

Satisfactory progress was made during 1945 in the railway fire protection work, which has been handled during the past four seasons under the regulations of the Board of Railway Commissioners. The co-operation of the various federal and provincial fire-protective organizations has been given freely, and, with very few exceptions, the railway and effectively.

A total of 686 fires in forest sections is reported as having originated within 300 feet of the lines of railways subject to the Railway Commission's jurisdiction. Of these, 43.4 per cent, are definitely attributed to railway agencies, intelly attributed to railway agencies, and a few railways having originated within 800 feet of the track; these than railways, and 28.8 per cent to unknown causes. Of the total area reported, and did only one-tenth of the total area reported, and did only one-tenth of the total estimated damage. This showing is distinctly favorable to the railways, and age totals less than \$8,400. An Athens despatch on July 24 told of his election as president of a league formed by adherents of former Premier Venizelos to counteract the effect of the formation of anti-Venizelos leagues among the demobilized Greek reservists.



Vienna, via London, Aug. 8—The loss of the Gorizia bridgehead to the Italian forces is admitted in the Austrian official statement issued today. A withdrawal to the eastern Isoneo, the statement says, was necessary to avoid severe losses to the defenders of the bridgehead because of the desperate attacks made

by the Italians.

London, Aug. 8—Prisoners are still surrendering by the thousands as a result of the Italian operations, says a Central News despatch from Rome. Over 10,000 prisoners have been captured in two days the despatch adds.

New York, Aug. 8—A despatch from Saloniki to a news agency here to-

day, says:

"French and Serbian forces on the Greek front are in contact with Bulgarians and there has been severe fighting.
