnecessarily excited. The inevitable exertion requisite to secure the crops now ripening is quite enough, without extraneous irritants. With a cool head, and well directed hand as a consequent result, obstacles will be overcome, and labor borne—borne though it be hard to bear. Each day will show the "lion in the path" to be

less formidable. The farmer who has grown to the stature of a man, may do well to stop and contrast the harvest labor of the present day with that of his boyhood. It is only by so doing, one is able to fully realize the progress made in agricultural machinery; and though it may not, at the first glance appear so decided as in some other of the industrial arts, it is nevertheless truly wonderful, and not less to be prized in the most successful applications of mechanical power.

As the citizen rides over the country and witnesses the grass falling in regular swaths behind a moving frame-work, drawn by a pair of horses, or a reaper cutting the golden grain, depositing it on a platform and at regular intervals gathering it into sheaves, as if it were a conscious, animated being, he may well exclaim, how beautifully it performs its work; but he can have no appreciation of the exhaustive labor machinery has removed from man; the more so should he be standing by when a load of hay is being lifted from the wagon to the mow by the simple contrivance of a horse fork.

The story is told of a negro who prayed earnestly that he and his brethren might be preserved from what he called their "upsettin sins." "Brudder," said one of his friends at the close of the meeting, "you ain't got the hang of dat ar word. Its besettin, not upsettin." "Brudder," replied the other, "if dat's so its so. But I was praying de Lord to save us from the sin of intoxication, and if dat ain't a upsettin' sir, I dunno what am."

having deliberately resolved on some course of action, proceed at once, without further delay, to carry it into effect—one step at a time however; he who overflows with good resolutions usually defers action on each, probably postpones all till a more convenient season, and finally ends by doing nothing. If our plans embrace the improvement of our surroundings, the removal of unsightly fences, the burnishing with lime or paint of out-buildings, the setting up of new or the improvement of old gateways, which tend to give character to the farm, and in a degree bespeak the habits of the owner, let us in that case set to work, and not put off the execution for another year; another year will bring with it fresh views, and enlarged perceptions, and each as it follows in succession will extend our ideas of what should be the surroundings of the home of an American husbandman. It is indeed gratifying to see as we pass by what were within our recollection old and weather-stained barns, and other farm buildings, now made cheerful and bright in the sunlight, simply by the aid of that cheap transformer, white-wash; which almost without money and without price transmutes the bleak and barren structure into a thing of beauty; as the sun's warm rays changes the unsightly crystal into the gilded butterfly.

THE roots must be stored early this month. Let them dry a little in the sun or wind, before putting them in bulk. The work of handling them over is very considerable; but it pays to dry them, and even to let them "sweat" a little in the pile. Husking should be hurried up now. There is the top-dressing to go on also. A good top-dressing protects the grass roots, and if the surface is level, the waste of manure is very slight. Many a piece may be kept

in good grass by a frequent top-dressing. Continue to cart out, and plough in manure, if this job is not already finished. Cattle ought to be housed early, and not exposed to the chilling storms. Cows in milk will fall off, unless care is taken to bring them gradually to the winter feeding, by means of turnips, or other succulent fodder. Fattening animals should now be pushed forward rapidly, hogs and sheep especially. It won't do to let them fall off now. Trim grape vines and fruit trees. Protect half-hardy plants. Snug up, and get things in order for a long winter. Better house and feed young cattle early. Don't let them gnaw the grass down to the roots. Start the farmer's club.

The advent of this month recalls to our minds that we are fast reaching the close of autumn, and tells the farmer in terms not to be misunderstood—prepare for winter! Under such conditions, there is much true enjoyment, and it may be a fuller sense of manly independence than can be realized in any other occupation of life. It is true, great fortunes are not amassed by lucky adventures, or as it may be now and then by those engaged in the legitimate course of commerce, or in manufacture, or the professions, but they who thus embark and fail, going down beneath the social surface, leaving no mark behind but

the record of their failure, is vastly disproportionate to the successful. Let us, then, who follow the plough and pursue the more certain, the less stirring occupation of husbandry, take comfort in a sense of independence—a condition which enables so large a proportion of farmers to say, not boastingly, but with grateful hearts: "We owe no man anything incompatible with our ability to pay." With a pursuit which promotes quietude of mind, and its accompanying good digestion, and refreshing sleep, we need not be dazzled by the glittering tin-foil of the present day.

