—The election of County Coun-

cillors for Cumberland next Tuesday.

—County Court, Amherst, com-

menced its November sittings on

Tuesday.

—The schr. "Eda," with 1,000

barrels of fine fruit from Messrs.

Chase, is at Dixon's Landing.

—S. J. Musson, Esq., of the firm of

S. P. Musson, Son & Co., of Bar-

badoc, was in town on Tuesday.

—Messrs. Dunlap Bros. & Co.,

Amherst, extensive fall importations

will receive attention next week.

—A portion of the woods on the

line of the Cape Railway was let for

cutting on Tuesday at \$5.00 per acre.

—Messrs. Harvey Phinney and

James Patterson shipped 99 tons of

baie to Boston per schr. "D. A.

Huntley" on Friday.

—Mr. Hazen Thompson, of this

place, was slightly injured in the

collision, near Bangor, on the Boston

and Maine Ry., last week.

—The tea meeting at Baie Verte,

on Thursday, in aid of the Metho-

dist Church building fund, netted

the handsome sum of \$200.

—The concert, next Wednesday

evening, at Lingley Hall, promises

well. Miss Stewart is too well

known here as a singer, and her

recommendation to a Sackville

audience. She will be assisted by a

strong company of students. There

will be a chance to spend a pleasant

evening and make a gift to the new

college.

—Messrs. Wood, Humphrey and

Fawcett made a shipment of 160

head of cattle to Halifax on Thurs-

day to take the steamer "Castilian"

for Liverpool. The cattle were

lighter and younger than those

usually shipped, but it is the inten-

tion of the shippers to feed most of

them on the outside side for some

months before offering them for

sale.

—The semi-annual school examina-

tions in District No. 8, Western-

land Point, in charge of Mr. B.

Marven, was held on Tuesday, 31st

October. The pupils were examined

in the branches usually taught in

public schools, and showed by their

ready answers a thorough acquaint-

ance with each subject. Apart from

the progress made by the pupils

under his charge, he has endeared

himself to the people of the district

by his modest and unassuming

manners. He leaves here to continue

his studies in Dalhousie. He car-

ries with him the best wishes of the

community.

—On Sunday, at one o'clock

in the morning, Mr. Thomas

Gastreaux, who lives a few hundred

yards from Black's mill, Upper

Aboussaguan, discovered that his

barn was on fire, but the fire had

made such progress by that time

that it was impossible to save any

thing. His two barns were con-

sumed with three houses, five cows,

two calves, pigs, hogs, two truck

wagons, one carriage, sleighs, mov-

ing machine, hay rake, harnesses,

about twenty tons of hay, wheat,

oats, barley, buckwheat, and all his

farming utensils. In a short time

about fifty persons were on the scene,

and it was with great difficulty that

they managed to save his house. It

is believed the fire was set by some

malicious person. Loss about \$1,200.

No insurance.

Surrey, A. C. Notes.

—The merchants here are getting

in their winter supply of goods

which gives their stores a business

like appearance. Those containing

the greatest variety of goods are

those owned by Duffy, Steeves, and

the late William Murdoch, St. John,

left about three o'clock in the

afternoon on Friday last to go

duck shooting. Not having return-

ed, search was made early Saturday

morning, when the boat was found

on the shore at Port Philip, about

three miles from Pugwash, with the

dead body of Graham entangled in

the rope of the boat. The body

was removed to Mr. Kennedy's, Port

Philip, where it lay until his father

arrived on Saturday evening, and

removed to his residence in New

Glasgow. The body of Murdoch

was found Sunday morning on the

shore at Bergman's Point, where it

had drifted, about half a mile from

where Graham's body was found.

The body was taken charge of by

Col. Snow, Surgeon of the construction

of the G. E. S. L. R. Co., until his

two brothers arrived, and removed

the body to St. John Monday morn-

ing. They were two young men

highly respected, and the sad oc-

currence cast a gloom over the

community.

An inquest was held on the

body of Mr. Graham, of the Halifax

Bank, on Saturday and Sunday.

His body was found attached to the

stays of the boat, and his hat a

"little distance" on the shore. Mr.

Murdoch's body was also discovered.

Strange to say, his felt hat remained

on his head, as if it had been drawn

tightly over it. The appearance of

the face indicated that he had died

immediately by drowning.

Alexander Cameron, a witness,

heard cries between dark and 7

o'clock on the night of the disaster.

He thought they came from the op-

posite shore. He did not think that

they indicated danger, but that the

parties wanted assistance. It looked

as if they had got on an island in

the harbor and could not get off.

They appeared to be waiting an

answer to the cries, which continued

for nearly an hour. There was no

word at the time to upset the boat.

He did not see any on the river.

John Mcleod heard similar cries.

They seemed to come from Berg-
