

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GRAND ENCAMPMENT OF ONTARIO.

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ANNUAL REPORT OF THE GRAND PATRIARCH.

To the Officers and Members of the Grand Encampment, I.O.O.F., of Ontario :

PATRIARCHS :- It affords me much pleasure to greet you all on this occasion, being our Nineteenth Annual Session.

It is our privilege to meet this year in the beautiful town of Barrie, whose picturesque surroundings take high rank in Canadian scenery, and whose history

records the visits of such distinguished men as Sir John Franklin and John Gaft. I greet you to-day with a great record of peace and prosperity.

The curtains of our habitation have been extending, and we are pleased to note a wholesome enthusiasm prevailing throughout our ranks.

I earnestly trust that our deliberations to day will be conducted as peaceably and harmoniously as they have ever been at our Annual Sessions, and that each officer and member present will derive much profit and pleasure from our pro-

I have great pleasure in submitting the following report :

(1) NEW ENCAMPMENTS.

I am happy to report that during the past year five new Encampments have been added to our numbers.

On January 25th, in company with M. D. Dawson, Grand Scribe; J. A. McDonald, Grand Junior Warden; F. J. Daniels, D. D. G. P., and a number of Patriarchs from Ottawa, I instituted Eureka Encampment, No. 65, at Carleton Place. Although this Encampment did not start with as many members as some others, I believe it will render a good account of itself in the near future.

On January 27th, assisted by M. D. Dawson, Grand Scribe, and a large number of the members of Mount Hebron Encampment, No. 56, I instituted Hiawatha Encampment, No. 66, in the town of Peterborough. This Encamp-ment has a membership of 24.

On June 1st, when I was ably assisted by M. D. Dawson, Grand Scribe; Joseph Oliver, Grand Representative; J. T. Hornibrook, G.S.W.; W. D. Law-rie, G. S., and a number of Patriarchs from Newmarket, I instituted Aurora Encampment, No.-67, at the village of Aurora. This Encampment started with 7 chartered members and 17 initiates.

On June 22nd, assisted by Joseph Oliver and John Welsh, Grand Repre-sentatives ; B. On July 25th, assisted by M., D. Dawson, Grand Scribe; John Welsh, Grand Representative; John Gibson, Past Grand Patriarch; Patriarchs Fletcher Encampment, No. 69, at the village of Forest. This Encampment has three Lodges to draw from, and I believe it will be a success.

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(2) OFFICIAL VISITS.

December oth I visited Frontier Encampment, No. 2. at Windsor, where I received a royal and fraternal welcome from the Patriarchs. Our finances are in good condition, and our future never appeared brighter. Our officers are not only able but willing to do good work for our advancement. I am happy to state that all the District Deputies who have reported to me have performed their duties during the year in a very satisfactory manner. To one and all of them I return my sincere thanks.

(6) QUESTIONS AND DECISIONS.

I am happy to say that during the year no questions of importance have been submitted for my decision. A number of questions have been asked and very easily answered by reference to Digest, or Book of Laws, which was satisfactory.

(7) AUDITORS.

I re-appointed as auditors Jas. Smith, P.G.M., and E. R. Robinson, P.G.P., of London. After some time these Patriarchs tendered their resignation, which I accepted. And I then appointed as auditors P.G.P. Frank Riddell, of Adelphian, and Past Chief Patriarch T. G. Lowe, of Harmony Encampments, both of London.

(8) ACKNOWLEDGMENT OF COURTESIES.

Before closing my report, I cannot allow this opportunity to pass without acknowledging my indebtedness to all the Patriarchs for their kindness and cooperation. More especially to M. D. 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ANNUAL REPORT OF THE GRAND SCRIBE.

To the Officers and Members of the Grand Encampment of Ontario :

(1)

PATRIARCHS :- The pleasant associations and memories of the past make our annual gatherings meetings of more than ordinary interest. Two decades have nearly gone and still we meet many old and valued friends that assisted at the organization of this Grand Encampment nineteen years ago, in the City of Hamilton. At that time we had but six subordinate encampments within a circuit of two hundred miles, and with a total membership of less than 200; this year we have reached sixty-nine Encampments, with over 3000 members, extending to the Province of Quebec, and have this boast to make, that we have never yet reported a loss over the preceding year. This year has been an exceptionally prosperous one; only one year of our existence, 15 years ago, when we instituted six new encampments, has it been surpassed. From the far east to the setting sun in the Forest of the west new tents have been spread with the brighest prospects for the future. Strife, discord or contention is unknown in this Branch. The Golden Rule has asserted its power and obtained dominion, and we look for and expect a most harmonious session. I ask that the blessing of Heaven may rest upon our labors, and that the commingling together of our representatives may be productive of the happiest results.

Aurora, June 1st, 1888, with five Charter Members ; eighteen have been received since. Otter Valley Encampment, No. 68, Tilsonburg, June 21st, 1888, with eight Charter Members. And Forest Encampment, No. 69, at Forest, July 25th, 1888, with five Charter Members. At the latter place sixteen applicants were accepted, and received all the degrees. I assisted the Grand Patriarch at the opening of all the encampments, except Otter Valley, No. 68, Tilsonburg, when Grand Representative Bro. Oliver kindly officiated for me.

Several of the old encampments have within the last term exhibited renewed energy, and have contributed large additions to their membership. The following named have made double figures: Albert, No. 12, Bowmanville, 14; Elgin, No. 20, 16; Friendship, No. 24, Petrolea, 22; Outaouais, No. 53, Ottawa, 13, and Phoenix, No. 57, Wallaceburg, 12.

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
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



CONCLUSION.

No comment is required concerning the array of figures presented, exhibiting an addition of 25,422 to our roll of Subordinate Lodge members, as the work of the year 1887. This is the largest gain in any year since 1873. Then, as the Journal of 1874 shows the membership increased 29,767, (from 38,5048 to at4,815). In twelve of the years, from 1873 to 1887, inclusive, the gain aggre-gated 186,016, while in three years (1878, 1879, 1880) the aggregate loss was 15,342, showing a net gain of 170,674 members, which, added to the 385,045 to ported, 555,722. The aggregate paid for relief in 1873 was \$1,490,074,72 i in 1887, \$2,353,5760.02 total receipts in 1873, \$4,434.001.08 j in 1887, \$6,065, opt 42. The Militant movement has continued to advance steadily throughout the great number of Departments in the United States and Canada, and the enthu-Degree. great number of Departments in the Onlett States and Canada, and the entiu-siasm of the military element in the Order continues unabated ; in testimony of the truth whereof I call attention to the fact that the 462 Cantons reported last year have been increased by the addition of 53 new bodies, through growth, or as original organizations, and decreased by the loss of 4 Components, faving thereoriginal organizations, and decreased by the loss of 4 Components, leaving there-by a net gain of 49 component Cantons, and making a grand total of 511 Cantons to date. There is a total membership of 17,482 Chevaliers, estimated on the basis of 495 Cantons under warrant on April 26, 1888 (three-fourths reporting, , and one-fourth taken from reports of 1887), added to the warrant membership of 16 Cantons organized since that date, being an increase of 2,232 Chevaliers over the membership reported on September 1, 1887. By making proper allowance for increases hot reported at this anniversary muster, and for the growth of the whole since April 26 last, the membership can be safely estimated in round num-bers at 20.000 Chevaliers on September 1, 1888, which, with few exceptions, are fully officered and uniformed.

