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the one that I used when I beat Hanlan and Elliot in England, and one that I am now practising with. I shall not use her at Washington, because she is for a straightaway course and is too hard to turn. It was because she was too hard to turn that I very nearly got beaten by Hanlan. There is my Elgin boat on the shelf. That is the one I towed in Lachine. She is a little lumber now, so I shall not use her. The boat that I expect to use at Washington is a new one made by Hanlan in the city at his building. It will be 20 feet 6 inches long and 11 wide--six inches shorter than my practice boat. It weighs only 27 pounds, five pounds less than my Elgin, and I think it is the lightest rowed shell ever made. It is made of white cedar instead of Spanish cedar, and has an ornamental wash bow of curled Hagarian ash. Here are my sculls, also made by Warren, out of spruce; splendid ones they are, quite stiff, and made just to suit me. "By the way, what do you think of Courtney's rig?" "I saw an article in your paper about a new rig Courtney is said to have invented, with which he will be able to beat three-quarters of a mile. I don't know what it may be worth. Courtney has met Hanlan many times, and has beaten him many times. Courtney's abilities as a sculler are by no means unrecognized here in Hanlan's stronghold. Frequently can he hear such an expression as this: "Well, if there is any one man that can beat Ned." COURTNEY IS THAT MAN? While recognizing his powers, the public have never admitted that it was at all probable that the championship was likely to leave Canada for at least a few seasons more. When the Herald arrived here on Tuesday last, and the account of Courtney's new rig was made public, there was much amusement created. The local papers printed the accounts in extras, which were eagerly sought after. Twenty-four hours after the arrival was laughing, and ridiculing the idea. The general opinion was that Courtney was starting to influence letting. When Hanlan leaves here to-night for Washington, he will carry with him the entire confidence of all the people in the Dominion, who believe he will return after the stern race on the 17th with additional honours. Hanlan himself does not talk over-confidently about winning the race. He feels, as he certainly has good reason for doing, that he will make a good race to cross the wire first. His nearest friends are, however, confident that their man will win, and they leave here with large sums to back him with, should Courtney row. As to this, there is much doubt expressed. Those men whose experience gives weight to their opinions, boldly state that their belief is that Courtney will not row. The majority certainly hope that he will, and that the race will be a fair and thorough test of the abilities of the RESPECTIVE MEN. Being aware that Hanlan intended to leave for Washington to-night, I called on him at his quarters over on the island. This island is a narrow strip of unproductive land, lying about two miles out in the lake from the city. It was formerly an arm of the mainland, but the washing of the lake broke through a low portion of it, and now helps to form Toronto Bay, the place where our regattas are held. Upon reaching Hanlan's Point, I directed my steps to his homestead to have a parting glass. I found him busily engaged in superintending the building of his new boat, and while he was giving some instructions to his men, I had an opportunity to take a good look at his condition. A glance was sufficient to convince me he was enjoying the best of health. The superlative flesh, which last winter was complained of, and made so much of in the New York papers, as every one thought here to influence betting, had gone. Outwardly, his appearance at once gave evidence of good racing condition. The impression was correct, because, in answer to a question, he said, "How do I feel? Well, I never felt better in my life. In training this spring I have made use of past experience, and have not decreased my weight by the old-fashioned process, which used to exhaust me. Four weeks ago I weighed 174 pounds, and now weigh 163 pounds with this heavy clothing. With racing clothes I shall weigh about 156 pounds. At the Centennial my flesh was softer than it was last winter. There was really surprise at that contest; not so much at myself, as because the other fellows did not row faster. Why, I played with them there. Here feel my arms legs. Had, you say, well, it is hard, and when pulling some distance I do not feel nearly so exhausted as I did at Lachine, when my flesh was soft." "Talking about working, Ned, how much do you practice?" "Well, I don't row a race every day, but I do not need any urging to get into trim. I am too anxious to win that race, and that is worse, than to let want of practice ruin my chances of crossing the first line. As to the distance I go, it depends very much on the weather and the state of the water, but I go out regularly every day. If the wind is blowing off shore, the water is too rough for a shell on this side. To get round that I keep a boat over at the city. When necessary, I pull over in a skiff and take a turn. Then, when the wind is blowing toward the city our way is smooth, and I pull here. So you see that it matters not how rough the water may be out on the bay. Between the two places I can always find a comparatively smooth course." "Well, if you have been working like that for a month, let's see your hands; they must be marked a little." "Look there! That's not hard luck, and that, and that, show I have been working? Why two or three weeks ago the inside of my hands were pretty sore and tender, but now you see for yourself that they are as hard and as well as they can be." "How about your diet?" "Well, I eat just what I fancy. To-day I had veal cutlets and apple pie for dinner. That don't look much like dieting. Having such a strong stomach is one of my lucky points. When I go away I don't have to stop drinking water. I can eat almost anything." "What about your boots--no cut ones?" "No." "DON'T DEAL IN CUT BOOTS, but come over and see them." A little while and we reached the place where he kept six valuable shells. It was a plain house, almost insignificant, in fact, to shelter the boats, and the door was not even shut.
