In this Report on the Corporation Accounts, from 4th May last, to 30th ultimo, and which the Act of 6th Geo. 4th, cap. 35, has made it the duty of the Corporation to publish, two months prior to the date of the Election in April, the various and complicated Accounts connected with the General Funds and Liabilities of the City, prior to 8th May last, cannot be included. These matters are in progress—the whole of the "Trusted demands" imported—Interest to the extent of 2 per cent. on the sum (£1,016 16s. 11d.) paid to the Trustees, and by them to the various claimants (£240 0 of Corporation 4s. Notes, have also been destroyed; all Watch, Seawagon, and Light balances due, on an irregularly paid, monthly, and such a state of things arising, as will soon enable the Common Council to direct a full publication of their affairs, which they are satisfied will improve confidence and respect. The Rent Roll, and other accounts, so long in arrears, are in hand, and no unnecessary delay will take place; while, at same time, the Common Council are fully aware, that the final statement of their affairs should be clear and correct—and they are consequently unwilling to be precipitate in their publication, especially as the promised instalment of 3 per cent. per annum will not doubt be paid, and various small sums due, and not provided for in the Trust Deed, will soon disappear.

No Monies have been borrowed, from any quarter, during this year.

The present Collector of Taxes, James Gerow, Jun., has not at this time submitted his Accounts, owing to the very late period at which the Assessment Books were placed in his hands.

The Accounts of the late Mr. Parfellow, John R. Parfellow, and the late Collector of Taxes, Thomas Baldwin, are still under investigation, and will not, most likely, be finally reported upon prior to 31st March next.

The above Accounts are all supported by the necessary Vouchers. Respectfully submitted.