Such numbers are by far too small, for a majority of the Clerks have failed to furnish information in who are entitled to be so classified, and the direct revenue of Lodges and Encampments, superinduced thereby, can be safely placed at over one hundred thousand dollars.

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The value of the military outfit of the Chevaliers comprising the First Canton of Patriarchs Militant, at the inception of the movement on September \$376,324.29; of the 462 Cantons on September 1, 1886, was \$668 834.12, which amount would, in all probability, be three-quarters of a million dollars had sufficient data been received from every Canton. As it is, the Militant outfit has nearly doubled in value during the past two years, the annual increase of the investment for that period being about \$150,000.00.

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Which amount (\$1,832 92), to the credit of the Sovereign Grand Lodge, without that Grand Body having incurred any liability whatsoever, is truly gratifying.

The detailed classification of the Patriarchs Militant receipts and expenditures reported by Grand Secretary Ross, shows that during the year 1883-6 he received \$2,106.30, and expended \$1,867.93, leaving a profit for the year of \$238.37 he received \$1,201.00, and expended \$130.25, leaving a profit for the year 1886-7 he received \$1,201.00, and expended \$130.25, leaving a not expended \$294.00, leaving a profit for the year of \$315.00. The aggregate of the yearly profits, \$238.37, \$1,070.75 and \$315.00 is \$1,624.12, which, with cost of supplies on hand, \$208.80, makes the total \$1,832.92, and is proof of his statement above.

ACTION OF THE MILITARY COUNCIL.

DIRECT RECOMMENDATIONS BY THE COMMANDER.

That appropiate legislation be enacted, reducing the age at which persons can be initiated into the Independent Order of Oddfellows to eighteen years, by and with consent of parent or guardian. Such legislation will place the Oddfellows on a better footing, and by that means secure a greater number of the young men of the country, who will not wait until they are twenty-one to join secret societies.

During the provisional period, and even upon the elective basis, I sanctioned the organization of double battalion regiments in a few Departments. I find that they are out of proportion to the great number of regimental organizations, and I think it will be better to bring all within strict provisions of law, which provides for the formation of three battalion regiments. The few and necessary changes that will have to be made in the re-assignment of battalions, in order to as far as possible equalize the regimental commands, can be made without affecting the rank of officers at present in commission. I therefore recommend that such regiments be reorganized, where thought desirable by the commander P.M.

That in consequence of the delay of Commanders of Departments in assigning Cantons newly mustered to battalions and regiments, the law providing for the assignment of such newly mustered organizations should be modified to the extent that where assignments are not made promptly, the Commander P.M. shall assign the new Cantons to battalions and regiments ; and further, that where newly mustered Cantons are assigned to battalions and regiments by Commanders of Departments, that such assignments must be approved by the Commander P.M., who, for satisfactory reasons, shall also have power to re-assign such cantons.

By action of the Sovereign Grand Lodge (session 1887) the Chiefs of the various Staff Corps of the Army were promoted to be Major-Generals. In consequence thereof, it is recommended that the Commander P.M. shall be authorized to appoint assistants to the Chiefs of each of the Staff Corps of the Army with rank of Brigadier.

In the payment of the percentage of the Canton tax to the Commander of a Department, that the tax due from the Cantons within the Department shall be first deducted from the percentage, and the receipts for the same turned over to the Commander of the Department as part of the percentage, and be collectable by that officer.

In the payment of the percentage of the Canton tax to the Commanders of Divisions and Army Corps. fees due for commissions of the General and Staff shall be deducted therefrom, and receipts furnished, which shall be collectable by the respective Commanders.

That percentages due Commanders of Departments, Divisions and Army Corps shall be paid annually on the 26th of October, or as soon thereafter as practicable.

The first grand parade of Odd/ellows, comprising the Patriarchs Militant July 23-28, 1888. and members of Lodges and Encampments, took place in Boston, Mass., on Sept. 23, 1886, and will be long remembered as one of the largest and most enthusiasti-cally received Oddfellow demonstrations on the continent. It embraced over the theorem Bettershe Millient and eight theorem. five thousand Fatriarchs Militant and eight thousand members of Subordinate Lodges and Emcampments, making an aggregate of over thirteen thousand Odd-fellows in column, independent of the bands and drum corps, which were esti-mated by the press of the day at over twelve hundred musicians, thereby increasing the numbers on parade to between fourteen and fifteen thousand.

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the law, but seems to accord with the tendency of the times. The fact of relationship can be established in any way that may satisfy the Lodge.

II. A woman divorced a vinculo matrimonii, her father being a Third Degree member, is eligible to membership in a Rebekah Degree Lodge as an unmarried daughter of an Oddfellow.

OPINIONS AND DECISIONS.

15. A member of the Patriarchs Militant has no right to wear his uniform while installing the officers of a Subordinate Lodge, either in connection with a while installing the olficers of a Subordinate Lodge, either in connection with a Past Grand's regalia or without it. Being the representative of the Grand Master, he must wear the regalia representing that office, and that alone. The Grand Master and his Deputy are, so to speak, civil officers, and when performing the functions of that office should be clothed in regalia appropriate to those functions. The Sovereign Grand Lodge (1886, Journal, 10.691), resolved "that the Patriarchs Milliant uniform be and is hereby denominated a regalis, and as such, can be worn by Chevaliers when visiting Lodges and Encampments of our Order." The worn by Chevaliers when visiting Lodges and Encampments of our Order. design of this resolution, it seems to me, was simply to enable Chevaliers to make social visits to Subordinates in their uniform, and not to authorize them to wear it when performing duties as officers, either Grand or Subordinate. It was, I repeat, when performing duties as officers, either Grand or Subordinate. It was, I repeat, simply to facilitate purely social intercourse. It has always been the settled rule, that a Brother occupying an office, even temporarily, must be clothed in the regalia of that office (Digest, 860, 955, 956, 1043) ; and allowing Chevaliers to wear their would be to destroy all uniformity and all appropriateness. In a Lodge-room the form and color of the officers' regalia are significant, and to some extent symbolical of the duties and rank of the officers. The intrusion of the Patriarche Militant uniform into the check of the officers of Subordinates would destroy all this, and uniform into the chairs of the officers of Subordinates would destroy all this, and would give to Subordinates a motley appearance, unique and perhaps ridiculous.

