

### RUSHING ADDITIONS TO GERMAN NAVY.

Programme Will Be Completed Ten Years Earlier Than Originally Planned.

Washington, Jan. 7.—According to official reports received in Washington, Germany's shipbuilding programme, which was to have been completed in 1908 instead of 1916, will now certainly be finished in 1906. The high price of potatoes in the Baltimore market is the cause of the importations. Foreign white potatoes rarely come in when the price is less than \$1 per bushel, but those now in the market are selling at \$2.50 per sack of 165 pounds, which is less than three bushels—a bushel weighing 60 pounds—making the price about 85c. a bushel. The foreign potatoes have to pay a duty of 25c. per bushel. toes have to pay a duty of 25c. per bushei. They are in rather better demand, it is said, than domestic potatoes, for the reason that they "run" regularly as to size. Some complaint has been heard that the domestic potatoes this season have not been well culled. The crop has been short, and it is also stated that some dealshort, and it is also stated that some dealers have bought up potatoes and stored them, in anticipation of high prices, as a speculation. If severe weather should prevent shipments there would, it is asserted, be a stronger tone to the market, which has become rather easier in consequence of the foreign arrivals.



### SEVENTY-FIVE POUND COD.

Big One Sets the Dealers Talking -- One Hundred and Thirty-six the Best.

Boston, Jan. 3-A 75-pound codfish caught last week from the little fishing steamer Vigilant, off Provincetown, was heralded far and wide as the king of the cod tribe, as one of the largest, if not the largest fish of its kind ever found in these waters or in the vicinity of Massachusetts

A letter was received here yesterday om J. J. O'Neill, of Provincetown, in puch he says: "I had a codfish landed on my wharf a month ago by Captain Wareham, of the sloop Carrie Tyler, that

a fish weighing 122 pounds had been received at his warehouse, and that within the last five years several exceeding 100 pound had been bought. The same story was told by other dealers, who all claimed that a 75-pound cod was not un-

usual.

Further investigation revealed the fact that the report of the United States commission on fisheries reported the capture of a codfish in 1886 off George's Banks, 50 or 60 miles from Cape Cod, by Captain Stephen Mar, of Gloucester, which weighed when dressed 136 pounds. Other cases of codfish weighing 130, 122 and 111 pounds were also given.

Philadelphia, Jan. 7.—The Spanish stmr. Ballasteros I, from Bilbao via Meteghan, N. S., with iron ore, which arrived here yesterday, reports having encounteded heavy weather during the entire voyage and sustained slight damage to bridge. 

## **SEVERE WOUNDS** RECEIVED BY A ST. JOHN MAN.

Lieut. Corey, Formerly of This City, Leads Gallant Action in India.

RECAPTURED A FORT.

Two Hours' Hard Fighting Culminating in Carrying by Storm the Position Held by Raiders from Persia on the Makran Coast--The Casualties Were Many.

London, Jan. 9—A Calcutta despatch reports that a message received there from Pasmi, on the Mekran coast, and dated 20th December, reports the capture by a British force of Nodiz Fort, which had been seized by a gang of raiders from Pensia, under the leadership of Muhamed Ahi. The latter successfully raided Kantdar, in Mekran, last year, and in October last he again entered Makran from Pensia, and was to have co-operated with another gang of Pensians on the border. His seizure of the fort of Muhamed Umar, however, led to his undoing, he being almost immediately blockaded there by the Nazim of Mekran with 85 men. The Nazim carried on the siege of the fort for 53 days, but, having no artillery, failed to capture st.

Our casualties were: Lieutenants Grant and Corey, both severely wounded; three men of the Baluchis killed and six wounded. Five of the enemy were found dead, about 15 were buried in the ruins of the fort, 14 were wounded and 63 were taken prisoners. Muhamed Ali, the leader, was killed, and his party is now broken up. [Lieut. George Corey belongs to St. John, a son of Charles D. Corey. The family removed to Toronto. Lieut. Corey was a grammar school boy, and has many friends here. He graduated from the Royal Military School, Kingston, in 1895. He received a commission in the Royal Dublin Fusiliers, and served under General Buller in Natal].
