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THE CHIEF OF WAR.

A VISIT TO THE HOUSES OF SEBASTOPOL.

The following graphic account of this desolate city which we copy from the *Spectator*, is taken from a private letter written by the intelligent master of a residence given to his family in Blenheim Palace:

"We may presume that his vessel will be released from Borodino by the 8th of April; it is for advanced. As the Russians will destroy all corn and grain, and all they will eat well, "as they return," the committee and land transport will be taxed beyond the example of any former war; and immediate supplies are therefore urgent."

BALAKLAVA, Nov. 22, 1855.

"I went to Sebastopol last week to see the results.

It was a long walk from Balaklava, but I would have gone twice the distance for the sight it gave.

We walked through the desolation of the city.

There were no signs of life, and scarce few.

At every place telling the work which had been going on—plenty of guns and large mortars, some of them mounted, and all sorts of military stores, and all sorts of military equipments.

We passed through part of the valley of the Ikerman, and there came into view what is called the Valley of Death.

It is a deep ravine with high sides, and the ground is covered by the bodies of men.

In the valley the dead and those still living were scattered as thick as the stones in stone places.

The horses were scattered about dead.

We crossed the River Balaklava about eleven o'clock, and at the eighth mile met us
