

The regular monthly meeting of the board of management of the Seamen's Irstitute took place last evening.

The building committee reported that they had decided to proceed at once with the erection of the new building and that Architect Fairewather had been authorized to call for tenders. The committee hopes to have the new building completed in time for the first winter port vessel next season. The committee will be pleased for receive further contributions.

Manager Samuel L. Gorbell's report showed that the institute had had a very busy month. On one day four hundred letters were written and posted in the building. The collections were encouraging, amounting to \$372.30. The average daily attendance for the thirty days was two hundred. Total attendance was six thousand two hundred and fifty. Half-Breeds Issue a Queer Manifesto in Behalf of Martin Jerome.

WINNIPEG, May 5-The French ele-WINNIPEG, May 5—The French element of Provencher are again demonstrating that politics is a live game with them. The Conservative convention, which is to meet some time next week, will have to choose between several candidates, Messrs. Prefontaine, M. L. A.; Lauzon, M. L. A.; and O'Sullvan, being the most prominent, with Roger Goulet, school inspector, as a dark horse. On the other hand, the Liberals have been handicapped by the prospective withdrawal of J. E. Cyd, M. P.

The Liberals are considering whether it would be the proper thing to take up Dr. Molloy, of Morris, who received the largest number of votes at the last Liberal convention after Mr. Cyr, or whether to call another convention some time in May. The clans have been called to Winnipeg to give their advice.

The introduction of the Irish element gives spice to the contest. Then again, behind the candidates looms the enigmatic figure of Martin Jerome, former representative of Carillon in the legislature, and up to recent date an employee of the immigration department. For seeking the Liberal nomination Jerome lost his job and now he is inciting the Metis to revenge.

Yesterday there was issued by his friends the following manifesto, which gives a curious insight into the mental attitude of the half-breed people. It says, in parts—

"The French-Canadian half-breed cause has a character entirely different from that of the other nations in this

country.

"If we wish to be true to our cause, if we wish to respect Riel, his works, acts and blood, given on the scaffold of Regina, we must, like him, struggle against the great and the authorities of our times, who are not in sympathy

with us.

"In our times, as in other days, the Metis cause asks the same sacrifices to defend our people and conserve our nationality; in spite of this host of enemies who would at any price drive us from political life. Sometimes we seem to be getting some favors from these enemies; but they seek only their own advancement.

"After the execution of our leader, after pasing through all kinds of ordeals, our national scrows had reached their full. The general idea among the Metis was that we were crushed, wiped out forever. But while the nation still mourned its dead leader, the blood of that noble martyr necessarily bore fruit.

"The martyr of Regina had fertilized with his blood the nation's seed. As a reward, Divine Providence slowily prepared another soul in the eyes of the people, compared to the one we had lost. With incredible energy and devotion, the new soul inspirited by the blood shed, arcse on the first occasion to defend our cause, and he has done so, on each occasion, and better than anyone else, since our late leader passed among the dead.

"Thus Martin Jerome is introduced as deserving to be the recognized leader of the Metis race."


