

#### GOVERNMENT BY COMMISSION.

The movement towards civic government by commission or board of control continues to make headway. Among the latest recruits is Port Huron, Michigan, which has obtained a new charter abolishing the office of aldermen and placing the government of the city in the hands of four commissioners, a mayor and three others. The mayor will receive \$2,000 a year, and the other commissioners \$1,200 each. All the boards are to be abolished except the board of education, which is reduced in numbers from fourteen to four. The public library commission is the only body remaining unchanged.

With the object of consolidation and saving in expenditures the offices of the water board and city treasurer are amalgamated and the city clerk is made the purchasing agent under the direction of the commission. Everything required by the city is to be bought.

The future course of the inquiry will, it is believed, disclose the proper method of applying electivity.

The new process is now under test on a plot of two acres, part of a farm at East Northport, near New York, and the method employed is that used in Germany with remarkable effect. Regular rows of iron poles have been erected crossed by a series of wires and farm wagons.

The electricity is developed by means of windmills and by storing the surplus current it is possible to secure a steady supply of electricity for use both by day and night. More current is used than the wires can carry and in this way there is a continuous discharge from them to the ground.

The stimulating effect is reported to be greater than the city of prevention and saving the control of the commission. The movement towards civic government by com-

The personal responsibility of every man connected with the government of the city is one of the keynotes of the system.

While mention is made of Port Huron because it is adopting the change at the moment, it is surprising to note the number of cities in the United States which have already decided that this comparatively new

have already decided that this comparatively new method of civic government is the best yet devised.

Government by commission or board of control is believed to be the best method yet discovered of conducting civic business on business principles. St. John has witnessed half hearted and spasmodic attempts at civic reform, but all such movements hitherto have been nipped in the bud by a majority of the council. One instance, we recall a year or so ago in which a committee, of which Ald. Kelley was chairman, submitted a report which, under ordinary circumstances, would have brought the question to an issue. It was tabled for further consideration. It is on the table yet.

It may be that the people of St. John are well satisfied with the present form of civic government, and can see no room for improvement. Opinions on this point differ. #### ELECTRICITY APPLIED TO FARMING.

Oliver Lodge, principal of the University of Birmingham, for the purpose of ascertaining the influence of electricity as a stimulant of plant life, have proved highly success as a stimulant of plant life, have proved highly successful and electrical farming is now in operation, not only in England, but in several European countries. The results have not been uniform, but on the average it has been found that in the case of ordinary farm crops an increased yield of from 50 to 70 per cent, is obtained and slightly less in the case of seeds and fruft.

On the experimental farms careful comparison has been made between the growth under ordinary conditions and that under electrical stimulus and it showed that an application of the current for 164 hours produced very marked improvement and further scientific



IN U.S. INTEREST

Washington, July 20.—A preliminary summary of the twenty-second annual statistical report of the Interstate Commèrce Commission was issued today, covering the fiscal year which ended June 30, 1909.

It shows that there was a total single track railway mileage in the United States of 236,868 miles, an increase over the previous year of 3,215 miles. The total number of employees on the payrolls of the steam railroads of the country was 1,502,823, an increase of 66,548 over the previous year.

The par value of railway property was \$17,487,868,935. Of this amount \$13,711,867,733 was outstanding in the hands of the public, representing a capitalization of \$59,259 a mile of line. Of the total capital outstanding there existed as stock \$7,686,278,545, of which \$6,218,382,485 was common and \$1,467,896,060 was preferred; the remaining part, \$3,801,590,390, represented funded debt.

Of the total capital stock outstanding \$2,766,104,427, or \$5,99 per cent, paid no dividends. The amount of dividends declared during the year (by both operating and lessor companies) was \$221,071,626, being equivalent to 6,53 per cent on dividend paying stock. No interest was paid on \$718,351,332, or 7,57 per cent, of the total amount of funded debt outstanding.
