### STOCK MARKET **OUTLOOK IS FAVORABLE**

The effect was to stimulate renewed demand for securities sufficient to outwelgh the disadvantages in the technical position in the stock market and to turn the price movement upwards again. The disadvantages in the technical position lay in the extent to which the rise in prices had been carried, the large increase in the long account and the disposition to close at the profits accrued. This disposition operated to cause a wavering of the price movement during part of the week, which was read as an index of uncertain sentiment over the further progress of improvement in conditions. The most potent factor in bringing speculative sentiment out of this state of hesitation was the improved grain crop advices and practical breaking down of the speculative corner in wheat. The slump in wheat was so clear a demonstration of the previous inflation in value that the claims on which the advance had been based lost their power to convince. Moreover the news from the wheat fields was so distinctly encouraging as to dissipate the Incipient crop scare which hung over the financial markets the week before. Plans for seeding of spring wheat and of corn were said to be on so extensive a scale as to indicate a larger supplement than usual to the harvest prospect customary at this period.