16. When a Chevalier, as such, visits a Subordinate, he must be clothed in full uniform : either the "full dress" or "undress" will answer the law. A part full uniform; either the "full dress" or "undress" will answer the law. A part will not. The law says he can wear the uniform, not a part of it. As well (be-fore the abolition of the apron) might a Brother have entered a Lodge with a collar and no apron, or with an apron and no collar, but it will not be pretended for a moment that this could have been done. The interests of the Order will, in my judgment, be best subserved by keeping these two regalias entirely distinct.

"Again, after assignment, the Department Commander is 'to report to the Colonels of regiments, Generals of brigades and divisions, and to the Lieutenant-General.' In case of a separate battalion, no report can be made to a Colonel. General.' In case of a separate battalion, no report can be made to a Colonel, because there is no Colonel holding command over a separate battalion, and in that case the first report would be to the Bridage Commander. If the assignment be to a regiment, the first report would be to the Colonel. The language in reference to reports strengthens the contention that the assignment, when to a regiment, is to be to the regiment generally. The construction of the language regulations is to be to the regulation generally. The constitution of the anguage used, taken altogether, seems to be clearly in favor of the position that the assignment, when made to a regiment, is to be made to it generally, and that the Colonel is the one to assign to the battalions of his regiment. But it is contended that this could not have been the intention of the law-making power, because, as alleged, the Department Commander is the better qualified to perform that service, for the reason that he musters in the Cantons, and, therefore, will be more apt to understand the wishes of the new Canton in respect to the matter. force of this position is greatly weakened from the fact that in many instances Majors and other officers are detailed to muster these Cantons, and besides, it seems to me more probable that the Commandant of a regiment, it being a much smaller body men of and spread over a smaller territory, would be much better acquainted with the men under his immediate command, and better able to better acquartere with the men under ins inductions continued, and better able to make a proper assignment, both as respects the wishes of the new Canton and the best interests of the regiment, than the Department Commander, and both of these things should be taken into account in making the assignment. The Colonel is more immediately responsible for the conduct and proficiency of his regiment than the Commander of the Department, and would certainly take as much pride in keeping it up to the highest possible standard as his superior officer.

"Your Committee is constrained to dissent from decision 17, which claims that a newly-mustered Canton shall be assigned to a Regimental Battalion by the Colonel Commandant, when the law as above given clearly shows that such assignment of a newly-mustered Canton shall be made by the Commanders of Departments."

18. In the matter of the protest of officers of the Second Regiment of the Division of the East, Patriarchs Militant.

In considering the protest of officers of the First Regiment, Division of the East, Patriarchs Militant, supplemented by the protest of officers of the Second Regiment, same Division, against the acts of the Lieutenant-General therein particularly described, the Commander-in-Chief desires to express his regret that any such protect has been made on it interference to express his regret that any such protest has been made, as it imposes upon him a very unpleasant duty, that of reviewing the acts of an officer high in the estimation of the Order, and one for whom he entertains the highest respect, but the protest having been made, it is the duty of the Commander-in-Chief to decide the matter impartially according to his best judgment, so that no bad precedent be set in reference to the question in issue to plague us in the future.

The duties of the Grand Sire, in reference to this branch of the Order, are Ine duties of the Grand Sue, in reference to this blatter of the order, are understood by him to be *mainly* of an appellate character, the active command of the Army being devolved by law upon the Lieutenant-General; hence, it would seem that in matters of discretion that officer's opinions should prevail. The question here, however, is one of law-one of the construction of a statute,

First. The first point of the protest is to the promotion of Brigadier-General Cushman to be Major-General, and the assigning of him to the command of the First Army Corps, thus ' ignoring an efficient officer of superior rank who is entitled to the position, not only by virtue of his rank, but by his acknowledged service in the interest of this degree."

Within the rule mentioned above, the only question to be decided is as to the power of the Lieutenant General to promote Brigadier-General Cushma over the heads of the officers holding Major General's Commissions within the limits of the first Army Corps, and not as to the character or qualifications of those Generals.

At the outset, it should be borne in mind that the general law is that all commissioned officers from Captain to Major General, inclusive, are to be elected (Journal, 10,117), the Major-Generals by the Brigadiers and Colonels.

Now, when the Sovereign Grand Lodge authorized the formation of Army Corps, did it intend to violate this general rule and invest the power of pro-motion in the Lieutenant-General? The law reads, "The officers to be placed in commander of them. Commander of the Patriincommand of Army Corps shall be selected by the Commander of the Patri-archs Militant from the Generals in command of troops, and be commissioned as Corps Commanders, with the rank of Major Generals." It is claimed that this law confers upon the Lieutenant-General the power to promote.

The statute may be read as follows: "The Commander shall select from the Generals in command of troops with — that is, having the rank of Major-Generals," etc. Bear in mind the words are "shall be selected," not appointed or promoted. Clearly, there is no express power given by Section 2, page 10,877, the law in question. The power to promote is not at all necessary to the exercise of the power to select, because in the district covered by the Corps there were two officers with the rank of Major-General, and the power of selection is all the power riven. excent the Major-General, and the power of selection is all the power given, except the power to commission them as Corps Commanders. It is claimed that the expression "with the rank of Major-Generals," authorizes their promotion to that rank. On the contrary, it assumes that they hold that rank when selected There is a broad distinction between promotion to a rank and assignment of one with the rank. Nor does the construction contended for derive any additional force from the expression "from the commanders of troops," for the phrase contains no express power to promote. The conclusions seems irresistible that the law does not confer the power to *promote*, but only the power to select and commission those already holding that rank to select and commission those already holding that rank.

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If there had been no such officer as Major-General in the Army, but only Brigadiers, then the phrase "select from Generals in command of troops and commission as Corps Commanders, with the rank of Major-Generals," confer the power to promote, because the requirement being that they must be Major Generals, the power to promote would be absolutely essential to the exercise of the power to select and commission, and would be clearly implied under the rule of construction above stated. Under no other ground can the exercise of the implied power to promote be sustained. There being Major-Generals in the case, such implied power does not exist.

But it may be claimed that if the power to promote does not exist, then there may be no Major-General qualified to be selected and assigned, by reason of have been stated of duty and proved incompetency. This, however, cannot be so. In such cases the military law provides a remedy. The incompetent offi Brigadier may be assigned to the command of the Corps, though he would be simply acting Major-General, ago not one having that rank. While the rigidity and severity of military arrests, in the treatment of officers arrested. and severity of military arrests, in the treatment of officers arrested; cannot be presumed to be applied in their force, in our military degree, in justice to officers, the general features, so far as they relate to the causes of arrest and the information to which the officer thus disgraced is entitled, touching the grounds of comagainst him, must be observed. No *ex parte* condemnation can be final against him. Any other rule would be grossly unjust and contrary to all rules, civil or military, and should not be tolerated for a moment.

The degree of the Patriarchs Militant has for its basis the United States Army. By Act of Congress of June 23rd, 1879, the Secretary of War was directed to codify the army regulations, and in the army regulations thus pre-pared, on page 87, Article LXI, will be found the rules touching arrests. Para-gaph 865 reads as follows : "Officers are not to be put in arrest for light offences. for these the censure of the commanding officer will, in most cases, answer the purpose of discipline."

