**GREEK CHRISTENING HERE.**  
The first Greek christening ever performed in Campbellton took place here Monday afternoon, when the lively, bright-eyed twin sons of Mr. and Mrs. Peter Pappadakis were baptized as George and John by the Rev. Father George, a Greek clergyman of Montreal, who came to Campbellton to perform the ceremony. Mr. George, of the Olympia Confectionery and his brother Peter, manager of the Princess who are the boys' uncles also took part in the ceremony acting as what is known as the "best men." The Greek baptismal ceremony does not differ much from that of other denominations except on one or two points. One of these is that the child in being christened is immersed in water and oil. The reading of the prescribed service by the officiating priest occupies about three-quarters of an hour so the ceremony is somewhat lengthy.
