## BRABANT'S HORSE LOSE HEAVILY

### Desperate Fight at Vryheid

Boers Lose 100 Men--Fought all Day.

DeWet Working his Force of 6,000 Northwards.

At Aliwal North, Cape Colony, on Dec. 16th, a party of Brabant's Horse, consisting mainly of raw recruits, engaged a superior force of Boers, Dec. 13th, near Zastron, in Orange River Colony, losing four killed, 16 wounded and 120 taken prisoners.

Lord Kitchener wires on the 16th that the released Magaliesberg prisoners have arrived at Rustenburg, and that the Boer force divided into portions, one moving South and the other West.

The Boers fought desperately at Vryheid on Dec. 10th. They attacked the place in strong numbers, and lost 100 killed and wounded before they retired. The fighting lasted all day, the enemy drawing off at 7.30 p. m. The British loss was six killed, 19 wounded and 30 wounded. Our casualties include two

officers who died of their wounds.

Knox drove DeWet North to the Thaba N'Chu Ladybrand line, which was held by our troops.

DeWet's force, about 6,000 strong, made several attempts to get through during the day, assisted by a force of Boers operating through the North. These were driven back, though some of the Boers of the South were able to get through the line.

While passing through the lines in the neighborhood of Thaba N'Chu, DeWet's force lost considerably. The South African Light Horse and Thorneycroft's Mounted Infantry captured a 15-pounder taken at Dewetsdorp, and a pom-pom, several wagons with ammunition, 22 prisoners and some horses and mules. A portion of the enemy has not been able to pass North.

Not content with supplying a very large portion of the black tea that is used, they are now going extensively into the production of green tea, to compete for the trade that has hitherto been chiefly supplied by Japan. Estabrooks has a shipment of these teas now en route from Ceylon. They will be sold chiefly in Ontario and Quebec, as very little green tea is used in the Maritime Provinces.

## MEN ARE TABOOED.

We oftentimes speak, perhaps too  
flippantly, of the autocratic and vig-  
orous action of the "Czar of all the  
Russias," but under his government  
—in one section at least of his great  
Empire the "coming woman" has

In the Province of Besjukovsch-  
china, in Russia, there is the only  
state in the world that is run entire-  
ly by women. This province is made  
up of seven villages, each presided  
over by a Mayoresa, the whole under  
the superintendence of a lady named  
Saschka, who acts as president.

There are women magistrates, women  
preachers, women policemen—in fact  
every capacity in the state is filled by  
women. The roads are made by  
women, and the women sell milk and  
deliver letters. If you want to bring

The ladies of St. John's Church will meet in force in the Crypt at 7.30 this evening to make arrangements for the usual Christmas decorations. A large attendance is requested.

Rev. C. W. Vernon, M. A., North Sydney, C. B., has a criticism on Marie Corelli's last novel, 'The Master Christian,' in the King's College Record that is exceedingly well written and bristles with truth.

The Morning Chronicle's paper election for Disfranchisement of Civil Servants, was 702 votes for Disfranchisement and 378 against. Some 222 Civil Servants voted for Disfranchisement and 156 against.

Mr. R. McFarbridge has opened music classes at Little River. Messrs. Grant and Musquodoboit have been asked to give a concert, and it is hoped that the young folk will patronize his school in large numbers.

Mr. Kruger has wired the pro-Boers of the Sx10 Grand Rapids—community of Michigan, who asked him to visit the United States, that he has yet reached no decision in regard to so important (?) a movement in the world's history.

Noel Shore boasts of a Literary Association that is in a very prosperous condition. The Society has a weekly newspaper, called the 'Noel Shore Journal.' Mr. Willard Miller is the editor, and Miss Annie Canavan is the assistant editor. This paper is type-written.

Zwicker has three schooners in the stocks timbered out; one will be a three masted schooner for the West India trade, and owned by J. Ernst & Son. D. Burgoyne has one nearly completed and another timbered out, and has orders for several more. McLean & Sons have a 73 feet keel laid for a schooner owned at Malbone, and Henry Schnare has a 76 feet keel for one owned at La-Have.
