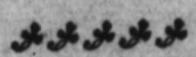

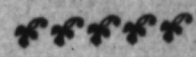

FORTY SEVENTH ANNUAL REPORT

OF THE

INDUSTRIAL REFUGE.

We, the Board of Management of the Toronto Industrial Refuge and Aged Men's and Women's Homes, again desire to present our Annual Report, trusting that the details given will be sufficient to ensure for these institutions continued interest and sympathy and the generous support which has always been accorded them. Under the guidance of a gracious Providence we feel that our labours have not been without result; and we trust that the Homes have been a means of blessing to many.

As in our Report of last year a somewhat detailed reference was made to the origin, design, and progress of the Industrial Refuge, we do not deem it necessary to reiterate what we hope is fully understood as to the work that has been carried on by that institution during the past forty-seven years. We would, however, draw attention to the fact that our doors are ever open to the wanderer, the outcast, and the tempted; the one and only condition which we impose being a year of probation, which has always been considered advisable in order to test the sincerity of an applicant. The twelve months' residence in a Christian Home where the Gospel message is daily proclaimed is, we trust, not without beneficial results, and the self-control and habits of industry acquired during that period, should act as a safeguard against the temptations which so frequently occur to those who have once fallen by the way.

It is a matter of regret that, of late years, the Refuge has not been utilized to such an extent as formerly for the purpose of reclaiming and training in habits of domestic usefulness young girls who, under the influence of evil associations, have been lured into paths of sin. It is certainly true, however, that our sphere of labour is not circumscribed, inasmuch as a home is provided for many of a more advanced age who remain, year after year, within the shelter of its walls, not being able, though really reformed and some of them members of Protestant churches, to assume the responsibility of making a living for themselves. They are not however *idlers*, as a glance at the financial statement will clearly demonstrate, \$1,999.35 having been realized by work done in the laundry during the past year. This amount is over \$200 in excess of any previous year, and we would here record the gratification felt by the Managers at the diligence and industry of the women in this department.

Although the rules are necessarily strictly adhered to, gentleness and kindness are the only means used to enforce them. This principle—which has so great an influence over the erring and sorrowing—is beautifully set forth in the following lines which were posted on the walls of the Home some thirty years ago :

Speak gently to the erring one, ye know not of the power
With which the dark temptation came, some unsuspected hour ;
Ye may not know how earnestly she struggled, and how well,
Until the hour of weakness came, and sadly then she fell.

Speak gently to the erring one, oh, do not thou forget,
However darkly stained by sin, she is thy sister yet ;
Heir of the self-same heritage, child of the self-same God,
She hath but stumbled in the path thou hast in weakness trod.

Thou yet may'st lead her back again, with holy words of love,
From misery's dark and thorny path, to Heaven's bright home
above :
Forget not thou hast often sinned, and sinful yet may be ;
Deal gently with the erring one, as God has dealt with thee.

A limited amount of innocent amusement and recreation is provided for the inmates—entertainments being given from time to time by kind friends, who endeavour in this way to show an interest in their welfare. A pleasing innovation, which was much appreciated, was adopted during the past summer, when every inmate, under the supervision of the Matron, was taken for an outing either to the Island or to one of the Parks near by.

On the 30th of September, 1899, there were 29 inmates of the Home; 15 have been received since, making 44 in all. Of these 3 went to service, 3 left of their own accord, 3 went out and did not return, 2 went to relatives, 1 became insane, 1 was discharged, 1 went to the hospital, and 3 ran away; 2 of the latter however expressed regret and were re-admitted. This leaves 27 in the Home on the 30th of September, 1900.

The superintendence of an institution of this character requires a combination of such qualities and capabilities as are rarely to be found except in those experienced in the management of similar institutions; therefore, that we should have been under the necessity of changing our Matron twice during the year cannot, however unfortunate, be a matter of surprise to any who will reflect on the difficulties of the position. We feel confident that despite these reverses, we are to be congratulated on having secured the services of Miss Rankin, who, though having been with us but a short time, gives evidence of great efficiency.

Miss Calder, who is still in charge of the laundry department, is indefatigable in her efforts to produce the best possible results, and thus merits the continued approbation of the Managers.

Every year brings changes to the list of friends of the Home and of the Board of Management, and it is with deep sorrow that we refer to the death of Miss Dickson, who for many years faithfully and conscientiously filled the position of Treasurer. Mrs. Watt, an esteemed member of the Board, and Mr. Samuel Alcorn, an old and valued friend, were also called away during the year.

Our thanks are again tendered to those who so untiringly attend to the religious services, and to Dr. C. L. Starr, who, much to the regret of the Managers, has, through pressure of duties, been forced to resign from the medical staff.

THE SEVENTEENTH ANNUAL REPORT OF THE AGED WOMEN'S HOME.

We desire to record our thankfulness for another year of continued prosperity and take pleasure in presenting our Seventeenth Annual Report.

On the 30th of September, 1899, there were 43 inmates, and 19 were admitted during the year; making a total of 62. Of these, 8 were discharged and 6 removed by death, leaving 48 at the present time.