SEED CORN.—Ears of corn that have been selected for seed should be hung up in a dry, cool place. Taken promiscuously from the crib in the spring, it is more than likely that the majority of the grains will have become injured and unfit for seed, and then the white grubs, cut-worms, and crows will be accused of destroying the young shoots, which really never existed. There is no better place to hang up the seed-ears than in the top of the crib, where rats or mice cannot reach them, and where a constant current of air is passing. If we would improve our corn, we must select the seed as well as to give it good cultivation.

CHARCOAL OR EARTH FOR HOGS.—Hogs that are put up to fatten, as well as store hogs, should have some charcoal or earth given them occasionally. We have found it a good plan to dig a few sods from the fence-corners for them, which they will consume with much relish. In a state of nature, the hog, which roots for his living, must necessarily take into his stomach a large quantity of earth. It is advisable to allow him to do this when penned up.

December is with the farmer the opportunity for domestic enjoyment. He has passed through the hurried labors of seedtime and harvest; the crops have been marketed or safely stored, and he has now time for reading, reflection and social intercourse; and well does he deserve it; for he has not only ministered to his own family wants, but he has been serviceable to the community of which he is a member. There may be some with narrow views, who may smile at this, imagining as they do that the country is only a stipendiary of the city, without

which lands, and flocks and herds would be of little value; perhaps a closer scrutiny into the mysteries of political economy would lead them to a different conclusion. The farmer, beyond all men, should study out the means to, and surround himself with, domestic comforts. His location is probably isolated; he may be cut off more than others from social fellowship, and his family thrown back upon itself for recreation and enjoyment. Under such conditions books, and flowers, and music, and innocent diversions become absolute necessities, which they naturally profit by, and hence comes the remark that the daughters of well-to-do farmers compare favorably in intellectual culture with their cousins of the city.

Let us urge upon our young country friends, the young men especially, the importance of using the leisure the present season affords, not simply in recreation, but in the culture of the mind—which embraces within its scope music, the knowledge of plants, the appreciation of works of art and virtue.

One of the silly abstraction of the health journals, which greatly damage their usefulness, is that which declares that it is unhealthy for two people to sleep together. A man of ninety-nine died the other day from the effects of sleeping with his wife nearly 80 years—or from some other cause.

Dr. Johnson once silenced a notorious female back-biter who was condemning some of her friends for painting their cheeks, by the remark that "it is a far less harmful thing for a lady to redden her own complexion than to blacken her neighbor's character."

**STATISTICS, &c., RELATING TO P. E. ISLAND.**

Prince Edward Island contains an area of about 1,250,000 acres, nearly all of which is fit for cultivation. It is divided into three Counties, 67 Townships, and 15 Electoral Districts. The population, by the census of 1871, is 94,021, of whom about 42,651 are in Queen's County. The population of Prince County is 28,022; and of King's County, 23,068. Charlottetown, the Capital of the Island, is in Queen's County, and contains about 8807 inhabitants; Georgetown and Royalty, 1056; and Summerside and Township No. 17, 3562. The House of Assembly is composed of 30 members, and the Legislative Council of 13, all of whom are elected by the people. The Executive Council is limited to nine members. Responsible Government was granted in 1851. The number of Schools now in operation is 365, attended by about 15,000 children. In 1852, when the present Free Education Act was passed, the number was 160. There are beside the Prince of Wales College (public), and St. Dunstan's College (Roman Catholic), the Wesleyan Day School (Denominational), a County Grammar School in Georgetown and Summerside, and fifteen similar Schools throughout other parts of the Island. The whole cost of public instruction, which is under the control of a Board of Education, consisting of nine Members and two Examiners, is defrayed out of the general revenue. There is a School Visitor for each County, who reports to the Board, and the latter to the Government. The septennial growth of the population is as follows:—

## FOR TOURISTS, &c.

During the Summer months a good many persons visit Prince Edward Island, and nearly all of them have more or less time to spend among us. Some come for health, others for recreation; and a few on business simply make a hurried call. As strangers they are often deprived of many a sail and drive, just because they can procure no hand book to guide them. To supply the want to some extent, we add the following notes:—

### The Market House.

In Charlottetown we have a fine large Market House on Queen Square, with two market days in each week, namely: Tuesday, and Friday. On these days, the market will repay a visit, and enable strangers to form a pretty fair estimate of the social condition of our rural population, as well as of the quality of the products of the farm and dairy.