In other cases provision is made for summoning courts-martial and the trial of charges.

The second ground of protest is the appointment of Brigadier-General Whip-ple, an officer of his personal staff, by the Lieutenant-General, to the command of the First Brigade, Division of the East, Department of Massachusetis. The

assignment of General Cushman to the command of the First Army Corps, and relieving him of the command of the Brigade, left a vacancy in the command. There were two Colonels in this Brigade, and, in my judgment, one of these, the ranking officer, should have been assigned to the command of the Brigade. It is claimed by the Lieutenant-General that military authorities differed as to which of these two was the ranking officer, and to avoid making a choice in a case where there was a conflict, he appointed General Whipple, temporarily, to the command, and that he occupied that position only about a month, when one of the two Colonels mentioned was elected to the vacancy.

CONCLUSION.

As to the first part of the contest, I decline to interfere in the matter further, and remit the whole subject to the Sovereign Grand Lodge, for the reason that the Lieutenant General acted in good faith in his construction of the law, though, in my judgment, such construction was erroneous ; that there seems to be a preity general acquiescence in his act, and peace and harmony seem to preaj in the territory affected; that in case of an adverse decision, it would invalidate the appointment of several Corps Commanders, cohcerning whose appointment no fault has been found, and lastly, because I believe the best interests of the Army require that the matter should be considered by the Sovereign Grand Lodge, in the first instance, in connection with needed legislation upon the subject matter of the

As to the second point of the protest, I hold that the assignment of General protest. Whipple was not warranted by law, but it is of no avail now to rescind the order assigning him, as the whole force of the Order has been spent, and a Brigadier regularly elected in place of General Cushman.

NOTE.

In reference to this decision, the Committee on the Patriarchal Branch of the Order made the following report, which was adopted :

Your Committee have considered the decision of the Grand Sire, numbered 18, in his report to their Body at the present session, and respectfully submit the following as the result of their deliberation and recommend its adoption :

In regard to the subject matter surrounding the decision 18, your Committee were confronted with some difficulty in reconciling apparent conflicts in the construction given to the wording of the law on the subject as found on page 10,877. Journal 1887, Sec. 2, in reference to the power to appoint the Corps Commanders claimed by the decision. Your Committee are however of the opinion that authority to appoint a Brigadier General to the position of Corps Commander lies with the Lieutenant-General, under the law, notwithstanding there may be a Major-General within the Department.

I think the Recording Secretary may more properly be denominated a "ministerial" officer; that is, an officer who acts by direction. of another or under another's authority. An executive officer is one who executes of another or under another's authority. An executive officer is one who executes or directs. A ministerial officer is the directed. I therefore, as at present advised, must decide that a D. D. Grand Master may act as Recording Secretary, but that a Noble Grand or a Vice-Grand cannot.

The form of affirmation prescribed in the proclamation of the Grand 20. In the form of american prescribed in the produmation of the Grand Sire, Dec. 23, 1886, is by its terms applicable only to officers elect about to be installed, and members of Grand Lodges when they present themselves for ad-mission, and, of course, the change in the form of the affirmation affects those only. The affirmation is to be administered to all officers elect and all applicants for administer to Grand Lodges with the monoid position of the form of the Affirmation affects those Gradmission to Grand Lodges, with these words omitted, viz.: "The Patriarchal Circle, or any successor thereof, by whatever name known, or in." The affirma-tion required by the second and third clauses of the proclamation is not affected as all by the action of the Grand Lodge, and the affirmation therein provided for applicants for membership in either Lodges or Encampments must be administered to all such applicants, and taken by them before they can be received in member-

The second paragraph of the Grand Sire's proclamation warrants and requires the demand, by every Subordinate Lodge and Encampment in every Grand Jurisdiction, that each and every applicant for membership in each Subordinate shall take and subscribe the declaration, upon his honor as an Oddfellow, "that he does hot hold membership in the Patriarchal Circle or any successor thereof, by whatever name the same may be known or called."

This law is still in force, and not affected by the action of the Sovereign Grand Lodge at its last session, changing the form of the declaration to be administered to candidates, to officers-elect of Subordinates and applicants for mem-

It is the duty of every Grand Lodge and Grand Encampment to require all Lodges and Encampments to conform to this law.

21. Yours of 14th inst., with report of your predecessor to the Grand Encampinent of Wisconsin, is received, and I am glad to note that there is an increase in Encampments and in the membership of the Encampment branch in your noble jurisdiction, and that the Grand Encampment has put itself in accord with the Sovereign Grand Lodge and its legislation in reference to the Patriarchal Circle question. I sincerely trust that it will be the end of the trouble in your State. To your question, as follows: "The members of Excelsior Encampment, No. 20, at Portage, surrendered their Charter last August rather than subscribe to the iron-clad obligation. These men now ask the Grand Encampment for With-

the iron-chan obligation. These men now ask the Grand Encampment for What drawal Cards. Are they entitled to them? I am satisfied in my own mind that the members are now, at this time, active members of the Patriarchal Circle." I answer emphatically, "No, unless they have, in good faith, withdrawn from and renounced the Patriarchal Circle." Grand Sire Garey, in his decision No, 11 renounced the Patriarchai Circle." Grand Sire Garey, in his decision No. 11 (1886, Journal, 10,251), in reference to members of the Circle, held that "any member in good standing might apply to his Lodge for a Withdrawal Card before january 1st, 1886, and his Lodge might grant the card, unless charges were pre-could not have cards recommending them to the friendship and protection of the Order. It may be said that the card does not do this. If that be so, it certainly them strong them standing, and does endorse them as proper applicants (member) does give them standing, and does endorse them as proper applicants for memberdoes give them standing, and does endorse them as proper approach sort member-ship in the Order. The legislation of 1885 extended the day of grace to these de-laded Brethren to the period above named, and they have deliberately chosen to put themselves outside of the pale of the Order, and there they should stay, unless,

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like the prodigal son, they repent and return to their father's house, where they will be received with open arms, and fed upon the fat things in store for all good and true Oddfellows. If you are satisfied they have withdrawn from the Circle in good faith, the cards can be granted; if not, not. If they insist on retaining their membership in the Circle, they can want the cards for no good purpose. You are authorized to take store memory are not indement men distored purpose. are authorized to take such means as your judgment may dictate to ascertain their present status. They have virtually avowed their membership, and it is for them to purge themselves from disloyalty and furnish proof of it. There is no law, and never has been, which requires any Grand Officer or Grand Lodge to grant a card to any member of any defunct Subordinate without inquiry as to the right of such member to the card, and as to the propriety of granting the same.

22. If a Lodge, on being instructed by the Grand Master to cease violating the law, complies, I know of no law which forbids its doing so under protest.

23. A Grand Master on instituting a new Lodge opens a Lodge in the

Scarlet Degree. Whether a proposition fee should be turned in, with receipts of the Lodge for the evening, to the Treasurer, or be held by the Secretary until the ap plicant is elected or rejected, is a subject for local legislation.

