AGRICULTURE.

Ontario Agricultural College.

We have received a letter from the young Frederictonian, Mr. John Gregory, who is now studying at the Ontario Agricultural College, at Guelph.

He is one of three New Brunswickers, who are pursuing their studies there and learning the practical work of farming there. He gives, we may say, very good account of the Institution. The Report of 1881 he has sent us, is the "seventh annual," and shows that the attendance of students in 1881 was 217—114 of the number were from Ontario, (31 from the new cities were represented.) 24 from the Province of Quebec, 6 from Nova Scotia, 3 from New Brunswick, 11 from England, 3 from Wales, 3 from Scotland, and 1 from Ireland.

The College is yearly becoming more popular. Professor Brown says, "our success in securing home patronage and the world's patronage, during this comparatively short period, has been quite a feature in school history." But he is anxious to disabuse the minds of those who are new from the College, that the College can give; and disposes of the ridiculous expectation entertained by some who have attended it, that, without much effort on their part, they could be made farmers in two years. "It must be held up to the country that no possible amount of value of instruction on our part will ever make the farmer, unless he is himself in love with it. Let it be understood that the two years with its means only, is an introduction to such a measure of principles, science and practice, as but whets the appetite for more; and that we are unable to pledge a young man for this profession, as the Toronto University is in turning out a lawyer, a doctor, or a clergyman." The several professors give a very good account of the work done and progress made in their departments. The President says, "On the whole, I think we are much better equipped for our work than we were a year ago; but, after all, we are utterly unable to meet the demands for instruction on agriculture throughout the Province." He also speaks of the necessity of teaching the principles of agriculture in all the rural public schools, and of employing the money now spent in supporting unnecessary rival and struggling High Schools in almost every county. In establishing and maintaining a good farm school in each of the thirteen agricultural districts of the Province.

AGRICULTURE.

It keeps so short a time, that purchasers are said to buy largely by sight, and variable in appearance and quality; some are very beautiful when in prime order.

Seeds of Wine comes in early, but we have not found it profitable. It does so quickly that it is not profitable. The trees seem to be tender and are often injured by severe frost. Its beautiful appearance and flavor recommend it as a dessert apple. We would not recommend it as a stock apple. The trees seem to be tender and are often injured by severe frost. Early Harvest, Early Bough and one are all recommended, and have their special admirers. It is of Nova Scotia origin, and perhaps a greater quantity comes to market than of any other variety. We recommend a large number of the Faneuse as being planted. Faneuse is the leading apple for sale in Quebec, and we think it has no superior. When ripe it has a beautiful deep red skin; the flesh is clear white, and is very hardy. It is not generally grown in the Lower Provinces; but where known is much liked, and always finds a ready sale. We have found it to be a fine apple, and it keeps until the middle of January.

St. Lawrence is another valuable apple in this division; it bears every year in the Province as well as in the States. The following are among the best of this class:—Late Strawberry, Maiden's Blush, Nonch, Fall Pippin.

The Bellini was a leading winter apple, and it is a fine one. No other apple has its reputation, although not so good when grown in the Province as in the Northern States. It is a fast grower, bears early, always sells well, although it is somewhat deficient in color. A safe variety to plant.

Bishop Pippin.—This is a very useful apple either for the table or cooking. There are finer flavored winter apples, but this is one of the most valuable we doubt if there is a better apple for general family use in the long list in this class. The tree is rather slow in bearing, and seldom yields much, but it is called a heavy crop, but on the whole it turns out well, and always brings a good price. We have known it to keep well until April.

We recommend a fair proportion of Bishop Pippin being planted in every orchard.

The Greening is much liked, but not much planted with us. It requires rich soil, and we are inclined to think it is better for our climate; yet it has its favorites, and no doubt it deserves the reputation it has for shipping.

The Blue Pearmain is a very handsome apple, but not so good as a winter apple. We had but little experience with it here.

Spitzenburg is an excellent keeper; hardy, bears regular and moderate crops, and is a good apple for the winter. It is a fast grower, and is a favorite, and no doubt it deserves the reputation it has for shipping.