Our aim and object is to provide a comfortable home for aged and respectable women at a minimum cost; and this idea is appreciated and taken advantage of by many who would otherwise, owing to a variety of circumstances, be unable to provide their aged relatives and friends with like comforts through any other means.

It not infrequently happens that our Home is utilized by those who are obliged in an emergency to remove their aged parents or relatives for a time. This we might illustrate by the following instance which occurred recently: A dutiful son who, for many years, had supported his widowed mother, was visited by affliction—a son and a daughter, both under twenty-two years of age, having been stricken with consumption. In proof of the saying that “misfortunes never come singly,” his mother met with an accident, fracturing her collar-bone. The nursing required by the sick ones prevented her receiving the proper attention, and so, through the kindness of the family physician, she was given into our care. We were, however,

not long called upon to minister unto her, for, at the end of a month, she passed peacefully away to her long home, where the grandson had preceded her and the granddaughter will soon follow.

An exceptionally pleasant feature of the Home life during the past year was the treat provided by the generosity of Mr. and Mrs. Thos. Dunnett, who, out of gratitude for the blessings extended to them during twenty-five years of married life, decided to celebrate their silver wedding by brightening the lives of those less happily situated than themselves. This is indeed a commendable method of thanksgiving and one which will surely meet the approval of our Divine Master who said, "Inasmuch as ye have done it unto the least of these my brethren ye have done it unto me."

The valuable services of the Matron, Mrs. Peacock, and Miss Robinson, the nurse, are annually commented upon and it would simply be multiplying words to tell of their efficiency and special capabilities for filling the positions which have been assigned to them. Few people have any conception of the great patience and forbearance as well as firmness they are constantly called upon to exercise.

We would again convey our warmest thanks to those who have so faithfully conducted the religious services, and to the physicians who have so freely given of their time and talents to alleviate the sufferings of the inmates. Much enjoyment was afforded by the entertainments given by Mrs. Revell and a choir of children, some members of the W. C. T. U., and other kind friends

SECOND ANNUAL REPORT OF THE AGED MEN'S HOME.

And now we turn to the Aged Men's Home, the newest department of our work, but one, which we have

every reason to believe has met a much-needed want. Indeed, there is no one more helpless or deserving of our pity, than an aged and infirm man, who is left in his declining days with no near relative to give him the constant care and attention so necessary.

The affairs of the Institution have, during the past year, moved along so smoothly in their various channels, that there is little to record and almost no variety of detail to be given.

There were 19 inmates at the beginning of the year and 11 were admitted since—making 30 in all. Of these 4 died—3 of whom were over 80 years of age—and 5 left, which leaves 21 on the register on the 30th September, 1900.

Although we were obliged by circumstances to lose the Matron who had been in charge since the inception of the Home, we trust that it has lost none of its efficiency. Her place was filled by Miss McCloud who, through having been connected with the Institution for some time in the position of nurse, seemed specially fitted to succeed to the matronship. A most valuable male assistant has been engaged—the Managers having been of the opinion for some time that such a one was necessary in order to give the required attention to the needs of the aged men.

It has been a matter of sincere regret that our President, Mrs. Jeffrey, has been unable, through illness, to be present at the meetings during the past few months; but her interest in the Homes has not in the least abated and she is still able to give us the benefit of her counsel and advice.

Before closing our report, we would again mention with gratitude the physicians who have given gratuitously their medical attendance and advice; the friends who labour to promote the moral and religious welfare of the inmates; and also all those who have, in various ways, contributed not a little to their pleasure.

In laying our reports before the Christian people of

Toronto, we appeal very specially to them for their continued liberal support of our institutions. Let none withhold their contributions on the supposition that we are independent,—we need your money, sympathy and prayers.

ANNUAL MEDICAL REPORT OF THE AGED MEN'S AND WOMEN'S HOMES.

The medical staff is pleased to be able to report a satisfactory condition of health of the inmates of both the Homes.

While aged people are bound to have many ailments of a more or less trivial character, we have been comparatively free from serious illness.

There seems to be a tendency on the part of the public to regard the Home as a hospital or asylum for those not only aged but particularly of unsound mind and body.

Unless this is very carefully regulated there is great danger of the best features of the institution being destroyed.

One or two confirmed invalids, either of mind or body, can completely upset the whole house and destroy the quiet and comfort of a large number.

It should be very carefully seen to that our institution is not used as a dumping ground for the class mentioned, by friends who are anxious to rid themselves of responsibility and annoyance.

The great majority of our inmates have come to us to find a quiet home, where, for a small consideration, they can be looked after for their few remaining days, and it is in their interests we should exclude the small minority of insane and malcontents.

The chief difficulties the medical staff have to contend

with, are due to the fact that the inmates are, if anything, too well fed. Living in the quiet of their rooms without exercise, the majority eat too frequently and too abundantly. People of advanced age should eat much less than they do in the vigour of their days, and it would lighten the labour of both Matron and medical staff and promote the health and comfort of the inmates if these errors were rectified.