25. The general rule is that any scarlet member is eligible to any office in a Lodge except that of Noble Grand and Vice-Grand, and hence a Subordinate Lodge has no right to require service in an appointed office as a qualification for election to any other elective office.

26. The Senior Warden is the second working officer in rank in an Encampment, and from analogy it would seem, and I so decide, that a Subordinate Encampment has no right to require service in an appointed office as a qualification for election to any elective office therein except Chief Patriarch and Senior Warden. A Patriarch need not serve in the office of High Priest to be eligible to the office of Chief Patriarch, unless required by the local law .--Digest, 928.

There seems to be no general law requiring service as Junior Warden to entitle the Past Chief Patriarch to the Grand Encampment Degree ; hence, where a Past Chief Patriarch presents to the Grand Encampment of another jurisdiction a certificate from the officers of his own Encampment that he is a Past Chief Patriarch, accompanied by a Visiting Card in date, and a certificate from the Grand Scribe of his jurisdiction that he is a Past Chief Patriarch and District Deputy for the current year, with a request that the said Grand Encampment confer upon him the Grand Encampment Degree, such Grand Encampment has no right to refuse compliance because it is not certified that the holder is a Past Junior Warden. There are no past official Degrees in the Encampment branch of the Order, unless the Grand Encampment Degree be called such.

28. A Past Grand is not entitled to admission into his Grand Lodge without the Password of the current term, he being more than thirteen weeks in arrears. If, being more than thirteen weeks in arrears, he obtains the Password in a surreptitious manner, he does not by that acquire any rights, and is not entitled to sit in his Grand Lodge. A Grand Lodge, on ascertaining the fact that he is more than thirteen weeks in arrears, and that he obtained the Password improperly, may eject him from its sessions - Digest, 994, 1440.

Where the Constitution of a Grand Body provides that its revenue is derived from the sale of supplies and a Capitation Tax levied upon the membership of the Subordinates, and that the Finance Committee shall report at the annual session an estimate of the expenses of the Grand Body for the current fiscal year, for salaries, etc., and the Grand Body at its annual session levies a tax in accordance therewith, one-half to accompany each semi-annual report, a

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30. The portion of the law of the Grand Lodge of Michigan in reference to the consolidation of Subordinates, concerning which the doubt exists, is as follows : "All the members in good standing of each of said Lodges shall thereupon become members of such consolidated Lodge, which shall also have jurisdiction over all suspended members of each of said Lodges.

"All the funds, property and record books, belonging to each of said Lodges, shall belong to and be turned over to such consolidated Lodge, and all of the charge books, except such as originally belonged to the Lodge whose name and number have been retained, shall be turned over to the Grand Lodge."

The doubt existing seems to be occasioned by the decision of the Sovereign Grand Lodge, in 1882, and known as the Chichasaw Lodge case (Journal, 6955). It will be observed that this decision was made prior to any enactment of the Sovereign Grand Lodge authorizing the consolidation of Lodges, but it seems to me that the entire force and effect of this decision are entirely destroyed by the Subsequent enactment (1883, Journal, 9404), and the subsequent decision (1884, Journal, 9755), and that the whole subject is by those laws remitted to the Subordinate Grand Bodies. The idea has prevailed that by the consolidation of two Lodges, one of them becomes a defunct Lodge. It is difficult to reconsticle this with sound reason, because, if one becomes defunct, why does not the other one also become defunct? It is not the same Lodge at it was heles. other one also become defunct ? It is not the same Lodge as it was before. retaining of the name of one in preference to the other certainly cannot make the difference. The Grand Lodge doubless has the right to give a new name and number to the consolidated body, and if this be so there would be two defunct bodies instead of one, and it can make no difference whether the Charters, one or both are retained by the consolidated Lodge as members of their former condition, or whether they be placed among the archives of the Grand Lodge. It is the thing, the substance, we are looking at, and not the paper. The merging or joining of two bodies cannot annihilate either. By the act of merging, the rights, properties and franchises of each are united together, formheights, but perhaps not in name, a new body of corporation possessing the rights, powers and franchises of both. Hence, it would seem to follow that the suspended members of both would sustain the same relation to the consolidated body that they did to their own before consolidation. This being so if course hody that they did to their own before consolidation. This being so, of course the new Lodge can reinstate or grant Dismissal Certificates to the suspended members of either, and can annul Clearance Cards granted within a year. I therefore hold that your law is not in conflict with any law of the Sovereign

"A member of a Subordinate Lodge who has been suspended by his 31. Encampment for non-payment of dues, or for any cause, or who has withdrawn from his Encampment or lost his membership therein in any other way, has no right to wear the Encampment regalia in his Subordinate Lodge or in any other Oddfellow organization under or created by the authority of the Sovereign Grand Lodge. A Past Grand thus situated has not the right to wear the combined regalia of the Order, nor any trimmings of yellow metal, or other yellow material, in any Lodge of any kind."

32. Subordinate Encampments under the jurisdiction of the Sovereign Grand Lodge may elect trustees of the Lodge if authorized so to do by By-law of the Encampment, approved by the Sovereign Grand Lodge. Without such approval they cannot. Trustees are not officers of the Encampment in the sense used in Article VII., Section I, of the Constitution of Subordinate Encampments.

33. I am inclined to think that where a member pays dues in advance, in accordance with the provisions of the By laws of his Lodge, and dies before another payment becomes due, the Lodge is not bound to refund to his represent. atives a proportionate share of the dues so paid, and I so decide.

34. Question-Has a member, three months in arrears, the right to speak in his Lodge?

Answer-It seems to be a general rule of the Order that a member in arrears for dues over three months is not in good standing, and for that reason is deprived of the privilege of participating in the proceedings of his Lodge. He has no right to the Pass Word or to vote (Digest, 739), and I think it also extends to the right to participate in debate or to make motions, but I think the matter may be regulated by the local law. Of course, he cannot be deprived of the right to speak in his own defence where charges are preferred against him.

35. Section 42 of the By-laws of Argyll Lodge, No. 212, at Napanee, Ont., instituted October 17, 1878, is as follows :

"Non-Beneficial Membership.—Section 42 A member of the Initiatory Degree of Truth may, on application, and a favorable ballot thereon, receive all the degrees for working purposes, on the payment of one dollar, but he shall not be entitled to or receive any additional benefits than he would have been entitled to previous to receiving said degrees until he shall have paid the balance of the fees, §3 for each degree; and should such member die before he has paid the full fee, and leave a widow or orphan child or children; their benefits shall be the same as they would have been, provided the deceased Brother had not received the degrees.

"The acceptance of the full fees for such degrees by this Lodge shall be determined *by ballet*, and one week's notice in open Lodge must be given before such ballot can be had, and the Lodge may demand the physician's certificate before taking such ballot."

Section 57 provides benefits as follows : Third Degree, \$3; Second Degree, \$2.56; First Degree, \$2; Initiatory Degree \$1.50.

