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





Harris Death Caused By Persons Unknown

Coroner's Jury Brings in Verdict But Does Not Attempt to Name Perpetrators of Crime - New Evidence Introduced at Last Session

Following the most sensational and most interesting session of the hearing and a direct and clear-cut address by the coroner, Dr. F. L. Kenney, the jury last night brought in a verdict in the Robert Harris murder inquest. The court was crowded during the session and the intensity of the interest was demonstrated in the fact that the vast majority remained one hour and twenty

minutes until a verdict was brought in. Finally, the jury at 11 o'clock returned the following verdict: "We, the undersigned jury empanelled to inquire into the death of the late Robert Harris find that he came to his death on June 22, 1917, at the St. John Infirmary from fracture of the skull, complicated with hemorrhage and meningitis. The said fracture of the skull was due to being struck on the head with some instrument on June 14, near the Haley house, Rockland Road, at the hand or hands of some person or persons unknown, which person or persons did feloniously and wilfully, and of his or their malice aforethought, cause such said injuries against the peace of our land, the King, his crown and dignity."

New Evidence in Case.
