ONLY EXCITEMENT WAS CAUSED BY COPPER

COPPER MADE ALL THE STIR

New York, July 20.—There was a glimmer of speculative interest in the copper today. That was all that redeemed the day's stock market from being the dulllest of the year. An anomaly in the dealings was that the usual lull in the noon hour proceedings gave place to the spurt in activity which provided the heaviest hour's business of the session. The demonstration in the copper group was not explained definitely, but gave rise to rumors of progress in the efforts to bring about a working agreement between the leading producers to restrict the output. The buying of Amalgamated Copper for foreign account was regarded as quite important and this supplied the vantage point for an uplift in the whole group.

The desire of a number of important financial interests to effect a close agreement between the great copper producers and to restrict the production has been avowed on more than one occasion, and is supposed to have awaited the Supreme Court decision on the anti-trust law for active steps towards its consummation.

The credence given to the present reports of an agreement grows out of the depressed condition in the copper metal trade which is resulting from the sustained production, in spite of the maintenance of the consumptive demand at a rate which is limiting the further accumulation of surplus stocks to moderate proportions.

CANADIAN IN ROWING CHAMP'S

John O'Neill of Halifax Will Have Many Competitors at Washington Regatta--Winnipeg Crew May Enter.

New York, N. Y., July 20.—With the last open regatta to be held in local waters decided, the eyes of the metropolitan oarsmen are centred on the national championships, which will take place in Washington on August 12 and 13.

The regatta has attracted even more than usual attention and promises to surpass any ever held in this country.

The senior sculls, which last year had only three entries will bring together such cracks of the aquatic world as John O'Neill, of Halifax, who is the present champion; William Mehrhoff, Dorando Miller, Sam Gordon, of the Vesper Boat Club, of Philadelphia; Jimmy Cosgrove, of Toronto; and Fred Shepherd, Bennett, of Boston.

Up to date the senior centipede and senior doubles have received only one entry each. Fuessel and Sheppard, of the present champions, will defend their title against all comers, while the Nassau crew, which rowed to victory last year in the centipede race, again will face the starter in the same class.

The senior four-oared shell race promises to produce the battle royal of the regatta. No fewer than nine crews will be on the line, including the New York Athletic Club four, which will defend its title against the fastest field ever entered in a race of the kind.

On Saturday the annual regatta of the Union Boat Club will be held on the Harlem river. The races will be rowed half a mile upstream, finishing in front of the boathouse. The first race will start at 2.30 p. m.

It is regarded as likely that the Winnipeg crew which won honors at Henley, will enter the five oared race.