This By - law of Argyll Lodge is a queer one. I don't understand what is meant by "a member of the Initiatory Degree of Truth." It is an attempt to establish non-beneficial membership. It provides that an initiatory members shall receive \$1:50 benefits, and then authorized the conferring of the three degrees for the sum of \$1: and the theory of the By-law seems to be that a member thus situated is a non-beneficial member. But this is not true, as he receives benefits and participates in the working of the Lodge. There would be no objection to the two ballots if the membership were non-beneficial, because the second ballot, on the theory of the By-law, would simply change him from a non-beneficial member to a beneficial member, in which case he has to pay an additional sum of \$8 for the degrees.

The By-law is illegal in its whole scope and aim.

36. A Lodge has the right to donate money from its General Fund for the benefit of an Oddfellows' Home, established under the authority of the resolution of the Sovereign Grand Lodge in 1887.—*Journal*, 10,986. 11,027.

37. A Lodge may invest its surplus funds in the stock of a bank, loan and trust company, or other moneyed enterprise which it may deem to be a good paying concern.

38. Article I. of the By-laws of the Sovereign Grand Lodge, Digest, 1162, is members Holding unexpired Withdrawal Cards. (Decision Grand Sire White, 1887). Holders of Dismissal Certificates and of expired Withdrawal Cards, though not members of the Order, may join with five holders of unexpired Withdrawal Cards in a petition for a Charter, and thus become charter members. (Digest 1177, 1178). I think the practice has been to grant Charters where it was becessary to count holders of Dismissal Certificates and expired Withdrawal Cards in order to make up the requisite number (five), but, as I view it, it was not the law. Resignation severs membership instantly and totally (Digest, 678), and Dismissal Cerificate is simply evidence of resignation. 46. With some degree of hesitation, I approved the By-laws of a Subordin-ate Lodge under the immediate jurisdiction of the Sovereign Grand Lodge in substance as follows :

"All members admitted by initiation or by card after the approval of these By-laws, shall pay yearly dues, as follows: From 21 to 35 years old, six dollars; from 35 to 40, eight dollars; from 40 to 45, nine dollars; from 45 to 50, ten dol-lars; from 50 to 60, twelve and a half dollars; this rate of dues to continue during membership. Those who are or become members before such approval, to pay six dollars.

47. A Brother cannot be elected to membership in an Encampment at the same session at which his petition is presented.

48. The proclamation of the Grand Sire is sufficient authority for Subordinates under the immediate jurisdiction of the Sovereign Grand Lodge to appear in public in regalia at the celebration of the introduction of the Order in

49. I was asked if it was lawful to enact a drama in public, founded upon the principles of Oddfellowship, and designed to illustrate "Charity," where "the Oddfellows appear in uniform and regalia in one or two scenes on the stage," and I replied that the law did not allow the regalia of the Order to be used in public on the stage in the performance of a drama.

50. An application for membership cannot be withdrawn after the report of the committee is presented to the Lodge.

51. A member cannot make known his ballot on an application for member ship under any circumstances, except as provided in Sections 645, 655 of the

Digest. The "Initiatory" is a degree in Oddfellowship, but is not numbered s such. The four degrees of a Subordinate Lodge are denominated, Initiatory, First, Second and Third Degrees.

53. An application was received from Holland for a new Lodge, to have the same name and number as a defunct Lodge chartered in 1881, none of the petitioners being members of the defunct Lodge. I granted the application, thereby deciding that the Grand Sire had the power to grant a dispensation for a new Lodge with the name and number of an old defunct Lodge under the jurisdiction of the Sovereign Grand Lodge.

54. When the Constitution for Subordinate Lodges fixes the period that must elapse before an initiate can be eligible to take the First Degree, it is not permissible for a Lodge to receive his application, and elect him to become a mem-ber of the First Degree before the period has expired.

55. Should a motion be made in such a case to elect a member to receive the degree in violation of the Constitution, it is the duty of the Noble Grand to the degree in violation of the Constitution, it is the duty of the Noble Grand to declare it out of order; and should such a motion prevall, it is his duty to declare the same void ; and in case the Lodge reverses his decision on an appeal therefrom, and appeal should then be taken to the D. In our Order there are no autocrats; the Lodge is superior to the Noble Grand, the Sovereign Grand Lodge is the superior of the Grand Sire. As a rule, the Subordinate Lodge has the jurisdiction to decide any question which can properly come before it. To prevent misunderstanding, let me say that a Subordinate has no right to decide any question in reference to the work of the Order, written or un-

57. Cyclone Lodge, No. 3, I.O.O.F.

Noble Grand and Brothers, complaint is laid that you elected, or rather reinstated in membership a Brother at a special meeting of the Lodge, without notice and without investigation. This is illegal. Article II., Section 5, Constitution of Subordinates, requires application and reference, as in other cases, You are required to strike the name of this Brother, A. Frank Ross, from the rolf, unless he is re-instated regularly.

Complaint is also made that a committee on the application of Brother G. A. Jennings refuse or neglect to report on his application, and that the Noble Grand is one of the committee. You are hereby required to compel the committee to make report on the application, in accordance with Section 2, Article II., of the Constitution of Subordinates, if the complaint is founded in truth.

58. Question .- " Is it lawful for a Chaplain to commence and finish his prayer in the name of Christ?"

Answer.-Our Order only requires a belief in the existence of a Supreme Being as a gualification for membership, and has no affinity with any religious sect The words "systems of faith; hence, everything sayoring of sectarianism is not to be tolerated. The words "systems of faith or sect " do not have reference merely to sects with-in the pale of Christianity, but have a far broader significance, and include all the califorms of the world. In this same (bristianity is sant house it is increasing) religions of the world. In this sense Christianity is a sect ; hence, it is inexpedient, Inwise and, I think, unlawful to make prominent reference to it in Lodge work. There is no law requiring Lodges to be opened or closed with prayer; but the Sovereign Grand Lodge in 1882 (Journal, 9147), adopted forms of prayer to be used in opening and closing, but left the use of them optional with Subordinate Grand Lodges. These forms were adopted to avoid the danger of offending Grand Louges. These forms were autopted to avoid the tranger of oblehung Brethren of different sects or systems of faith by one of an opposite faith in extem-poraneous prayer. If Lodges follow these forms there will be no danger of offending, for although taken from the Christian Bible and influding the Lord's Prayer, they exactly accord with the fundamental doctrines above referred to. We have Jews, and may have Mohammedans and other non-Christian sects within our Order, and the rule applies to them equally with members of the Christian faith. They would not be allowed to use, in prayer, words which would be offensive to Christian ears; hence, it is better to avoid alluding to matters belonging to the peculiar faith of the Chaplain engaged in prayer. If a Subordinate Grand Lodge adopts these prescribed forms of prayer, then the Subordinates under its jurisdiction must use these prayers if they use any t but they would not be bound to use tion must use these prayers, if they use any ; but they would not be bound to use them, as they could omit the use of prayers entirely at opening and closing.

