CHANGE TO LIVE

Banker Who Swallowed Poison May Yet Have to Face Arraignment in Court

New York, Dec. 31—Physicians said to-day that Joseph G. Robin, the bank director, who swallowed hyocine just before the hour of his arraignment yesterday on an indictment of grand larceny from the Washington Savings Bank, has an even chance of recovery. The indicted banker lies a prisoner in the prison ward of Bellevue Hospital, and constant watch is maintained to see that he does not swallow any more poison.

Robin's physical condition is run down by illness, and the tenth of a grain of hyocine took potent effect and physicians had all they could do to prevent his death. No date has been set for his arraignment on the larceny charge, but with the assembling of the January grand jury the district attorney will lay the varied transactions that Robin effected as the controlling interest in the National Bank, whose failure was caused by the suspension of the Washington Savings Bank before the grand jurymen as a basis for further indictments.


Eight Main Offfices and Eight Branches Will Be the Record at the Opening of the New Year
