## REPORT.

At the Annual Meeting holden at the Mechanics' Institute, on the 2 st day of January, the following report was read by the Secretary.

1 Your committee, in presenting their Annual Report bave great pleasure in remarking that the progress of the Society is still onward, whether as regards the quantity and quality of the products exhibited, or the amount of monies expended in premiums.

In reviewing the past season, and taking the shows in order, your Committee, in noticing the June show, must bring to the recolleation of the members its superiority over former. years, the entries were over thirty more than in preceding years. The collection of Strawberries were very fine, and in Peas, Potatoes and Vegetables generally, the Society might challenge competition. The display of Greenhouse plants was not so numerous as in former years, but those exhibited were worthy the place allotted them. The exhibition of Roses was unustally fine.

- The July show was not so large as the preceding one, and owing to the rooms underneath the Exhibition Hall, being occupied by another exhibition (Nature's deformities, instead of Nature's beauties) the evening's receipt of the Society were much diminished. This Society thinks this question worthy the attention of the Board of Directors of the Mechanics' Institute, whether exhibitions like those of this Society, which arouse those feelings which tend to elevate and cultivate the mind, should not be entitled to a gratui-
tous use of their Hall. The Fall Exhibition of the Society was bountifully supplied by exhibitors. Here a new feature was introduced, the ethibition of Birds, the Committee being enabled to do this through the liberality of Gentlemen offering Special prizes.
Your Committee cannot but express their satisfaction at the very fine display in the exhibition of Fruits and Vegetables. In apples the exhihition was very good. No finer peaches were ever exhibited here. The specimen of Hothouse Grapes, were worthy of all praise, and a credit to the exhibitors. The Basket of Vegetables that took the prize was much admired, and although the prize for Cauliflowers was allotted to a Toronto exhibitors, yet, had the show been a few days earlier it must have remained with Hamilton.Your Committee cannot help remarking that in the whole list of prizes offered for Provincial competition, only one was taken from Hamilton. Your Committee urge upon their successors the necessity of urging the elaims of this and kindred Soeieties upon the Legislature, whilst Agriculture is gubsidized having a distinct bureau. Societies which do more to advance the growth of fruits and cereals than any other Associations, are wholly neglected. Your Committee recommend to their suceessors and Horticultural Societies geterally, to petition for annual grants in proportion to the monéy raised lócally, as well as a gejeral Act of Incorporation.

A Committee was appointed at the last Annual Meeting to take ateps to procure a Horticultural garden, but no, report of that Committee have as jet been received.

The thanks of the Society are due to those gentlemen who acted as Judges during the past year-to the gentlemen who offered special prizes, as well as those who sent artieles for exhibition only. It will be noticed that the income of the Society is not equal to its expenditure. Your Commillee recommend to their successors to increase by all possible
means the subscription list and to use great economy in the expenditure of the Society.

The Committee will be in attendance from 8 to 10 o'elock A. M., on the days of exhibition to receive the articles, none of which will be received after.the last named hour, and all requested to be sent as early as possible.

All articles entered for competition must be named in order to secire the prize.

Competitors are notified that every article must be delivered in a clean and proper state for exhibition; those requiring it must be made up in neat and suitable packages.

It is absolutely necessary that no article on exhibition be touched or handled, as the committee wish to deliver the specimens to their respective owners in the best possible condition.
The committee cinnot be accountable for the re-delivery of any article, if not claimed within the time specified by the committee, from 8 to 10 A . M., on the morning after the Show.

The Judges to have the liberty of cutting any article that has to be decided by taste, and to have the option of refusing premiums for any article they do not consider worthy.

* It is not campetent for the Judges to rectify errors in entering articles for exhibition.

Parties entering articles under the wrong class must suffer the loss of their prize.
Discretionary prizes are fixed,-first, 5s., second, 2s. 6d.