59. The Constitution of a Subordinate Lodge reads, "And all members in arrears for six months shall be suspended from benefits for three months after paying the same, and will not be entitled to receive the Password or vote in the Lodge," and I am asked if the member is entitled to vote and to the Password after he pays up and before the expiration of the three months so fixed as a pen-alty. I think, under that article, he is entitled to the Password and to vote as soon as he pays his dues. The three months applies only to benefits.

60. In the absence of local legislation on the subject, it is unlawful for a Lodge or Encampment to initiate a person whose residence is nearer another Lodge or Encampment (in this case, fourteen miles distant), without the consent

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61. If an Encampment, after being duly notified of the facts by the Grand Patriarch of the jurisdiction, and being forbidden by him so to do, persists, and elects and initiates such person, the Grand Patriarch may suspend the Encampment and demand im Charter for insubordination.

62. The Grand Patriarch, being a member of such Encampment, would, in case of suspension of the Encampment, be suspended with it. In such case the Grand High Priest would become the acting Grand Patriarch, and in case he reinstated the Encampment with the loyal members thereof, including the Grand Patriarch, or in case the Grand Patriarch should, within one month after such suspension, lawfully join some other Encampment, his powers as Grand Patriarch would revive (if before the expiration of his term), and he could proceed with the duties of his office until his term expired.—*Digett*, 576, 577.

63. My attention being called by the Grand Secretary to the fact that the Grand Lodge of California has resolved to purchase a copy of the Ritual for each of the District Deputies of that jurisdiction, I decided that it was contrary to the law of the Order to furnish a copy of such Rituals to those officers. Digest, 1452, has been construed by former Grand Sires and Grand Secretary Ridgely to prohibit furnishing Rituals to District Deputy Grand Sires, and it applies with equal force to D. D. Grand Masters. Those officers have no use for the Rituals, as all of the forms used by them are printed in the institution and installation books, and the book of forms published by the Sovereign Grand Lodge.

64. The Grand Encampment of Missouri is a representative body, though its membership is composed of all Past Chief Patriarchs in the ijurisdiction. Its Grand Officers are elected by the Past Chief Patriarchs in the different Encampments prior to the session. An officer thus elected died between the election and the session of the Grand Body. At the session at which the election was to be held to fill the vacancy, the Grand Patriarch decided that all Past Chief Patriarchs were entitled to vote, and that the ballot was not confined to the Representatives, which decision was sustained by the Grand Encampment. The Constitution reads, "Should any Grand Officer-elect fail to present himself at the time of installation, the *Representatives* shall immediately proceed to an election to fill the office."

I decided that the Encampment was in error, and that the election should have been confined to the Representatives. - Digest, 400.

65. Where the By-laws of a Lodge provide that "Any member, when notified to attend a sick Brother, failing to attend in person, or by substitute, shall be fined three dollars, unless excused by a two-third's vote of the members present," the whole question of the remission of the penalty is in the discretion of the Lodge. It may excuse for sickness in the Brother or his family, or for any other reason it may deem sufficient, such as business engagements, etc.

66. The Grand Encampment of Colorado, in its last report to the Sovereign Grand Lodge, returns 973 members. It is now claimed (August, 1888) by the Grand Scribe that the last reports of the Encampments for the term ending July, 1888, show that the jurisdiction had at that date over one thousand members. The Grand Encampment has not been in session since October last, and will not meet again until next October, and it is asked if, under these circumstances, the Grand Encampment is entitled to another Representative by appointment?

Answer.-No. The additional Representative can only be admitted after a canvass of the returns by the Grand Body and upon its certificate that it has the requisite membership. The Certificate of its Grand Officers, in recess, not made by its direction, is not sufficient. The decision of Grand Sire Garey (Journal, 10,258), to the effect that if the jurisdiction at the time of the election

The law does not permit the Rituals being taken from the Lodge room, but if they can be bound in the Lodge room there can be no objection, provided the binder is a member of the Order who has the entire work of the particular

Applications for admission to an Encampment, in Salt Lake City, by 68. brothers residing in another town twelve miles distant, were handed to the Scribe of the Encampment; but four days before the Encampment met an Encampment was instituted at the said other town, the residence of the applicants. The Grand Scribe of the Grand Encampment of Utah notified the Scribe of the Encampment in Salt Lake, in writing, of the fact of the institution of the new Encampment, who notified his Encampment at its next meeting. Notwithstanding this notice the Encampment at Salt Lake appointed committees on the applications, which applicants were, on the next regular meeting, reported upon the applications, which applicants were, on ballot, elected. The new Encampment protests against this action, and the matter rests there. There is no local law on the subject in Utah, the Encampments being governed by the law of Encampments working under the jurisdiction of the Sovereign Grand Lodge. On this state of facts the applicants are eligible to admission into the new Encampment, and should not be admitted to the old one. Digest, 626, 626a, 627, Journal, 1887, p. 10,715. Decision No. 23, Grand Sire White, and decisions therein referred to.

LEGISLATION.

"At sessions of Grand Bodies, in lieu of any regalia hereinbefore described, a ribbon may be worn of the color of the highest degree the member has attained, having attached thereto any jewel which he is entitled of required to

ISSUING VISITING CARDS.

Resolved, That Section 141a, page 39, Supplemental Digest, 1882 to 1884, be so amended as to read as follows :

That the Noble Grand and Secretary of a Subordinate Lodge, the Chief Patriarch and Scribe of a Subordinate Encampment, and the Noble Grand and Secretary of a Rebekah Degree Lodge during the recess of their respective bodies may issue Visiting Cards to members in good standing when application is

That the Department Commander, holding position as such under pro-visions of law, is the officer with power to approve applications for warrants to establish Cantons and see that all certificates are properly affixed thereon, and that financial matters are arranged, to muster the Cantons unless otherwise ordered, assign the new Bodies to Battalions and Regiments, and make report of the whole as required by law. A Canton forming is entirely under the Department Commander, but after assignment it forms part of its superior military organi-zation, and can be reached only through military channels. The Department

Commander, in addition to being a recruiting officer, is the ritualistic and semicivil Officer of the Department.

That a Department Commander, as such, is amenable to no officer but the Lieutenant-General. VI.

That in consequence of the fact that but few subalterns are promoted to Captaincies, and consequently cannot obtain retired commissions, but must return to the ranks and serve as Chevaliers, it is recommended that each Canton may furnish for the use of the Lieutenant and Ensign a Line Officer's belt and baldric, the same to be turned over to the officers of such grades as soon as they shall be mustered, about the 26th of April of each year.

That where P. M. colors are handsomely embroidered and made of double facings of silk, the letters P. and M. shall be embroidered on the scarlet and purple, and purple and scarlet stripes of the flag, so that the initials will read on either side P. M.

