LAUNCHED from the building yard of Mesrs E. & J. Wilson, on Thursday last, a beautifully modelled, thoroughly finished, and substantially built ship of 844 tons, which on entering her future element was named the "SALACIA." The day being fine, a large number of persons assembled, to witness the Gaunch of this noble vessel, which glided of the spectators. She is principally built of the best hamatac and pitch pine, and copperfastened. The following are her dimensions, length on deck 151 feet-breadth of beam 33 feet 9 inches-depth of hold 21 feet 8 in.