### The Colonial Building.

From the roof of this Building, commenced in 1843, as also from the roof of the New Post Office and Law Courts, an excellent view of the city can be obtained. Looking to the west, we see before us Government House and Farm; a portion of the Royalty; the North and West Rivers, and adjacent Settlements. North of us appear the Wesleyan Academy, St. Dunstan's College, and some very neat private residences; casting our eyes Eastward, we take in the Prince of Wales College, the two Convents, and the Hillsborough, with well cultivated farms, and fine cottages on either side; while Clifton, Southport, Rosebank and Rocky Point, in all their beauty, lie before us to the South, with Nova Scotia in the far distance. The House of Assembly and Council Rooms, in the Colonial Building, are always open to strangers, who can register their names in the Legislative Library, and examine the few curiosities it contains. The birds of the Island, arranged at the head of the main stairway, will give an idea of the number, and variety of the feathered tribe.

### The Royalty

Is a belt of country stretching about three miles back of the town. It is highly cultivated, and in most cases, tastefully laid off. It is well intersected with good roads, and a drive through it will show the nature of our Farming, and what the soil is capable of producing.

### Boating, &c.

Those who are fond of boating can, two or three times a-day, cross over from Pownal wharf to Rocky Point, where they will find good accommodation. The sail is about two miles long, and

affords a splendid view of Government House, and the rivers flowing into and forming the harbor. Or if they wish they may go every Tuesday and Friday afternoon, by Steamer, to Mount Stewart, a village on the Hillsborough River, about 18 miles from Charlottetown, and return the same evening. Twice a week the tourists may also take Steamer for Orwell, outside the harbor, which will afford them a good view of Hillsborough Bay, with St. Peter's and Governor's Islands, South Shore and Nine Mile Creek Settlements; Bellvue, Pownal, Gallas Point, Point Prim, &c. Those who do not care for a short sea voyage, can cross over to Southport every half hour, and drive down to Tea Hill, (three miles distant) or Pownal Village, (six miles) or the Half-way House, (fifteen miles from the City.) From the high land in rear of Pownal, the largest and finest landscape view on the Island may be obtained. Tourists fond of surf bathing, (and who are not?) can take a carriage for Stanhope or Rustico, which they may reach in three hours. The Ocean House, at the latter place, is especially suited for those who leave crowded cities for a few months' rest and quiet. The great fishing fleet is always in sight.

#### Fishing.

Good trout fishing may be had at Bonshaw, 14 miles from Charlottetown; at Wheatley River Bridge, 13 miles out; at Thompson's Mills, six miles from the City, and several other localities, all accessible by land. Morell, Winter and Dunk Rivers are famous for their salmon. Mackerel abounds in the harbors as well as in the gulf.

#### Game

Is rather scarce, and it requires a sportsman well acquainted with the country to bag many birds. In their season, however, wild geese, duck, braut, partridge, wood-cock, plover, snipe, &c., may be had.

#### Ferries, &c.

**HILLSBOROUGH FERRY**, between Charlottetown and Southport. City landing at the foot of Prince Street. A Steamer plies regularly every half hour from 6, a. m., and till 10, p. m., in summer. Fare, each way, 4 cents.

**ROCKY POINT FERRY**, between Charlottetown and Rocky Point, at the western entrance of the harbor, distance two miles. A nice, clean Sail-boat crosses every two hours, to and from Pownal Wharf. Fare, each way, 4 cents.

**MOUNT STEWART BRIDGE AND ORWELL** are brought into communication twice a week by water. On these routes, the Steamers *Heather Belle* and *Maid of the Mist* are now placed.

**GEORGETOWN** will have a passenger Steamer plying on that harbor next summer, bringing Murray Harbor, Little Sands, Brown's Creek, &c., into more direct contact with the capital of King's County.