To the Sovereign Grand Lodge of the Independent Order of Oddfellows :

Your Committee on the Judiciary to whom was referred the question propounded by Rep. Oliver, of Ontario, which question is, "Can a suspended member of an Encampment wear the regalia of the Encampment Branch in his Subordinate Lodge during suspension ; if not, what steps are proper to take to prevent it?

Answer. — A suspended member of an Encampment can not wear the Encampment regalia in his Lodge. The only way in which this can be prevented is for the Lodge to prefer charges against the offender for violating the law of the Order.

CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENTS.

All the proposed constitutional amendments, of which notice had been previously given, were either defeated on a direct vote or action thereon indefinitely postponed except the following, which was adopted :

With the consent of the Grand Lodge or Grand Encampment of a State, District or Territory, an appeal may be had by any Subordinate Lodge or Encampment to the Sovereign Grand Lodge; such consent, however, not being necess its Gra Appea Territo all cas Encam a direc subject

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necessary when an expelled Lodge or Encampment, after having surrendered to its Grand Lodge or Grand Encampment all its effects, appeals from such decision. Appeals may also be heard from a member or members of a State, District, or Territorial Grand Lodge or Grand Encampment from the decision thereof ; but in all cases the decision of the State, District. or Territorial Grand Lodge or Grand Encampment shall be final and conclusive until reversed by this Grand Lodge on a direct appeal therefrom. All appeals to the Sovereign Grand Lodge shall be subject to such general regulations as it may adopt.

PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENTS.

Notice was given of the following proposed constitutional amendments : Resolved, That Article IX. of the Constitution of this Sovereign Grand Lodge be amended by striking out the whole of Section 2, and inserting the following :

SECTION 2. Grand Representatives shall be apportioned as follows, viz. : To every State, District, or Territorial Grand Lodge or Grand Encampment, having under its jurisdiction fifteen hundred or less members in good standing, one Grand Representative ; to every State, District, or Territorial Grand Lodge or Grand Encampment, having under its invisition over fibers hundred. or Grand Encampment, having under its jurisdiction over fifteen hundred members in good standing, two Grand Representatives; and no State, District, or Territorial Grand Lodge or Grand Encampment, shall have more than two Grand

Resolved, That Section 2, Article XVI., of the Constitution of the Sovereign

Grand Lodge, be and the same is hereby amended so as to read as follows : SECTION 2. No person shall be entitled to admission to the Order except

free white males, of good moral character, who have arrived at the age of eighteen years, and who believe in a Supreme Being, the Creator and Preserver of the years, and who believe in a Supreme being, the creator and reserver of the Universe, provided, however, that when the applicant is not of lawful age, he shall first secure and present in writing, with his petition for membership, the consent of his father or legal guardian; and provided further, that in Australia, New Zealand and other countries not on the continent of North America, in which the Order has been or may hereafter be established, and a Grand Lodge or Grand Lodges formed, the qualification as to age shall be left to local legislation.

Many, very many, of those with whom I have been associated in this Grand Lodge for years have gone to their rest.

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They labored faithfully and well to advance the cause of Oddfellowship, which is the cause of humanity, and by their devotion and self-sacrifice to its interests they have endeared themselves to all those with whom they were associated. Among the many whom I sincerely loved, none has a stronger place in my affections than the venerated John W. Stokes. His quiet, unobtrusive manners, his strict integrity, his unselfish and ready surrender of a previously formed opinion, when convinced of his error, were some of his peculiar characteristics. But for the fact that he once stood at the head of the Order, this special notice might seem invidious. Others there were, equally unselfish, equally devoted, but the list is too long for special mention. The counsels of very many of these will long be missed As with sorrowful hearts we glance over this list of the worthy dead, we can but experience great consolution in the discovery that most of them live to a good old age, evidence of virtuous and well-spent lives. We knew their worth, we revere their memory, and we rejoice in the knowledge that they lived the lives of the good and died the death of the righteous.

"HISTORY AND MANUAL OF ODDFELLOWSHIP"

Is the title of a work by Theo. A. Ross, Grand Secretary, concerning which a special committee reported as follows :

Your Special Committee, to whom was referred the preamble and resolution, submitted by Rep. Jones, of Maryland, in reference to the "History and Manual of Oddfellowship," a copy of which has been presented to each Officer and Grand ol Oddiellowsnip, a copy of which has been presented to each Omder and Grand Representative, would respectfully report that we have carefully read the work referred to us for examination, which has been carefully prepared by Bro. Theo. A. Ross, Grand Secretary, and published by the M. W. Hazen Co., of New York, and pronounce it by far the most complete and authentic work on Oddfellowship we have ever seen.

The introduction by Brother John H. White, Grand Sire, is most able and

instructive. The first chapter, of 320 pages, gives the history of the Order from its formation to 1888, and contains extracts from the eleven thousand pages of the Journals of the Sovereign Grand Lodge. Brother Ross has shown great care and discrimination in the preparation of this chapter-necessarily a most laborious and difficult undertaking.

Chapter III., treating of the Grand Jurisdictions of Oddfellowship and their beginnings, is of the greatest interest to the Order, and its writing must have involved the greatest labor and research. An immense amount of time was consumed in the preparation of the statistics of growth, showing in tabulated form the progress of the Order in each jurisdiction, and these tables will be of inestimable value to the Order.

The book also contains a Manual of the Work and Usages of the Order, the history of the Encampment Branch, the Patriarchs Militant, the Rebekah Degree and the Manchester Unity, the work concluding with a most excellent chapter on the aims and attainments of Oddfellowship.

Brother Ross has been ably assisted by Brothers H. L. Stillson, P. G., of Vermont; J. Fletcher Williams, of Minhesota ; George Coburn, P.G., of Mary-land, and Mrs. L. B. Hill, of Indiana.

We find in the book little to criticise, much to commend. We therefore recommend that the book be most cordially endorsed by the Sovereign Grand Lodge as invaluable to every member of the Order.

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"The constitutional amendment giving effect to the above recommendation did no/receive the necessary majority."

SPECIAL NOTICE TO SCRIBES.

The certificates of Past Chief Patriarchs and Representatives to Grand Encampment should be forwarded to the Grand Scribe immediately after the

Past Chief Patriarchs and Representatives shall be furnished with a duplirast oner ratriarchs and Representatives shall be furnished with a dupli-cate Certificate by the Seribe, in order to avoid any possible inconvenience arising out of the miscarriage of the original. Especially should this be the case when the Past Chief Patriarchs present themselves for admission to the Grand Encampment some time after they have passed the chairs.

The per Capita Tax is twenty-five cents for each member upon the Roll at the last stated meeting in the term.

Charge Books cannot be delivered except upon the special order of an Encampment, signed by the Chief Patriarch and Scribe, and attested by the Seal, and the old Charge Books must in all cases be returned to the Grand Scribe.

When old Charge Books cannot be returned by the hands of a Patriarch, they should be sealed up and sent by express.

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The money must accompany all orders for supplies of all kinds, and all orders must be signed by the Scribe and attested by the seal of the Encampment. Post Office Money Orders are recommended as a safe mode of transmitting money.
