In its gayest hey-day the historic Dufferin Hotel could not have been a busier place than it is just now with the demolishing crew at work on every floor and at the exterior. Gradually and quickly the structure is being emptied as one might spoon an egg.

The general public knows little of the work being done. It is a systematic reduction of the plant to its original elements. Piping, heating equipment, window-sash weights, plumbing outfittings, lighting fixtures and even the smallest item of sheathing and wood materials in general is being sorted and neatly piled for the many purchasers who are fixing up their homes, summer places and so on.

One of the sons of Contractor Flood in charge of the busy place says he has received a request for some bath-tubs, etc. for a New Brunswick summer camp from a former resident now in Miami, Florida. This same man, who comes here each year, is enthused over the prospect of another hotel here.

It is interesting to see the oldtime materials now coming to light out of the Dufferin. One particular item is a soldt stone chimney thimble. Nowadays these stovepipe appurtences are made in moulded form, made by the hundreds in jigtime. Then it was a stonecutter's tasty job. The timbers that have come out of the wooden ell of the hotel would nowadays be considered heavy enough to truss a large structure.

A man dropped into the hotel lobby this morning—where the familiar fireplace is consuming the riff-raff of its own house, like Jules Verne's round-the-world ship when the fuel ran out, and carefully examined the tille flooring. He said he had laid it over thirty years ago.

Contractor Flood says the buildings are well ahead on their time limit for having the place levelled to the ground. The messy work of removing plaster and lathing is going on speedily and being sluiced into carts from the various floors. A harvest of kindling is being carted away by scores of people. He was walking home with about eight people, and was near the Levis side of the river when the jam broke. Three people got to shore safely, but the others were cut off by a quickly widening channel of water. People on shore advised them not to try and jump and shouted that the lee would float ashore upstream. This was what actually happened, though not till they had experienced a trying time. 

A gross surplus of \$91,818.34 and a net surplus of \$45,092.34 for 1923 is shown in the annual report of the Ottawa Hydro Electric Commission, which, says the Citizen, is generally regarded in civic circles as a very gratifying reflection of the success of Ottawa's publicly-owned utility.

The surplus, except for \$45,092.34, has been carried to capital account for depreciations, renewals and extensions. The total operating revenue for the year was \$420,614.85, as compared with \$373,615.68 in 1922.

The net surplus for 1923 is \$45,092.34, as compared with a net surplus of \$48,979.71 in 1922.

The increase in revenue is \$47,314.85, due to the growth in the business of domestic and commercial lighting and power service.



result of injuries received when struck by a sling of plank on the steamer Canadian Conqueror on Monday night last, was concluded before Coroner H. A. Porter in the Germain street court rooms last night. The jury, after a deliberation of nearly an hour, returned the following verdict:

"The jury find that John Orr came to his death in the General Public Hospital on the night of Feb. 4, 1924, by being hit on the head by a sling of deals being lowered into the hold of the steamer Canadian Conqueror. The circumstances attending the death were purely accidental. From the evidence submitted, we recommend that precautionary measures be taken whereby at all times the hatchman signal the winchman in the interest of all concerned.