### Mail Coach Lines.

A Mail leaves Charlottetown every day, (Sunday excepted), for Summerside and Georgetown; and one leaves each of those places daily for the capital. Mails go to Crapaud three times, and to Bedeque, twice a week. From Summerside, there is bi-weekly Stage to Port Hill, Bedford, Alberton, &c. Souris receives a Mail on Tuesdays and Fridays, direct from Charlottetown, and Tuesdays and Fridays, from Georgetown. Murray Harbor, Belfast, Fort Augustus, New London, Malpeque, and all the important settlements, have Mail Communication with the city once or twice a week.

### Reading Rooms.

We have three Reading Rooms in the City, one kept by Mr. A. McNeill, in Hyndman's Brick Building, on Water Street, and open to all strangers; one in the Lower Athenæum, for members of the Y. M. Christian Association; and the other in St. Dunstan's Hall, Sydney Street, for the members of the C.Y.M.L. Association.

### Billiard Rooms.

Charlottetown has no public Billiard Rooms. Two private Clubs have one each, in Hyndman's Brick Building, above the Telegraph Office.

### Livery Stables.

Of these, the City possess three, two of which will be found noticed in our advertising pages. A buggy and pair can be had for \$5 a day, and a single team for \$3.

### Churches.

There are nine places of Worship in Charlottetown. St. Paul's, (Episcopal) is on Queen Square, near the Colonial Building. Rector, Rev. David FitzGerald, A.M., T.C.D. St. Peter's, (also Episcopal and Ritualistic), is at the West end of the City. Rev. George W. Hodgson, A.M., Minister. St. James' Kirk—the Rev. Thomas Duncan's—is near the upper end of Pownall Street; and Zion Church—the Rev. John McL. McLeod's—is on the South Side of Queen Square, nearly opposite the Colonial Building. The Wesleyan Chapel—the Rev. James Taylor, Pastor—is the largest brick church in the City. It is situated on Prince Street, and nearly facing it stands the Bible Christian Chapel—Rev. G. Webber. At the head of Prince Street is the Free Church, at present occupied by the Wesleyans. The Roman Catholic Chapel—Rev. Dr. McDonald and Rev. Mr. Broyderick—on Great George Street, is so large and conspicuous that it proclaims its own locality. The Baptist Chapel—Rev. John Davis—is on the same street, adjoining the Bank of P. E. Island.

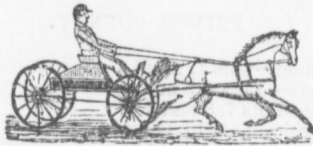




and have the words, "by parcel post," plainly written on it; no letters shall be enclosed. Can be registered on prepayment of 3d additional by stamps; if name and address of sender be written on parcel should it fail of delivery, it will be returned to sender unopened.

### Postage Stamps

Can be had at the General Post office, Ch'town, during office hours.

Letters to be registered must be posted at least *half an hour previous* to the closing of the mail by which they are to be sent; the postage as well as the registration fee, *must be prepaid*. The registration of a letter to any place in this Island, British North America, or United States is four pence; and United Kingdom six pence.

 Attention to the following remarks, by those who are in the habit of sending money by mail, is strongly recommended:

Registration is applicable to all description of letters and parcels, whether they contain articles of value or not. Registration is not an absolute guarantee against the miscarriage or loss of a letter; but a registered letter can be traced, when one unregistered can not, and the posting and delivery or non-delivery can be proven. A registered letter is thus secured against many of the casualties which, from incorrect address, forgetfulness of the receiver, or other error, may affect an unregistered letter against actual dishonesty on the part of the Post Office employees; a registered letter is incomparably more secure than an unregistered one—an unregistered letter leaves no trace behind it, whilst passing in the great stream of ordinary correspondence, though its presence as a money letter, and the nature of its contents, are, to any person accustomed to handle letters, as manifest as though the letter had been singled out and marked by the registered stamp. If the consequences were limited to the mere risk of the loss of the money so sent, the senders of money in unregistered letters might reasonably urge, that if they choose to encounter the risk, they are free to do so; but higher considerations are involved, and the chance of loss to the careless remitter is really but the smallest part of the evil associated with the practice. The department has gone to a great deal of trouble and expense to ensure as far as is possible the sure and safe transmission of money by mail—the safest mode of remitting is by *money orders*,—where there are no money order offices, the *registration system* is available.


