#### HIS PLAN BEARS FRUIT DR. RODDICK SEES CONSUMMA TION OF HIS DREAM.

Widely-Known Doctor, Who Has Labored for Years to Place Medical Professions of the Various Provinces on an Equal Footing, Has Completed His Work-Old Pro-vincial Troubles at an End.

The delegates who attended the first Dominion Medical Council at Ottawa recently were enthusiastic in their praise of Dr. T. G. Roddick, of Montreal, and the success of the first annual session of the new body.

Dr. Roddick is the man who bore the burden of the big fight to bring about general medical registration for the Dominion. The subject has been for him one of steady and persistent work for years and his efforts have at last here brilliants growned with success. Now he has succeeded in obtaining a universal standard of medical or trination for the Dominion of Oanada, and, what is more important, he has induced the various provincial medical boards to co-opersic and work in harmony with the Dominion board.

These licenses are to hold good in any part of Canada. This bill passed the Parliament in 1992. These then Dr. Roddick has energetically devoted himself to winning over the medical bodies is the provinces and now registration tists for medical men will be opened, qualifying them for the whole Dominion. Examinations for the purpose will be held at Montreal Oct. 7.

All Canadian physicians in any province of ten years' standing will be registered on payment of a fee of \$100 without examination. New doctors by passing the examinations of the new Dominion board will be qualified to patchice anywhere in the Dominion. The change marks an epoch in the medical history of the Dominion and a considered a great stride forward as a result of the Dominion and anovance on account of the petty provincial spirit displayed in regard to hedical practice in Canada. Thanks to Dr. Roddick and his co-laborers. this grievance will disappear.

In recognition of his invaluable service in this cause the medical men of the Dominion have made Dr. Roddick president of the new medical council of Canada.

Transcript, writes interestingly of Sable Island, in the course of which he says:

Not only is Sable Island diminishing in size, the winds blowing the sands away faster than the waves wash it up, but it is travelling sastward. The longitude as given by mariners of a former time is not the longitude in which Sable Island is found on present charts. The island is on the eastern edge of the Sable Island bank, and it stands in imminent danger—comparatively imminent, that is—of falling off into deep water. As the destroying winds blow from the west, the safety of Sable Island is threatened from both directions, east and west. Two lighthouses at the western end, built in succession within the last quarter of a century, have been overtaken by the sea and demolished by the breakers. The point where at one time the quarters occupied by the Island Superintendent were located is now five miles from shore. Sable Island has no harbor. What was once its harbor is now a shallow lagoon, which is or recently was il miles long, but which, according to a survey made early in the last century, was then 25 miles in length. This lagoon, or lake, had 200years ago much the same form that it now presents; but a breach was made into it by the sea on the north side, and a very commodium harbor for small coasters was thus created by nature. A tempest similar to that which opened it, closed the inlet again and blockaded two shallops which had sought shelter in it at the rising of the storm. The whole aspect of the land scape is low lying. The strong cause an smost ceaseless shifting of the dunes. The highest point on the island is at the eastern extremity. 

He is the Most Superstiticus Creature
In North America.

There are no people on the continent
to-day as superstitious as the Indians,
says .W W. Fox in The Toronto Globe.
The Indians do not talk about their
beliefs to whites, and it is only when
a white man has done them a kindness or has been so associated with
them that they look upon him as a
friend that their stoicism thaws. Then
one realizes that beneath the red skin
there is just as much love for a joke
or a romp as there is with the "Shyonoss" (white man).

Here is an illustration of their superstition: One whom I well knew, and
one of the most intelligent, for both
his wife and he were educated at
Moose Factory, bought a magazine
rifle. I asked him if he had used it
yet. "No," he said, "I first shoot
moose with it, then I have good luck
all along." Next day he did kill a
moose, and after that did not hesitate to shoot rabbits, hares and partridges. He believed he would always
have luck.

Another superstition prevalent amongst these Indians is that it is unlucky to live in a teepee or house where one of their number has died. I have known them to fire a shack

Where the trieff must have the view of the result of the trieff of them to burn a teepee even in the dept of winter when death has invaded it.

Last year they had an outbreak of diphtheria amongst them near Elk Lake. They were quarantined after the death of one of their number, and the town supplied them with provisions. But, although they were in receipt of free rations, they would not remain, and so, after the burlal, stole away during the night. Now if there is anything an Indina dislikes it is travelling in the night, and he will do so only through superstition or absolute necessity. These Indians returned to Fort Matachewan, but were not allowed to stay there, and so went on to the reservation at Turtle Lake. Here other deaths occurred, and they

Some years ago a party of surveyors got into trouble with the Indians. During the course of their work some of the men came upon an Indian grave. An old gun stood against a tree at the head of the grave, and upon the tree a cross had been carved. Hanging to the same tree were a couple of plugs of tobacco rolled in birch bark, to preserve them from the weather. As they, had been out of tobacco for days the men appropriated that at the grave, and in camp that night told of their find. The Indians, of course, heard of it, and going to the chief said they were going to leave. On being pressed for their reason they told him about the tobacco being taken away. The result was that the chief ordered the whites back to the grave, where they replaced the tobacco. These Indians were a fair sample of the Christianized variety found north of Lake Superior.

With the advance of settlement in New Ontario the Indian, like the moose, is slowly but surely stealing farther back into the great northern forest. The places that knew him once will know him no more forever. Many of the old trails are now so overgrown with brush that they are almost obliterated, and a few years more and they will be completely wiped out.

Fixing national boundaries is no easy matter, and this very often accounts for the jagged and irregular line denoting the separation of one country from another on maps. On a map of Canada there appears a little "nose" which projects from the extreme northern boundary of Minnesots into this country. This small corner of land which constitutes the northernmost point of the United States has an interesting history.

Under the treaty of 1733 boundary between the United States and British possessions was fixed. A certain point on the Lake of the Woods was mutually agreed to as one starting point, this being considered the headwaters of the St. Lawrence river and Great Lakes system.

At that time it was not known whether this point was north or south of the 59th parallel, but it was known to be close to it. The understanding was that from that point the boundary should go north of south to the 48th parallel as the case might be.

Later and more accurate surveys showed that point was about 25 miles north of the 48th parallel, and so at this place the boundary makes a jog showe that line.

The republic thus has a little piece of territory of about 100 square miles in extent north of the general boundary. And the joke of it is that a Yankee has to go by water in order to reach this little piece of territory unless he wants to come through Canada.

British Firms Losing. British Firms Losing.

Hamilton Wickes, British trade commissioner in Canada, in a report to the Home Government, says opinion in some Canadian business circles is that if British firms had shown half the energy or gone to the expense which Canadian firms annually incur in getting business, the trade of the United Kingdom in Canada would occupy a far more commanding position than it does to day.

Wickes is not prepared to confirm this entirely, although admitting few British merchant houses have thought it worth while starting offices in large Canadian centres while the American manufacturer is on the spot. The trade lost to the United Kingdom had been almost artirely absorbed by the United States.
